

KEYSER FORESEES GREAT BOULEVARD THROUGH PORTLAND

Park Superintendent Says Time Is Coming When 200 Foot Highway in City Will Be Need.

A great boulevard patterned after the famous highways of Paris is a possibility and a necessity as an artery of traffic in Portland from Hoyt street to Terwilliger boulevard along the present park squares, if the city reaches a population aggregating 1,000,000, according to C. P. Keyser, superintendent of the park bureau.

The plan, which Keyser states will be years before it may ever come to a realization, is the taking over by the city of all property from Sixth and Sheridan to Hoyt street, between Park and West Park streets, to be utilized as a 200 foot boulevard. He points out that the city at present owns several blocks in the path of the boulevard, which were dedicated years ago from the old Lownsdale estate.

Acquisition of present business property, he believes, could be accomplished as was done in London and Philadelphia, when a broad highway was cut through some years ago. He points out that both municipalities purchased the property outright, as well as abutting property, which in turn was sold at a big advance in keeping with the benefits given to business by the establishment of the highway.

WOULD BE PICTURESQUE
The 200 foot boulevard plotted with four lines of trees extending from Terwilliger boulevard to the depot would be a wonderful and picturesque artery of traffic for the city that Portland is expected to be within the next quarter of a century, according to Keyser. Fire Chief Dowell states that such a boulevard would be an absolute necessity to prevent a great fire from wiping out the entire business district.

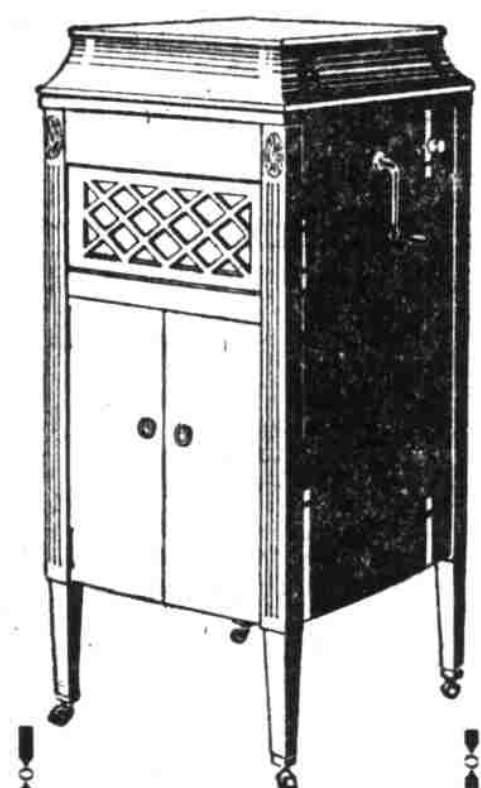
Claims of Former Stenographer to Go Before Committee

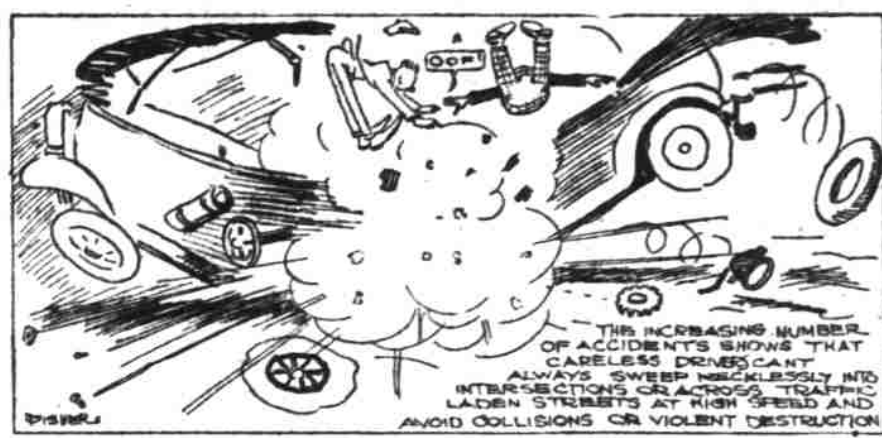

Drivers Grow Careless Collisions Are Increasing



The increase in automobile accidents during February is explained by the increasing carelessness of drivers. Few pedestrians have been involved. Collisions have been for the most part between automobiles, and invariably one driver has violated the law. Some have piloted their machines through weird capers.

Last week one car, after a signal, turned in the intersection at Thirty-fourth and Division. Another, approaching from the opposite direction at high speed, crashed into the first and glided off into a telephone pole, several feet distant. Automobiles can't sweep into intersections at high speed and always avoid collisions.

A machine proceeding north on Park street smashed into the rear of a parked car. An automobile going south on the same street is blamed for the collision. When they can't avoid the standing objects, how are other machines and pedestrians to escape?

SKIDDED 200 FEET!
Another driver, in making his accident report, stated that he had started to slow down 200 feet before he hit the street car at Williams and Alberta. But his machine had skidded. The stop was torn from the electric car and his auto was considerably damaged. They don't skid 200 feet at 10 miles an hour, at 20 miles, nor 25. Above 20 a driver is exceeding the speed limit.

An automobile going east on Broadway was hit broadside at East Eleventh. The other car made no attempt to slow down or stop. He admitted that he hadn't seen the other machine. Here is a driver crossing a traffic light street with street car tracks, a street on which there are always several vehicles in addition to street cars, without looking to either side or in front.

KILLING HARD TO EXPLAIN
A motorcycle was going south on Sixth. An automobile going north on the left side of the street forced the motorcycle to the west side, where it collided with a parked car. It is difficult to explain what the automobile was doing on the left side of the street, and even then, why the motorcycle could not have avoided the parked machine.

It is also difficult to explain why drivers, in the face of four killings in 10 days, and injuries on every hand, continue on their reckless way. Surprising how many automobile operators depend on luck alone to save them from violent destruction.

COOPERATION CUTS LIVING COSTS FOR U. A. C. STUDENTS
Saving of \$17.50 for Each of 708 Persons Affected Made by Associations in Three Months.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Feb. 28.—It costs students less to live at O. A. C., as far as food is concerned, than it does to live at home. A saving of \$17.50 for each individual of the 708 members of fraternities, sororities and clubs has been the result of three months' work of the Cooperative Managers' association of the college.

A total of \$12,318.26 has been saved in a single school term by means of this association. Figures are based on a comparison with retail prices regularly charged to the average family.

The association includes 30 campus organizations, all but four of the fraternities, sororities and clubs maintaining their own kitchens. During the three months' period business to the amount of \$38,207.35 was done by the association. This includes all money spent for groceries, meat, bread, butter, milk and wood.

Food is bought in wholesale lots. Potatoes and vegetables are bought directly from the farmers by the carload. Canned fruits and jellies are bought directly from the canneries and cheese from the creameries in ton lots. In this manner the middleman is eliminated and the profits that would ordinarily go to him are turned back to the students in savings.

The organization is entirely a student affair. Jack Grafton, a senior in agriculture from Chehalis, Wash., is business manager, giving part time from his regular school work. He is paid a small salary.

The student board of directors is composed of five members. Harry Collins of Umanine is president, Eva Wheeler of Tillamook vice president and Marie Mendenhall of Portland secretary. Other directors are Berkeley Davis of San Pedro, Cal., and John E. Houck of Portland.

The organization, having become firmly established, has plans of expansion. It is recognized on its own credit by the banks of Corvallis. It proposes owning its own warehouse and the employment of a full time manager.

Surprise Hinted for Alleged Pro-Germans At Kidnaping Trial
Tombstone, Ariz., Feb. 28.—(U. P.)—Threats of a surprise for alleged "German sympathizers who seem so anxious to do their bit for the fatherland," was the answer today of J. A. Burgess, chief counsel for the defense, to the charge of perjury brought against Defense Attorney Bruce Stevenson by William Beaton, farmer.

Burgess issued a bristling statement declaring they have started something this time that we are going to finish and finish in a manner satisfactory to every American in Cochise county. "He charges the prosecution with trying to get pro-Germans on the jury. 'I have nothing to say,' answered Deputy County Attorney George Roark, now in charge of the deportation cases, while time that we are going to finish and finish in a manner satisfactory to every American in Cochise county."

Exception to the defense claim that the prosecution was responsible for the charge against Stevenson was taken by the county attorney's office, which declared that it was William Beaton who swore to the complaint after his wife's veracity had been questioned. Stevenson, according to the sheriff's office, is in Douglas. Sheriff Jim McDonald today telephoned a deputy to arrest Stevenson and bring him to Tombstone "on the first stage."

COURT REFUSES TO ORDER VERDICT FREEING McNUTT

Judge Says the Testimony Shows That Fire in McNutt's Studio Was of Incendiary Origin.

Motion of counsel for a direct verdict in favor of L. S. McNutt, motion picture producer, on trial for alleged arson, was denied Friday by Circuit Judge Stapleton. The motion was made after the prosecution had rested its case. The defense will put in its evidence before the jury Monday.

In making his decision, the judge stated that the evidence produced showed very clearly that the fire which originated in McNutt's studio late one night in August, and on which he is attempting to collect \$5000 insurance, was of incendiary origin. He further declared that, while there was no direct testimony that McNutt was the guilty person, the fact that he had taken insurance on the films a few days before the fire, and other circumstances, made it a problem for the jury to determine.

The defense will open Monday morning. McNutt has promised to bring an array of Portland motion picture actresses to the stand to testify in his behalf.

WIVES FIND EACH WEDDED TO IDENTICAL HUSBAND

Mrs. Joseph Leo Galloway I and Mrs. Joseph Leo Galloway II met and formed an affection for each other when they discovered that they had a mutual husband. It was ascertained by Judge Bingham's court Friday.

The second Mrs. Galloway was suing Joseph Leo Galloway for annulment of marriage, and the first Mrs. Galloway was there as witness and friend. The first wife was married to Galloway in Vancouver, Wash., in 1915, was four years later he wedded and won the second wife.

One wife secured her annulment Friday, and the other announced that she had brought divorce proceedings in Washington county.

When the attorney representing Virgil S. Venable stated in substance to the court that he believed that Mrs. Muriel F. Venable was entitled to a divorce, Judge Bingham granted the decree. Venable was a former major in the army, but remained in France after his discharge.

GRANDCHILD MADE SUBJECT OF A LEGAL CONTROVERSY
Mr. and Mrs. Harry Sullivan of 371 1/2 Russell street must appear before Judge McCourt Monday at 2 o'clock to answer to charges that they are unlawfully imprisoning and detaining their 3-year-old granddaughter, June Rose Schultz.

The charges came in a habeas corpus proceeding started by Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Schultz of Vancouver, Wash., to regain possession of their daughter.

The Schultz petition states that the trouble arises from the dislike of Mrs. Alta Sullivan for her son-in-law, Hugh Schultz, and her determination to keep the child away from him. Mrs. Schultz sides with her husband and against her mother.

New War Romance Bared in Arrest of Canadian Soldiers
Seattle, Wash., Feb. 28.—(I. N. S.)—Reginald Bolton, Canadian soldier and hero of the world war, and Marjorie Van Der Borcht, a cultured Englishwoman, are today being held in the immigration detention station here awaiting deportation proceedings as the result of a romance of the war.

Bolton, who has a wife and three children in Vancouver, enlisted in the Canadian army in 1914. He was wounded and sent to London where he met Miss Van Der Borcht, a British subject of Dutch parentage, and an art graduate of the University of London. They met again and their romance increased.

In May, 1919, Bolton returned to his home in Vancouver. Three months later Miss Van Der Borcht appeared and secured a position as teacher in a high school at Langley, near the Bolton home. "Later Bolton and Miss Van Der Borcht disappeared and were arrested as they stepped from a train in Seattle."

Bolton declares he will not return to Vancouver. Miss Van Der Borcht insists she will not give Bolton up.

Mrs. Mary Freeman Dies Unexpectedly At Hot Lake Or.

Mrs. Mary J. Freeman of 64 East Eighty-seventh street died unexpectedly at Hot Lake, Or., Friday afternoon at the home of her granddaughter, Mrs. D. C. Boyles, where she had gone for a brief visit. She was the mother of Dan C. Freeman, well known Portland man, and a daughter, Mrs. A. Crossman of Linn county. The deceased was in her 76th year and was born in Ohio. She was the widow of a Civil war veteran who died in 1883. She had been a resident of Portland for 27 years. Interment will be in Mt. Scott cemetery Monday from Dunning's. Services will be conducted by the Rev. McHenry of the Mt. Labor Presbyterian church.

Lumbermen Initiated In Hoo Hoo Mystics

Twenty-seven Portland lumbermen were initiated into the mysteries of Hoo-Hoo at a grand concatenation of the members of that order in the Hotel Portland rubberball at 8 o'clock Friday night. The initiation was in charge of Snark of the Universe R. A. Hiscot of San Francisco. More than 100 local lumbermen attended the meeting and many more were present from lumber mill towns in Oregon and Washington.

A rich strike of grade ore is reported to have been running from the North Star mine to the Independence, near Hailey.

Pacific Northwest Admittedly Short in Magazine Publicity

Admitting that the Pacific Northwest has not received so much magazine advertising as California, but claiming that it has received a proportionate share of newspaper publicity, P. S. Eustis, chairman of the Western passenger traffic committee of the United States railroad administration at Chicago, has replied to the protest of Sydney Vincent, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, Eustis denied any discrimination against the Northwest, and cited the cases of Arkansas Hot Springs, Texas Gulf states, Southern Arizona and other places noted for winter travel, which likewise received no magazine advertising.

W. J. Hofmann, president of the Northwest Tourist association, had also made complaint to the railroad administration because of failure to mention the Northwest in its advertising medium.

POST OVER THE TOP WILL FEATURE RAISING OF FLAG

Veterans of Foreign Conflicts Have Arranged Patriotic and Religious Program for Today.

Flag dedication exercises of Over the Top post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars will be held at 2:30 p. m. today in the Lincoln high school auditorium. A patriotic and religious program has been arranged, to which everyone is invited.

Over the Top post of Portland was organized about 10 months before the signing of the armistice. The organization is composed of overseas veterans of the Spanish-American, Mexican and German wars. Most of its members also belong to Portland post of the American Legion.

Dr. William Wallace Youngson, district superintendent of the Methodist Episcopal church, will deliver the dedicatory address this afternoon.

Other speakers will be Mayor George L. Baker and J. J. Crossley, who was a lieutenant colonel overseas in the last war. The invocation will be delivered by Bishop Walter Taylor Sumner of the Episcopal church, and the benediction by the Rev. Father E. V. Qihara of Pro-Cathedral.

Musical numbers will be "America," "My Country," "Bedouin Song" and "We'll Never Let the Old Flag Fall," by the Imperial quartet; vocal solos by Mrs. Marguerite Moore-Bourne and A. E. Davidson.
