

CONGRESS ASKED TO SAVE BEAUTY SPOTS OF NATURE

While two remedial measures lie buried in congressional committees, Multnomah falls, highest and most queenly of the Columbia river cascades, is menaced. The trail that leads through timbered reaches to the summit whence the most magnificent of all views of Mount Hood is to be had, will shortly become a mere track through a scene of devastation.

Logging operations are rapidly reaching and in some places have crossed the trail. Those who have recently visited Larch mountain, ascending from either Multnomah or Wahkeena falls, declare emphatically that only the promptest action will save it for the pleasure of thousands of beauty lovers.

NATURE'S BEAUTIES MENACED

Much of Larch mountain belongs to timber companies. As they remove the timber they leave the watershed of Multnomah creek in such condition that Multnomah falls will be a wild flood at wet seasons, but a mere dribble during the summer, when the greatest number of people traverse the highway. Onseta creek will be similarly affected, and the peculiar gorge of this stream will be deprived of much of its charm. Even Wahkeena falls, which bursts full born from the earth far above the highway, will be influenced by the change in the drainage conditions. Larch mountain, now a place of magnificent scenery, will be reduced to a scar.

The measures introduced in both the house and senate at Washington, D. C., propose the exchange of the privately held forest lands on Larch mountain for equally good lands elsewhere, which are now the property of the forest service. EXCHANGE IS FAVORED

The forest service is eager to make the exchange, in pursuance of a policy to save the beauty of areas more valuable recreationally than commercially. Oregon's senators and representatives are favorable, but their interest has not as yet gotten results. A bill, which preceded the two now buried in committees, expired for lack of attention.

The Chamber of Commerce has taken up the question, and has a committee, composed of Samuel C. Lancaster, District Forester George H. Cecil and Frank H. Ransom, which has yet to record any substantial accomplishment. But Miss Margaret Salomon, of the chamber's executive staff is placing the situation before local and out-state organizations, and city officials. The members' forum of the chamber will hear the proposition in one week. Telegraphed appeals will be hurried to Washington. So far as evidence available goes, not even the logging companies oppose the project. Taking away the trees is merely a matter of business with them. They are said to be equally willing to operate in timber elsewhere if a fair exchange is effected.

City Defendant in Suit to Prevent Reassessment Costs

The city of Portland is made defendant in an action brought by property owners of East Twenty-first street seeking to prevent the reassessment of property in that section to pay for paving laid between Division and Fossil streets.

The controversy started when the pavement was first laid in 1910, and has been gradually growing since that time. Ida M. Teter, signer of the complaint, alleges that the original pavement was faulty, and that efforts to remedy it since that time have not been successful. She states the original contract was illegal, inasmuch as it was awarded without competition. The sum involved is some \$18,461.

Red Cross Can Use All Kinds of Waste

Save all waste paper. The Red Cross shop, which has practically maintained the Portland chapter of the Red Cross in its war work, on March 13 will canvas the city with trunks and take from front porches all old newspapers and magazines that have been piled there. Col. White Receives Cross of Black Star Awarded by France

The Cross of the Black Star, a decoration of the supreme council of the Legion of Honor of the French government, has just been received by Lieutenant Colonel George A. White, former adjutant general of Oregon, according to information received here.

"For Distinguished Service in the Allied Cause" reads the citation that accompanies the award. Only 277 soldiers in the American expeditionary forces have received a similar decoration. Before the cross could be given to an American soldier General Pershing had to give his recommendation. The cross awarded to Colonel White was sent to Portland some time ago, was re-addressed to New York, then to Washington, and finally found its way back to Portland.

HERMAN CREEK SALMON FEEDING GROUNDS WILL RELEASE 200,000 FISH

Salmon Are Now Being Marked
to Ascertain Percentage of
Sockeyes That Return.

Two hundred thousand 18-month-old salmon of the sockeye or blueback variety are being marked at the Herman creek feeding grounds, preparatory to release into the Columbia river, says R. E. Clanton, state fish warden. The purpose of the marking is to ascertain the percentage of fish from the state hatcheries which come back.

POLICY IS SUCCESS

The fish are marked by removing the adipose and two ventral fins. The fish, upon being released, go out to the ocean, coming back again after two years. Experiments in marking salmon in 1916 resulted in 5 per cent of the adult fish being accounted for in 1918, and the state hatchery is this year undertaking markings upon a larger scale.

"Oregon is the only department of the bureau of fisheries that has succeeded in raising young salmon up to this age," says Clanton, "and their policy has always been to hold their fish from four to nine months, but should a larger percentage of the 18-month-old fish return after being liberated, the department will alter the policy of holding their fish until they reach this size."

RETURN IS LARGE

A larger fish stands a much better chance of surviving its numerous enemies than a smaller one when liberated, and if by keeping them at the feeding grounds until they are of fairly large size, a larger return of fish, compared with the number liberated, is noted, this plan will be adopted, rather than releasing larger quantities of smaller fish.

The success of the fish hatcheries has been demonstrated in the fact that the Columbia river has held its own in number of chinook salmon, says Clanton, while many other rivers in the state have suffered a noticeable falling off in numbers.

Dr. Nina Wood to Open Fight Against Capital Punishment

State-wide campaign against re-enactment of capital punishment will receive strong impetus this week, when Dr. Nina Evaline Wood, organizer, begins a tour of labor and civic organizations to seek public support against the extreme penalty.

The first meeting of capital punishment opponents will be held next Sunday at Central library hall, when prominent speakers will enter the fight.

McArthur "Opines" Congressmen Ought To Have Union, Too

Washington, Feb. 29.—(U. P.)—An intimation that members of congress should form a labor organization and demand higher pay was made here by Representative McArthur, Oregon.

No covert threat of a strike if the members did not vote to raise their own salaries were made by McArthur, but he did claim that congressmen are not now receiving "a decent living wage." "Our \$7,500 is a very large salary for the office of such importance," McArthur said, "and it should be raised to \$10,000 to meet the high cost of living. We are not as well off as a man with a \$5,000 position five years ago. We have lost a lot of capable men who could not make expenses on the present salary," he said.

Selah \$15,000 Bond Issue Is Authorized

Yakima, Feb. 29.—The voters of Selah authorized a \$15,000 bond issue at a special election Friday. The proceeds will be used as part payment for a waterworks system which N. Gilman, the engineer in charge, estimates will cost over \$30,000. The remainder of the money will be raised by the organization of an enlarged improvement district. A reservoir will be constructed in the hills and water pumped from wells and piped to the town and to water users in the district.

Leon Weimar's Body Is Found in River

The body of Leon Weimar, 26 years old, of 303 East Burlington street, was found in the Willamette river at St. Johns terminal Sunday afternoon. Weimar was employed on a dredge at the terminal. He was last seen alive by his fellow workmen early Friday morning. C. R. Peeling and Ed Smith, employed on the dredge, found the body. Weimar is survived by his father and mother and two sisters. The body is in the hands of Deputy County Coroner Caultkins.
