

SUFFRAGETTES IN OREGON AREN'T OF A MILITANT TYPE

The women of Oregon do not seem to be so militant as their political sisters of California to the south or of Washington to the north. They do not like to "demand" representation, while their northern and southern sisters have no scruples against going out after what they want by that route.

Down in California the political organization managers of both parties are having a dickens of a time with the ladies. The Women's State Democratic club of that state at a recent meeting issued an ultimatum to the effect that they expected to have the delegates to the national convention at San Francisco split "fifty-fifty" between the male and the female members of the party. At about the same time their Republican sisters were submitting much the same demand to the chairmen of the northern and southern divisions of the Republican state central committee. The ladies contend that they are expected to get out and work for the success of their respective tickets and candidates and that, by that same token, they are entitled to have some part and place in the "inner council" of the two parties.

WOMEN INDIGNANT

Much the same situation seems to exist up in Washington, particularly among the women on the Republican side of the battle lines. Washington has the old convention system of electing delegates to the national conventions. First precinct committeemen are elected, then county conventions are held, at which delegates to the state convention are elected, and the state convention elects the delegates to the national convention. The women of Washington are wrought up because the county leaders are picking men to go to the county and state conventions, where, it is more or less apparent, men will be selected to go to the national convention. So the ladies are out to get representation all down the line and are contending that the men should go "fifty-fifty" with them in party representation.

In Oregon the women who are taking a leading part in party affairs have much the same idea, though they work under different conditions where any woman who desires may become a candidate for any office she may wish to seek. But they are not demanding. "Women don't get any place by demanding things of the men," Mrs. George McMahon, president of the Republican League of Women Voters, explains, intimating that the best method of winning their way in the political family is not much different than that which wives have so long ago found most efficacious: dealing with reluctant husbands about the time new hats are due in the spring. Be that as it may, Mrs. McMahon contends that Oregon Republicans ought to send one woman to the Chicago convention from Eastern Oregon, one from Southern Oregon and one from Portland, not a "fifty-fifty" division of the position, but an entering wedge just the same.

On the Democratic side Mrs. M. L. T. Hidden is already an announced can-

didate and it is probable that there may be others before the time for filing is closed, just as it is probable that there will be candidates on the Republican ticket before the time for the voting comes around.

After Antonio Schai, driver for the City dairy, testified that he had not seen his victim at all, and that his lights were defective and had been defective for a month, he was exonerated by the coroner's jury Monday night of all blame for the death of James Polikronis, track worker, killed by his truck Sunday night at Fourth and Jefferson. Witnesses testified that it was difficult to see Polikronis crouched at his work on the Southern Pacific tracks.

The jury recommended that all track workers carry a flag or light.
