

NEW COMMISSION WRESTLES WITH GAME PROBLEMS

Oregon fishing problems were taken up Monday for the first time by the new fish and game commission at its organization meeting. Preliminary to regular business, E. V. Carter of Ashland was elected chairman of the joint commission, and a committee consisting of John Gill and I. N. Fleischner for the game and F. M. Warren and Chris Schmidt for the commercial fish end of the commission to affect a segregation of the interests of the old commission. Charles F. Stone of Klamath Falls was elected chairman of the game part of the commission and Warren chairman of the fish division.

Meetings of the new commission will be held on the second Monday of each month, the sectional meetings occurring at 9:30 a. m. and the joint sessions at 2 p. m. R. E. Clanton was reappointed fish commissioner and Carl Shoemaker game warden.

The publication of the Oregon Sportsman, discontinued during the war, will be resumed by the commission, commencing with the April number. The price has been increased from 25 to 50 cents per year to meet the rising costs. Carl Shoemaker will edit the publication.

Shoemaker was authorized to prepare moving pictures of elk, deer, trout work and trout fishing for showing in all the moving picture houses of the state. These pictures will be sufficiently titled to be self explanatory and will be sent as rapidly as possible throughout Oregon and shown as a part of the regular bills at the motion picture theatres.

The commission voted to close Umatilla river to hook and line fishing below the Hermon irrigation dam, Canyon creek in Grant county, or that part of it flowing through the land of William B. Ryan, was closed to hook and line fishing. The fishing of the Willamette river within Linn county were opened to hook and line fishing for catfish only.

TUMALO TO CONTINUE
Improvement work at the Tumalo hatchery will be continued. When completed the hatchery will have a capacity of 3,500,000 trout.

All the tributaries of the Mackenzie river were closed indefinitely to all kinds of fishing.

The commission provided for an expenditure of \$4000 in cooperation with the United States bureau of fisheries on the Rogue river for game fish. In return for this the government hatcheries are to give to the state all the steelhead eggs the state requires for its Butte Falls hatchery.

The commission authorized the game warden to take legal steps to remove the Ament dam as an obstruction to the migration of fish in the Rogue river.

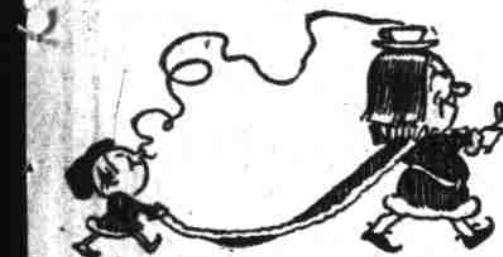
Oakridge to Have Fine Grounds for Recreation Purpose

Between the forest service and the state, Oakridge on the upper Willamette will have one of the best recreation layouts in Oregon, says Forest Examiner F. L. Cleator, who has just returned from the region. The forest service commenced a camp ground near the foot of Salmon creek. Then the state wanted it for a fish hatchery and has obtained permits under terms which provide that it shall fix up as camping grounds that portion of it not used for the hatchery. The state is planning to put in one of the best and largest fish hatcheries in Oregon. Men are now at work removing drifts in the creek above so that it will not flood.

About a mile above the hatchery the forest service has started to lay out summer homesites in an attractive locality in the midst of maple trees with fire to the rear. Cleator with two local forest rangers, surveyed out frontage for 19 lots in a day and a half.

Applies for Place To Show Chemical Warfare Exhibition

Application has been made by the Chamber of Commerce for use of either the Vaughn street baseball park or the Rose City race track for the chemical warfare exhibition which is to be given in Portland March 18.

Word has been received from Washington that a tour by a party of chemical warfare experts from Edgewood arsenal, Maryland, has been authorized and that other cities of the Pacific coast are making preparations for the reception of the party.

The demonstration as put on in several Eastern cities is exceedingly spectacular. A daylight demonstration will be staged in the afternoon, and a night display will probably be arranged, also. The afternoon display will probably be in the nature of mimic warfare, and will be arranged with the cooperation of the troops from Vancouver barracks.

FORMER MINISTER IS AGAINST SO-CALLED AUDITORIUM MISUSE

"We should protest against secular monkey performances in The Auditorium on Sunday evenings."

With this statement, the Rev. C. E. Cline, retired Methodist Episcopal pastor, Tuesday reiterated his request that the Portland Social Turnverein be denied use of The Auditorium next Sunday night, when an athletic program is scheduled.

"When I introduced a resolution Monday before the Portland Ministerial association, asking the city to revoke the permit granted the Turnverein for use of The Auditorium, I acted at the request of a number of other churchmen," Cline said today.

"The Turnverein was never distinguished for its piety, nor was it noted during the recent war for its loyalty. By that I do not mean that I have any particular offense against the local Turnverein, but all over the country during the war the Turnverein were subjected to strict governmental scrutiny."

"If they held their engagement in a hired building or in their own hall, I would not object. But The Auditorium was paid for by all of the taxpayers, and many of them protest against its use by such secular monkey performances."

F. S. Zeldhack, president of the Portland Turnverein, in a statement denies Cline's alleged imputations. "There never was any question during the war of our loyalty," he says. "Our performance is a commendable showing of athletic exercises, which develop physical and mental power."

Jail Declared Unsanitary
Pocatello, Idaho, March 2.—Pocatello jails are classed as dirty, insanitary and a relic of bygone days by the investigating committee of the Red Cross survey.

"A night spent in the city jail would perhaps make a permanent enemy of human society of any prisoner," Mrs. Henrietta Wyser, chairman of the committee says. Only 40 cents per day for two meals is inadequate, according to the committee.

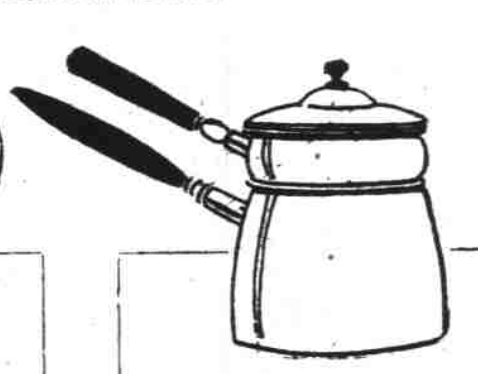

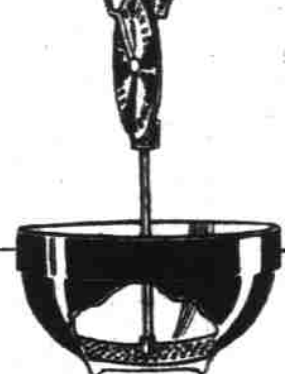
