

BAKER HAPPY WITH HEAVY SNOWFALL

Baker, March 3.—Snow that will probably be worth more than \$1,000,000 to Baker county has been falling throughout this district for 24 hours and at higher altitudes for 48 hours, piling as high as three feet in the hills and mountains.

Five inches of snow covered Baker's streets Tuesday evening. In the valley rain fell Monday upon thousands of acres of plowed ground both in the irrigated and dry land regions, and on the ranges the stockmen say that this moisture will be of vast benefit to the grass.

Each snowflake was welcomed by the farmers as though it were of silver, for not only has the agricultural industry of the county been threatened with destruction through drought, but winter wheat, which had all sprouted, lay exposed to danger of being killed by frosts. Now the ground is saturated with moisture and the tender grain shoots are protected, while the growing layer of snow in the mountains is increasing the supply of irrigation water in the streams, which had until now threatened to flow but little water next summer.

Hardly less jubilant than the farmers are the mine owners, for their ability to operate depends upon the water available for generating electricity and all mines in the Baker-Grant district are closed because power plants are limited to partial production.

Medford District Fruit Growers Enter State Association

Medford, March 3.—The Medford district of the Oregon Growers' Cooperative association was organized here Tuesday afternoon, with Howard Hill and Peter Guthrie of Medford and A. H. Davenport of Talent elected as the local executive committee. J. C. Edmonson of Gold Hill will be the field representative of the district.

C. I. Lewis and Seymour Jones of Salem and J. O. Holt of Eugene, prominent officers of the association, were present. The Rogue river and Evans creek section growers are in the Grants Pass district, which will be organized today. The Ashland section is not in the association as it has an association of its own. The total acreage of Jackson county in the association is now 5250, with 152 growers.

He Got in Way of His Company's Car

Astoria, March 3.—Arthur Dempsey, manager of the transportation department of the Pacific Power & Light company in this city, got in the way of one of his company's street cars Tuesday afternoon, and he and the Buick touring car which he was driving were bumped across the sidewalk, through the railing and 15 feet to the sands below. Dempsey escaped uninjured.

Masons at La Grande Will Add 2 Stories To Their Building

La Grande, March 3.—The Masonic Building association Monday purchased three lots adjoining a lot owned by the Masons on Main street from N. K. West and the E. M. O'Brien estate at a price of \$11,000. The association plans later to repair the present lodge rooms and to enlarge the building to three stories.

Teachers Are Given Voluntary Increase In Wage at Medford

Medford, March 3.—The board of Education has announced that, realizing adequate salaries must be paid teachers in the local public school, it has adopted the following increased schedule on the 12-month basis for next year: A minimum of \$1200 a year for teachers in the first six grades, a minimum of \$1350 a year for grades 7 and 8, and a minimum of \$1400 for teachers in the high school. Only instructors of standard qualifications and successful experience will be employed.

The precipitation for February of '22 of an inch for the Rogue River valley is the lightest with one exception, in the history of the weather bureau here, since 1889, the exception being February, 1913, when it amounted to only .10 of an inch. The deficiency for the past month was 3.5 inches. A deficiency to date of 4.06 inches in six months is shown. Much of last month's precipitation was due to snow.
