Precipitation has occurred over two large areas, one reaching from the morth Pacific coast to Nebracka, and the other embracing most of the territory east of the Mississippi river. Snow is falling in New York, Peonsylvania, and Eastern Tennessee. The weather is much colder in the Mississippi and Ohio valleys and lake region, the fall in temperature amounting to more than 30 degrees places.
