

LAST 12 MONTHS OF WILSON'S TERM MAY BE EVENTFUL

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Washington, March 5.—Seven years have gone by since the Wilson administration went into power. With the last year of his second term drawing to a close, it is natural that officials should "reminisce" into the future, as one of them expresses it. Who will be occupying the executive mansion one year hence? What hopeful, world-to-conquer spirit and freshness of touch will prevail as another administration sets forth in perplexing paths marked out by a trail of campaign pledges and promises?

Of one thing there seems little doubt: Woodrow Wilson will not be in the White House a year from now. Everybody, including his intimates, will be surprised if he makes an effort to run for a third term. Few would dare confide their belief that he did make the run, the third term tradition would defeat him, but that's the conviction of most of the Wilson people here. ASPIRANT IS "FOOL"

But Wilson himself once said something pertinent on this point to a delegation at the White House which attempted to browbeat him into accepting an opposite point of view by threatening not to vote for him again. He remarked more or less angrily that a "man is a fool who seeks the presidency of the United States." The remark caused very little comment at the time, but it is typical Wilsonian philosophy.

McAdoo has availed himself of the doctrine by refusing to sanction the use of his name in primaries. Hoover has been doing the same thing. The idea seems to be that the presidency is something which no man ought to seek personally, but which should come to him only when the people do the seeking. Wilson believed that he was sought after in 1916 by his party. Hughes was sought after by the Republicans in 1916.

BURDEN OF OFFICE GREAT
But the particular aspect which the president may have had in mind when he declared a man was a fool for his pains, if he sought the presidency, was in regard to the burden of the office.

Many a president has unquestionably exclaimed against the burden which he wished he never had entered public life. The controversies and the quarrels, the bitterness and the hatred, the constant browbeating—not merely of one's work but of one's personal character—the questioning of motive, the paucity of praise and plethora of attack, all this will mean in Woodrow Wilson's case at least a sigh of relief as he bows out the glass door of the White House 12 months hence and a new president bows in.

BATTLE-SCARRED MAN NOW
Possibly it was a prophesy of events a year away, possibly it was the knowledge that the president in winding up his term of office, looked the same physical vigor and enthusiasm of performance as when he entered upon his duties seven years ago, possibly it was the feeling that official life had exacted a terrible toll from the physique of another frail individual, but White House officials got a bit sentimental as they talked today of the future and the fateful March 4, 1921, when the change from the most powerful executive in the world to the retirement to private citizenship goes into effect.

Seven years have gone by—eventful, exciting, feverish, battle-scarred months with plenty of anguish, and, especially during the war period, full of awful responsibilities. The year that has followed the ending of the war has been with the president one of fatigue and reaction from the high tension of previous exertion.

CONCILIATION IS HIGH DUTY
Wilson took his first automobile ride this week. It is the first convincing sign of his return to health. The president has been out of personal touch for many months with the affairs on capital hill. Usually a departing president—Roosevelt was a typical case—winds up with a whirlwind of controversies with congress. Wilson is weak in health. His illness may have weakened him. Certainly if there was a time when the spirit of reconciliation could be applied for the common good it is the present. Wilson has forgiven political foes before and done business with them. One year is left. All Washington is wondering whether it will be merely a prolongation of the petty strife of the last 18 months or whether it will mean the beginning of a new era of fellowship in government.

Some hatreds are too deep to bury, but the side and the individuals taking the initiative in ending the epoch of hate in Washington will earn during the next year more prestige, political and personal, than can be derived from any abstract issue of achievement of government.

International Talk By Wireless Held Due in Six Months

London, March 5.—(I. N. S.)—Godfrey Isaacs, director of the Marconi Wireless company, today predicted that a telephone service would be established between London and New York within six months and that international con-



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versations would be plainer to the ear than local calls are at present.
"When our plans are perfected we will be able to get wireless connections with New York, Boston, Chicago, Washington and other cities almost instantaneously," said Isaacs. "This seems possible by the fact that the wireless speed is 200,000 miles per second. The cost of talking will be about 1 shilling (normally 25 cents) per minute. Within a year we will be talking with Melbourne, Australia, as easily as New York."

All Americans Are Arrested by Soviet

Christiania, March 4.—(U. P.)—All Americans and British found by Russian soviet forces in the Murmansk district have been arrested and sent to Moscow, a dispatch here today said. Soviet troops, the dispatch added, have occupied the town of Petschanga.

Bishop William F. Adams Dead
Easton, Md., March 5.—(I. N. S.)—Bishop William Forbes Adams, head of the Protestant Episcopal diocese of Maryland, died at his home in this city early today, at the age of 87 years. Death was due to pneumonia.

Three Convicted on Conspiracy Charges Against Government

Detroit, March 5.—(I. N. S.)—After a trial lasting three months, a jury late last night returned verdicts against Grant Hugh Browne, New York sportsman; Raoul Waterbury, former major in the United States army; and Soterious Nicholson, former United States army

captain, on charges of conspiracy to defraud the government and bribery. Fred C. Collin, Detroit; Bert Harris, New York; and Monroe Burdack of Albany, N. Y., were acquitted of the same charges. The jury recommended leniency in the case of Captain Nicholson.
The government charged that during May, 1915, Browne and others conspired with Waterbury and a lieutenant named Beamy to purchase quantities of army salvage at a price which would net hundreds of thousands of dollars' profit to the conspirators.

High Cost Problem Hits French Blow Of Staggering Kind

Paris, March 5.—The cost of living in France has jumped 50 per cent as a result of the passage of a law increasing by from 40 to 100 per cent the cost of transportation, railroad, subway and taxi fares, and the prices of gas, electricity, bread, refrigerated meat, postal rates and municipal taxes.

Economists estimate that the purchasing value of the franc, reduced four fifths since 1914, may be reduced still further as soon as the federal income tax, as yet unsettled, is enforced.

Bolsheviki Renews Offer to Take All Russ Reds in U. S.

Washington, March 5.—(I. N. S.)—The Russian soviet government today renewed its offer to take out of the country, without expense to the United States, all Russian citizens which this government deems undesirable.
The renewed offer came in the form of a letter to government officials today from Charles Reeb of New York, an attorney for the soviet government. He set forth that a similar offer, made in November to Secretary Lansing, has not even elicited a reply.
Soviet Russia will furnish the ship if Uncle Sam will give it clearance, place no restrictions on its provisioning and guarantee it would not be hampered en route.

Yank Correspondent Ousted by Mexicans

Laredo, Texas, March 4.—(U. P.)—Gerald Brandon, correspondent in Mexico City for the Los Angeles Times, was put across the border here today by two policemen, who escorted him from the Mexican capital to the international boundary line. Brandon was ousted on a charge of meddling in Mexican politics.
