## Idaho Democratic Meetings Are Set; First for June 15

Moscow, Idaho, March 6.—The Democratic state central committee of Idaho has selected Lewiston as the place for holding the convention to select delegates to the San Francisco national convention and fixed the date as June 15, five days before the national convention. This action was taken at the request of R. H. Elder, national committeeman for Idaho, in order that United States Senator Nugent could be present, as Elder said Nugent cannot come before that date. The number of delegates for Idaho, in order that the number fixed by statute for the national convention.

The latter convention, which nominates state, senatorial and congressional candidates, will be held at Oidaho Falls on the last Thursday in August and will have 100 delegates.

The feature of the convention was the address of State Chairman Jerome J. Day, millionaire mining man of Moscow.

## BERT HANEY FILES FOR SEAT IN BIG DEMOCRATIC MEET

Former United States District Attorney Declares for Continuation of Wilsonian Policies.

Salem, March 6.—Bert E. Haney of Portland, formerly United States district attorney for the Portland district, today formally entered the lists as a candidate for a seat in the Democratic national convention at San Francisco next June as a delegate from the state of Oregon at large.

In his nominating petition, filed with the secretary of state's office today, Haney declares his belief in "the theory of government taught by Thomas Jefferson" as furnishing "the only sound basis for the conduct of our government." He further declares that "the best interests of our people will be served by a continuation of the policies of the Wilson administration and that it is imperative that our government enter the League of Nations."

Mr. Haney gives no campaign slogan other than the declaration of principles upon which he stands as a candidate. He says, however, in reference to the question recently raised as to the instruction of delegates by the preferential expression given at the May election:

"I consider that if elected I will be morally bound by a vote of the people at the May election in the same manner and to the same degree as though I had filed my candidacy by petition signed by the requisite number of electors, instead of by declaration of candidacy, which latter plan I have followed in having my name placed on the ballot."

Dr. C. J. Smith of Portland, Democratic candidate for governor of Oregon six years ago, also wants a seat in the big conclave at San Francisco next June and filed his nominating petition for a place on the Democratic ballot as a candidate for delegate from the state at large, this morning. Smith's petition was filed on the regular printed form and contained neither platform nor slogan.

FIRST DISTRICT CANDIDATE  
At Wauch of Toledo filed today as a candidate for delegate to the Democratic national convention from the first congressional district. "Tour man is my man for president—let's elect him" will be the slogan under which Wauch will bid for support of the first district Democrats.

Edison I. Ballagh, Republican representative in the 1918-20 sessions of the state legislature from Columbia county, today filed his petition as a candidate for re-election. Ballagh's platform declares for "a change in the state highway system from Columbia county to the state highways will receive state aid."

S. L. Burnham, Republican of Enterprise, is also a candidate for re-election as state representative from the twenty-fourth representative district on a slogan of "Americanism, progress, economy" for the public and not for special interests.

Washington, March 6.—(U. P.)—Secretary Daniels today asked Congress for an appropriation of \$1,000,000 to construct a fleet landing place and a supply storehouse at San Diego, Cal., on land to be donated by the city.

"The activities," wrote Daniels, "already commenced in the vicinity of San Diego harbor render supply facilities at that point very necessary. Mare Island is too far away to serve the locality which, due to the dimensions of the fleet, will rapidly become an important naval center."

## Trade With Germany Is Beginning to Run Into Millions Again

Washington, March 6.—(U. P.)—Germany's import and export trade with the United States is beginning to run again into the millions of dollars, it was revealed today in figures made public by the department of commerce.

During January the United States exported \$15,517 worth of goods to Germany, as against nothing in January a year ago, while during January of this year the United States imported \$38,975 worth of merchandise from Germany, as against \$117 worth in January, 1919.

## O. A. C. CANDIDATES TO BE NOMINATED FOR STUDY IN SCANDINAVIA

\$1000 Fellowships Will Be Awarded by the American-Scandinavian Foundation.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, March 6.—President W. J. Kerr has asked to nominate candidates for \$1000 fellowships to be awarded for 1920-1921 by the American-Scandinavian Foundation, New York, to aid toward study in Sweden, Denmark and Norway.

"The funds to maintain these fellowships have been pledged by Americans who wish Scandinavians better to understand American ideals," the foundation notice reads.

Ten of the scholarships will be awarded for study in Sweden, five for Denmark and five for Norway.

Hubert E. Cosby of the Missouri state experiment station has been secured by the college as a research extension poultry specialist. He is expected to arrive soon to take up his new duties with headquarters at Corvallis. He will work in conjunction with the extension service among the farmers of the state. Cosby has had practical experience as manager of poultry farms and president of a poultry corporation of Hope, Ind., as well as extension work for the United States department of agriculture at the Missouri station.

Finishing 100 per cent strong, the co-ed club of the school, Hubbard Marion county, has filed its final report with H. C. Seymour, state club leader. It is the first club in the state to finish a project in boys' and girls' club work this year.

Seven girls composed the club, of which Violet Sanders is president; Verma Smith, vice president; Opal Smith, secretary, and Miss Florence B. Bierdaley, local club leader. Other members are: Hilda Kirkham, Hilord Morgan, Mildred Sanburn and Virginia Clinks.

Olivia B. Hayes, provincial instructor of household science, women's institutes, department of agriculture, Victoria, B. C., has signified her intention of attending the summer session of the college at Corvallis. Hayes is well known in her line of work. She will enroll as a regular student.

Montgomery, newly elected president of the Citizens National bank, was chosen to fill the vacancy in the directorate caused by the departure of B. A. Harder. A committee consisting of State Representative A. A. Smith, J. P. O'Brien, J. L. Rand, N. N. Elliott and Joseph Stoddard, was delegated to investigate all referendum measures now pending and report regarding the merits of the bills.

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Albany, Or., March 6.—Gale S. Hill, district attorney of Linn county, announced today that he will not be a candidate for reelection at the primaries in May. Hill was elected for his first term as district attorney on the Republican ticket in 1912. He was re-elected in 1916 and says that at the conclusion of the present term he will retire from public office and devote himself to his law practice. He is senior member of the firm of Hill & Marks.

So far there have been no announcements of any prospective candidates for the office of district attorney in Linn county.

Four teams will be selected from this number. Two teams will meet the co-eds of Willamette university in dual debate May 14. The other two teams will meet the University of Oregon during the second week of May.

It is possible that the debate with Oregon may be changed into a triangular affair to include either the University of Washington or Washington State college. This is the first time that the co-eds of the college have entered into intercollegiate debating. Several of the women have had experience in debates of other kinds.

Beautiful Shogren Home Near Mosier Damaged by Blaze

Mosier, March 6.—The beautiful home of the Misses May and Anne Shogren on the river road east of Mosier was damaged by fire, which started in the basement beneath the large fireplace. When discovered the big timbers and one covering of the flooring had burned through.

The small son of Mrs. George W. Hug of McMinnville, who is spending the winter with his aunts, the Misses Shogren, was awakened by a choking sensation caused by smoke, and told his mother, who immediately awakened the household. They managed to extinguish the flames without calling for outside help.

The damage to the home is estimated at several hundred dollars, is covered by insurance.

## SEVEN OFFERS FOR CLACKAMAS ROAD BONDS SUBMITTED

Three Tenders Received From Local Interests for First Part of \$1,700,000 Issue.

Oregon City, March 6.—Up to noon Saturday, the time set for the acceptance of bids for the first four blocks of bonds to be sold by Clackamas county of the total of \$1,700,000 voted November 24 for hard surfacing of roads and the erection of a new suspension bridge across the Willamette, seven sealed offers were in the hands of the county clerk, three, at least, offered by local interests, the Bank of Commerce of Oregon City, the State Grange, through State Master C. E. Spence, and H. C. Stevens, a local capitalist.

The bids are to be opened by the county clerk Tuesday, at 2 p. m. Preference is to be given citizens of Clackamas county. The bonds will be dated April 1, 1920, bearing interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, and of the denomination of \$500 each, and will be sold either in denominations of one bond or more of either blocks, for the whole block or for the whole issue. The amount of each block and the time when payable are as follows:

Sixty thousand dollars, due four years from date of issue; \$80,000 due five years from date of issue; \$70,000 due six years from date of issue; \$70,000 due seven years from date of issue.

Salem, March 6.—With only two months so far elapsed in 1920, receipts from fees for registrations in the automobile department of the secretary of state's office so far this year almost equal the total receipts from the same sources for the preceding six years.

According to a comparative statement issued today by Sam A. Koser, deputy secretary of state, receipts in the automobile registration department for January and February, this year, total \$1,489,544 as against a total of \$1,593,176 collected for the entire six years preceding under the old registration fees. The phenomenal increase in fees in this department is accounted for by the fact that this is the first year of the new licensing system, which involves material increases in the individual license fees.

Registrations for the first two months this year include 71,316 automobiles as against a total of 84,316 for the same period a year ago and a total of \$3,332 for the year 1919. A total of 9709 automobiles, 452 motorcycles, 41 dealers and 253 chauffeurs were registered during February, with registration fees aggregating \$206,858, as against total fees collected during February, 1919, of only \$38,796.60.
