

\$40,000 BUILDING TO BE CONSTRUCTED BY ARCHER & WIGGINS

A two-story brick and concrete building will be erected by Archer & Wiggins on the quarter block at the north-west corner of Park and Couch streets. Contracts have been let for the construction work, and operations will begin this week. The building will be 100x100 feet in dimensions. Exterior walls will be of brick, and interior walls of concrete. Estimated cost of the building is \$40,000. It will be completed by Archer & Wiggins as headquarters for their wholesale automobile and tire business.

Contracts have been let for the construction of a one story and basement warehouse to be built at East Second and Taylor streets for Mrs. George W. Simon. The building will be of mill construction, with brick walls, 100 by 100 feet in dimensions. It was designed to allow for the addition of a second story if desired. A gas heating plant and electric elevator service are included in the equipment. Cost of the building is estimated at \$30,000.

Shipping Board Is Apparently Slow in Sending Ships Here

Washington, March 10.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL)—Chairman Payne of the shipping board today made response to Senator McNary's request for information concerning allocations of ships for the Columbia river. It is disappointing, being a repetition of a previous general statement and containing the definite promise expected.

It says: "We are meeting the situation by a westbound dispatch of tonnage to the Pacific coast, having already ordered seven steamers recently and have arranged business that will move three large steamers each month during the next five or six months, to which will be added other occasionally, as the business can be arranged. This tonnage will be available for employment out of Pacific coast ports upon arrival, and I think it will meet the requirements satisfactorily. We are in close touch with Assistant Director Ebey and are watching the situation carefully." Payne yesterday told Senator McNary ships would go through in ballast from the Atlantic coast and promised definite data on what would be done, but written memorandum fails to confirm.

Priceless Radio Lost and Inventor Is Now Missing

Cambridge, Mass., March 10.—(I. N. S.)—Harold Sever, Harvard's "boy scientist" of two years ago, has disappeared, together with a priceless wireless invention in which the United States government is interested.

The boy inventor, who is 22, left his workshop in Valparaiso, Ind., for Chicago, early in February. He had with him all his plans and 200 pounds of apparatus representing his finished invention. He has not been seen since.

Word of Sever's disappearance was brought to Cambridge today by department of justice agents tracing his associations while at the Harvard radio school.

Refugees in Flight From South Russia Die by Thousands

Paris, March 10.—(I. N. S.)—One hundred thousand refugees from Southern Russia are on route to Constantinople, or have just arrived there, according to beated dispatches reaching Red Cross headquarters today from the Turkish capital. All the refugees are famine stricken, many are sick and all suffered intense hardships. Thousands perished on the way, some from exposure and others from starvation or pestilence.

College Bars Paper; Pictures Are Risque

Syracuse, N. Y., March 10.—The Orange Peel, one of the Syracuse university publications, was ordered suspended by Chancellor Day, because it contained pictures of chorus girls who had peeled off their stockings and other portions of their apparel. William J. Dalton, managing editor of the paper, was suspended. Allegations of indecency have been ordered to place responsibility for the publication.

Department Order Regulating Alien Travel Is Modified

Presidential order modifying requirements enabling an alien enemy to visit Europe was received Tuesday by the local immigration office. Heretofore, an alien enemy, in addition to his passport had to get an O. K. certificate from permit agents of the state department, which position was filled by immigration authorities.

Alien enemies under the new order are placed virtually on an equality with an American, Englishman or Frenchman in traveling in Europe. He need get only his passport and a certificate from the collector in internal revenue that he owes no income tax.

The order, however, applies only to European travel. O. K. certificates must still be obtained by Austrians and Germans who wish to travel elsewhere.

Dayton, Wash., March 10.—At the school election Saturday Clarke Israel was elected a director. A proposed increase in taxation to raise the pay of teachers next year will be taken up at a special election later.

Denies Ministerial Position Was Ever Offered Easterner

Stevenson declined, according to Ross. Since, he has not been considered or discussed here.

Daniels' Program Receives Approval Of House Members

Washington, March 9.—(U. P.)—Belief that congress will agree in the main to the recommendations made by Secretary Daniels for a strengthening of naval facilities on the Pacific coast was expressed today by members of the house naval committee and other members from the West.

Representative Kahn, California, declared it was one of the wisest recommendations ever made by Daniels and that the naval development on the Western coast already has been too long delayed. Representative Kettner, California, a member of the naval committee, said that all the increased facilities asked by Daniels should be granted. Representative Johnson, Washington, also approved the recommendations.

No Agreement Over Water Power Bill

Washington, March 10.—(I. N. S.)—Without reaching an agreement, the senate and house conferees on the water power bill adjourned Tuesday because of their being engaged with other legislation. They are not expected to meet again for at least two weeks.

Plant Pathologist Arrives for Duty

J. S. Boyce, pathologist of the bureau of plant industry office, who has been assigned to the district forester's office, arrived in Portland Tuesday from San Francisco. Boyce has been working under E. P. Melneke, the pine blister rust specialist in San Francisco, who has made numerous investigations in Oregon. Boyce will do investigative work and devise methods for the control of the principal forest fungi, which he will recommend to the forest service. The most important phase of his work is the study of those types of tree disease that cause decay in merchantable timber and in sawed lumber.

Water Shortage in Multnomah Falls Is Held Probable

Grave danger that Multnomah falls may not receive sufficient water within the next few months to assure its continuance as a beauty spot is expressed by C. P. Keyser, superintendent of parks, who spent Sunday on Larch mountain.

The deficiency at present amounts to 10.5 inches, says Keyser. Unless it comes evenly during the next few months, Multnomah falls may suffer badly. Keyser points out that the falls is fed by three small streams from the north side of Larch mountain. At present no snow can be found on the mountain at an elevation of 2000 feet. Ordinarily there is an abundance during April and May. No snow can be found now at Eagle Eyrie, where ordinarily three feet may be seen.

Multnomah Falls should be made a forest reserve. Kiwanis club members unanimously voted Tuesday at their regular weekly luncheon. The Oregon congressional delegation will be asked today to take appropriate action.

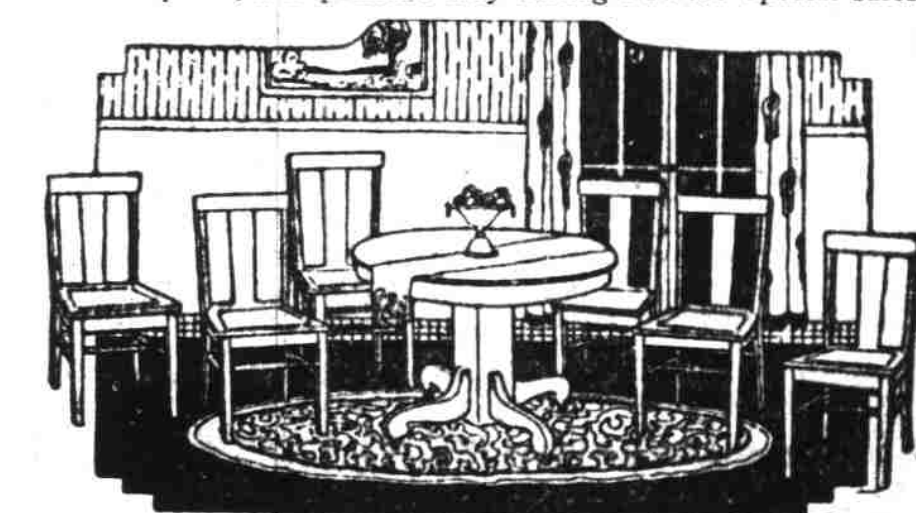
