WEATHER CONDITIONS

High pressure prevails east of the Mississippi and on the coast of the United States. The principal center of low pressure is apparently on the coast of Alaska; other centers are shown in Utah and Massachusetts. Precipitation has occurred generally on the Pacific slope and on the coast of the United States. The heaviest rainfall reported was 1.12 inches at Red Bluff, Cal. Colder weather prevails on the Pacific slope, with heavy to killing frost in parts of Northern California. Elsewhere the weather is generally milder, and the temperature is now above normal over the greater part of the country.

City Improvement to Be Discussed—Proposed development of the waterfront from between Jefferson and Gibson streets by the city will be discussed before the Portland Realty board at the weekly luncheon in the Tyrolean room of the Benson hotel Friday noon. O. Laurgaard, city engineer, and A. L. Barbur, city commissioner, will be the principal speakers. Assessed value of the property along the waterfront is in excess of one million dollars and its early purchase by the city is advocated by Laurgaard and other proponents of the scheme. Another feature of the Realty board program will be a talk by M. J. Childs on the increase in value of Portland real estate. Chester A. Moore of the F. E. Taylor company will be chairman of the day.

Charles Woodruff Honored—Forty Portland business men attended a complimentary dinner given in the Rose room of the Benson hotel Tuesday night in honor of Charles B. Woodruff, retiring manager of W. P. Fuller & Co., and his successor, P. C. Patterson. The dinner was tendered by the Portland Traffic and Transportation association, and Arthur H. Devers presided. Woodruff has been connected with the Portland house of the Fuller company since 1910 and has been manager of the concern for several years. He leaves here to become assistant manager at the San Francisco headquarters of the company. Patterson is a native of Oregon and has been employed in the local branch of the firm for several years.

Chinese Authority Speaker—Judge Peter Hing of Canton, China, is to be the speaker before the Progressive Business Men's club Thursday night at the Benson hotel. Hing is chairman of the club's program committee. He is also a "newspaperman" who is chief of the department of justice, head of a street railway system, and one of Canton's largest department stores and interested in mining, insurance and other business enterprises. Incidentally, for his revolutionary writings, he spent a great deal of his earlier life in various Canadian jails.

Colonel Miller to Speak—Milton A. Miller, collector of internal revenue, will address the Portland Press club at the regular weekly luncheon of the organization Thursday noon. He will give an "Optimistic view of present day problems in the light of American history." The luncheon will be held in the Tyrolean room of the Benson hotel. Heckling in moderation will be tolerated, according to the secretary of the club, and an interesting discussion of current issues is anticipated.

Girls' Classes Added—Three new courses are being offered at the Girls' Polytechnic school, two in salad making and one in cake making. The salad courses are held on Thursday, one in the afternoon and one in the evening. They include instruction in salad dressing, green vegetables, fish and meat, fruit and gelatin salad. The first meeting will be held Thursday. The cake course has already opened, but has room for more enrollments. It meets Tuesday and Thursday afternoons.

Dynamite Permit Issued—State Game warden Carl Shoemaker has issued a permit to the Portland Press club to use dynamite in the Tualatin river to remove snags and other obstructions to the running of logs in the stream. Permits are issued only in emergency cases, says Shoemaker, since the dynamite kills a number of fish. By disturbing the water, however, the fish in the immediate vicinity can be frightened away before the dynamite is exploded.

Forester Asks Bids—Assistant District Forester Fred Ames has advertised for bids on 2200 acres of government timber land at Cedar creek in the Colville national forest. The area comprises 9,470,000 feet of Douglas fir and Western larch, 65,250 feet Douglas fir and larch ties, and 7475 cords of cordwood. Prices asked are \$1.50 for the saw timber, 3 cents for 1 ties, 8 cents for No. 2 ties, and 35 cents a cord for the cordwood.

Miller to Speak—Milton A. Miller, collector of internal revenue, will speak at the Press club luncheon to be given Thursday at the Benson hotel, in the Tyrolean room, at 12:15. Miller gives as his topic "An Optimistic View of Present Day Problems." Friends and members of the Press club are invited to attend.

To Discuss "Healing"—"The Church's Ministry of Healing" is Dr. McElven's topic at his Thursday evening lecture at the First Congregational church. He will discuss the work of Hickson and indicate how that work differs from Christian Science, New Thought and other healing cults. The church auditorium will be used.

Police Nab Missing Boy—William Smierne, 18 year old Bay City boy, came to Portland to see the city. But his parents had reported his absence, so patrolmen gathered him in last night. He will be sent home.

Fire Ruins Family—Fire at 1444 Macadam road routed C. H. Rowland and his family out of bed at 12:30 a. m. today. Damage is about \$500. Rowland doesn't know how the fire started.

Timber Tract Sold—The Eagle Lumber company recently completed the

purchase of a tract of approximately 920 acres of timber land in Washington county from the Western Timber company. The tract is said to cruise about 50,000,000 feet of fir and the price is given at \$150,000. The land lies in the vicinity of Timber on the Tillamook branch of the Southern Pacific. The Eagle Lumber company has a mill near the tract and logging operations are now under way.

Logger Fatally Hurt—Arthur M. Burch, a logger, was fatally injured Monday in an accident at the Big Creek Logging company, Knappa, according to word received in Portland Tuesday night. The body was brought here for burial. Burch was working on a logging train and fell between two cars, both arms being severed. Burch was about 30 years of age. His wife resides in Seattle. His discharge papers show that he was mess sergeant in Company B, Eighty-first engineers. Two other men were injured at the same time, but their injuries are not considered fatal.

Lieman's Condition Serious—Rex R. May, striking lieman, who was injured in a fight with A. W. Bennett, a non-union lieman, is still in a serious condition according to reports received from Good Samaritan hospital this morning. May received a fracture at the base of the skull. The fight took place in the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company garage, East Seventh and Pine streets. May is reported to be unconscious most of the time. Bennett is held by the police in default of \$1000 bail.

Charge Is Dismissed—Charges of driving an automobile while intoxicated were dismissed against Eugene Pearl, a salesman, this morning in the municipal court, when he proved to the court that he was not driving the automobile that was struck by a St. Johns streetcar Tuesday night at Broadway and Burnside streets. Pearl was fined \$20 on a drunkenness charge. Police now have been informed that a woman was driving the machine.

Held to Grand Jury—Ralph Bruno, confessed burglar, Richard Barron, alias Troy, alias "Wisconsin Dick," waived a preliminary hearing Tuesday in the municipal court and was held to answer to the grand jury by Judge Roseman. Bruno shot and almost instantly killed Barron Saturday night at Third and Harrison streets, following an argument over Bruno's former wife.

Alleged Red Arrested—Byrd Kelen, 28 years of age, was arrested by the police Tuesday night charged with violation of the syndicalism law. The officers say he is Portland agent for an I. W. W. paper. He will be given a hearing this afternoon in the municipal court.

Sustains Broken Ankle—F. E. Hartzell of Milwaukee suffered a broken ankle while at work at 4 a. m. today when struck by a piece of flying steel. He was working in a Milwaukee shop according to a report from St. Vincent's hospital.

Drama League to Meet—At an open meeting of the Drama League at 8:30 tonight, C. R. Gray of Reed college will read John Drinkwater's "Abraham Lincoln." The meeting will be held in room B, Central library.

Youths Are Arrested—Inspector B. F. Smith arrested High Coffey, 17, and Tom Henderson, 15, Tuesday, and charged them with stealing bicycles. They were turned over to the juvenile court.

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Sophs Psychologically Best U. of O. Test Results Given

University of Oregon, Eugene, March 10.—Results of the journalism psychology test, prepared by Professor Max Freyd of the University of Washington, show the sophomore class answered most satisfactorily the questions put to them in the test.

Test of accurate observation and memory after observing a picture for about a minute resulted in nine students making record answers. Miss Uida Baskler of Bremerton, Wash., was the only woman in the nine.

In the proofreading test, demonstrating watchfulness and knowledge of spelling, 12 students succeeded in finishing with unusual speed and accuracy. In ability to distinguish quickly and accurately between synonyms Miss Ruth

Austin of Woodburn led, with 14 others making good records. Nine students did good work in the judgment of news value test, while the strong verbal memory test resulted in only four students making good averages.

In the good judgment as to what to do in a crisis test, 14 students qualified. In making up words from given letters, as in anagrams, seven journalism majors made high marks, while in the test of thinking up synonyms quickly four students were particularly adept.

Professor Freyd has admitted that time allowed for the tests is too small. A revised test, in which the element of luck is not so great, has been suggested by the University of Oregon journalism department.

announcement this morning by Dr. T. L. Perkins, chairman of the campaign committee. The entertainment consisted of musical and vaudeville numbers, partly local talent, partly headliners from current attractions, all contributed to aid the meritorious cause. There were no expenses in connection with the performance. The use of The Auditorium was donated and the government remitted the war tax on the tickets. Ticket sales were in charge of a group of public spirited women.
