Y.W.C.A. Seeks Only Yearly Budget

THE Portland Young Women's Christian association today announced it would go out for only its yearly budget of \$40,000, postponing its proposed building campaign for funds for a boarding home and recreational center for working girls.
The association points to its work in girl problems for over 40 years.
The Portland Y. W. C. A. never turns away a girl for lack of money, say its officers. The employment department last year secured work for more than 3000 girls and women. A room in the association building can be had at 35c a night. More than 7000 girls were housed last year, 2000 of whom were without funds. The travelers' aid, industrial department and cafeteria are among the things the Y. W. C. A. is featuring in Portland.

Special Election Is Called to Decide On Port of Kalama

Kalama, Wash., March 13.—A special election has been called by the county commissioners of Cowlitz county for Wednesday to vote on the proposed organization of a port of Kalama.
The proposed port district includes about nine miles of frontage along the Columbia river extending from a point in front of Carrolls on the north to a point in front of Martins Bluff on the south, and eastward to the county line. About 250 square miles of territory is embraced and the total valuation of all taxable property is about \$1,500,000.
Three commissioners' districts are outlined for in the election notice as follows: North Kalama precinct, to comprise district No. 1; South Kalama precinct, to comprise district No. 2, and all the remainder of the port district to comprise commissioners' district No. 3. A port commissioner for each district will be elected.
The first contemplated port improvements will be the betterment of shipping facilities for the farmers and general public by the construction of a public dock and warehouse at the foot of Fir street in Kalama.
