

SKULL FRACTURED WHEN HIT BY CAR AND HE DIES LATER

Max H. Servis, a student of the North Pacific Dental college, died five hours after he was struck early Sunday morning by a taxicab, driven by P. C. Hall at Ella and Washington streets. His skull was fractured.

Hall, a driver for the Broadway Auto Service company, was arrested when he reported the accident six hours after it occurred. He is held for investigation, with bail set at \$1000.

Servis' death was the second traffic fatality in Portland within 15 hours. The other was in the death of Mrs. Amelia Newbury, aged 46, of Acosta, Wash., who was struck by a taxicab, driven by Charles Wheatley at Sixth and Flinders streets, at 7:30 Saturday night. She died three hours later at St. Vincent's hospital. Wheatley is being held in default of \$1000 bond on charge of reckless driving.

LANE WAS NOT WORKING
Fifty-five accidents were reported for Saturday, with a number of casualties besides the two fatalities. Twenty-five accidents for Sunday had been reported at noon today.

Driving in the rain, with his right front lamp burned out, Hall stated he was going east on Washington street about 15 or 18 miles an hour. He says he saw Servis crossing the street at the intersection of Ella and Washington streets, just where Morrison street comes into Washington street. He says he blew his horn, but Servis did not look around.

Servis was apparently going down Morrison street, Hall told Deputy District Attorney Deich. Suddenly, without warning, Hall said, Servis turned, as if he had changed his mind, starting down Washington street and stepping directly in front of the machine. Hall stated he attempted to avoid hitting the man.

LEARN OF MAN'S DEATH
Two pedestrians assisted him in placing Servis in his machine. Hall carried the two men with him to the hospital, he told Deich.

Returning to his stand at Broadway and Morrison, he continued his work. At 4:30 a. m., according to Deich, Hall came to the police station to report a minor accident he had had at 11:30 Saturday night at Milwaukee avenue and Powell street. He did not mention the other accident at this time, Deich stated.

Later he was advised by his associates to report the accident, and coming to the police station at 6 a. m., he learned that Servis had died a few minutes before.

THREE ORPHANED CHILDREN
Servis is survived by his father, mother and sister of Snohomish, Wash., who arrived in Portland Sunday night. Deputy District Attorney Deich, who investigated the accident which caused the death of Mrs. Newbury, stated that no action would be taken in either case until after the coroner's inquest.

The inquest to inquire into the death of Mrs. Newbury was announced for tonight at 8 o'clock. Servis' death will be investigated by the coroner's jury at 9 o'clock tonight.

The three orphan children of Mrs. Newbury, who were en route with her to California, were kept by the woman's protective bureau until the arrival of their uncle, Frank Noble of Hilo, Sumner, night.

S. O. Betzel was taken to the Good Samaritan hospital following an accident between a machine driven by his brother, A. Betzel, 124 East Eighteenth street, and an automobile driven by C. Skinner, twenty-third and Thurman streets, at the intersection of Seventeenth and Glisan streets at 10 o'clock Sunday morning.

Betzel sustained severe bruises and lacerations. His brother was thrown across the curb.

Jim Gannon, 1834 Fourth street, was struck by a machine running along Fourth street between Morrison and Yamhill, Sunday. He was taken to the Emergency hospital, where it is reported he is suffering from a badly bruised foot. Gannon reported to Patrolman Spivey that he failed to get the number of the machine, which contained two young men. The men gave him \$2, he said, telling him to get a doctor.

AUTO WRECKED BY STREETCAR
E. A. Horton of 815 East Clay street reported to the police that his automobile was struck by a streetcar at East Sixty-fourth street and Sandy boulevard. The streetcar did not have a headlight burning, he said. The left side of the auto was wrecked.

L. E. Gotshall of 314 East Forty-eighth street reported his auto struck by another auto at East Forty-eighth and Hawthorne. Driver of other machine did not stop. Gotshall ran up on the sidewalk and broke plate glass window in a store.

The motorman-conductor on an Irvington car is said by C. D. Meyer to have been too busy to watch traffic. Meyer's auto was hit by the car at Thirteenth and Jefferson streets. Meyer resides at 483 1/2 Jefferson.

DRIVER RUNS AFTER ACCIDENT
Harry Samuelson of Hilldale had an accident with auto 574 A at Chapman and Taylor streets. Samuelson says in his report that the boy driving the dealer's car jumped out and ran after the accident. The machine is registered to H. Burness, 628 Holly street. Patrolman Rockwell interviewed Burness, who said his brother, James, had taken the auto out. The traffic department will make a further investigation, if the accident is not reported.

SOUND YEGGERS ARE SUSPECTED IN LOCAL ROBBERIES

Crackmen who have recently been working in Seattle and Tacoma, and for whom police along the Pacific coast have been searching, are suspected in the robbery Sunday of laundries at about \$400 in checks. Sledge hammers were used to open both safes.

Sledge hammer yeggs early Sunday morning battered a window of the Oregon Laundry company, 54 East Sixth street, with a rock, gained entrance to the office and there poked the safe with sledge until the lock gave way. They secured \$47 in checks. The night watchman said he did not hear the racket made by the thugs probably because of the roaring of the wind.

The manager of the laundry said the gang was just a few hours too late to make a good sized haul. Early Saturday he took \$1200 from the safe and deposited it in the bank.

Early today proprietors of the Imperial Laundry, 755 Russell street, discovered that their place had been entered sometime over Sunday, the safe cracked, and an unknown amount of money, believed to be more than \$300, stolen.

The robbers gained entrance to the Imperial by unhooking a place of canvas that protected a window whose glass was recently broken. Because the safe could be seen from the street, they rolled it into a back room, wrapped it with sheets and other clothing to deaden the sound, and then with sledge hammers knocked off the combination. They finished the job by smashing the lock.

NOSKE HEADS ARMY BOUND FOR BERLIN

reaching London at 1:30 o'clock this afternoon following fight had broken out in Berlin.

According to a dispatch from The Hague, based on late reports received in that city from Berlin, Imperial Chancellor von Kapp's revolutionary troops now control only the government buildings that were seized Saturday morning.

Paris, March 15.—(I. N. S.)—Fifty persons have been killed at Kiel and 30 at Essen in fighting between rival German factions, according to a dispatch to The Journal from Berlin today.

Eighty persons were wounded at Essen in addition to the killed, the dispatch added. (Essen is the seat of the Krupp works.)

**WESTERN GERMANY DIVIDED
IN LOYALTY TO NEW REGIME**
Frankfurt, Germany, March 15.—(U. P.)—The counter-revolution is meeting with varying success in Western Germany, according to unofficial reports received here today.

The old government has been defeated in several cities, following bloody fighting, it was said.

Forces loyal to the Ebert administration were said to have been compelled to retire from Schwelm. At Weimar, the new government also was said to have been victorious. The counter-revolutionary flag is flying over barracks in Muhlheim and a volunteer corps is supporting the Von Kapp regime.

A workmen's council, apparently owing allegiance to neither the Ebert nor Von Kapp governments, assumed power in Bochum and disarmed the inhabitants.

Following declaration of a general strike in Hanover, workmen and students engaged in a sanguinary battle. The students occupied the railway buildings.

Herr Metcker, under orders of Ebert, will go to Berlin and summon Von Kapp to reestablish the constitutional regime. It was reported here.

**VON KAPP ORDERS RELEASE
OF COUSIN OF EX-KAISER**
Paris, March 15.—(U. P.)—Dr. Von Kapp, dictator of the revolutionary government, has ordered the release of Prince Joachim, the former Kaiser's cousin, the dispatch said. Joachim was held in the incident of March 6, when two French officers were attacked in the restaurant of the Hotel Adlon because they refused to stand when the orchestra played a German patriotic song.

The French government, it was learned, will recognize no government in Germany that does not have the approval of the national assembly, presumably established by the deposed Ebert government.

France has decided upon this stand, it was said, despite the fact that Herr Mayer, the German chargé d'affaires here, acting under instructions from Von Haniel, in Berlin, notified the French foreign office that the revolutionary government intends to fulfill all Germany's obligations with the allies.

The French war office today was preparing to double the number of its effective troops. Three army corps now are at Weissenburg. New units are being raised. The Saar basin troops will be reinforced.

A Munich dispatch says that Herr Hoffman has resigned after appointing General von Mosch, high commissary for Upper Bavaria. Army officers are demanding a military dictatorship, the dispatch said.

**FRENCH GENERAL IS DENIED
CONFERENCE BY NEW REGIME**

Berlin, March 15.—(I. N. S.)—General Nollet, head of the French military mission in Berlin, attempted four times on Sunday to confer with the new heads of the government, but was refused permission.

Many agitators have been arrested. The government is showing the "iron fist" and announced that all public utility employees who went on strike would be arrested for high treason.

"RIVERS OF BLOOD"
A foreign office official declared "there would be rivers of blood if a general strike is attempted, as the soldiers are being to begin shooting." Despite the threat, the Imperial chancellor dissolving all Prussian assemblies, Konstantin Fehrenbach has issued a call for a meeting of the old Reichstag in Stuttgart on Wednesday.

Herr Ebert is sending to the old government officials in Berlin urging them to accept no orders from the new regime and to pay out no money, but the messages were intercepted.

BRYAN PLANS TO TALK POLITICS ON TOUR OF COUNTRY

Palm Beach, Fla., March 15.—William Jennings Bryan, according to friends with whom he has lately conferred, is ambitious to head the Democratic national ticket this fall, and failing that, to control the San Francisco convention and name the candidate for the presidency.

This view is confirmed by an interview obtained from Mr. Bryan last night on board a train on his way to Washington, where he is to arrive tomorrow morning, as well as by the announcement made last night from Lincoln, Neb., that he would be willing to consider the nomination for the presidency under certain circumstances.

"I am starting on a tour that will include Washington, New York, Boston, Indiana, Illinois, Nebraska and Los Angeles," said Mr. Bryan on the train in response to an inquiry regarding his plans.

"My first speech will be made at a dinner tendered me in New York next Friday by my Democratic friends. I will be out in Nebraska, where I am a candidate for delegate, in a party for the primaries on April 20, and then I am going to California."

"Is this to be a political campaign?" "Well, I am going to talk politics. Some of my engagements are for lectures, others are not. I am going to discuss national issues and candidates for the presidency who have announced themselves as such."

**GERMAN ARMY WOULD START
NEW WAR WITH BOLSHIEVITS**
Berlin, March 14.—The German revolutionary government plans to fight Bolshievism to the death. If the allies will allow it, the German militarists will begin an offensive against the soviet in May.

General Baron von Luetwitz, revolutionary military dictator, announced this in an interview today.

"I have 7000 troops at my disposal in Doberwitz and Berlin," said the de facto minister of defense.

"I shall use machine guns against general strikes if necessary."

"We want more than 100,000 men, and if permitted by the entente, we shall fight Bolshievism and begin an offensive against Russia in May."

**KAPP IS PROMISED SUPPORT;
FLEET DOES NOT JOIN REBELS**
London, March 15.—(U. P.)—A news agency dispatch from Berlin says the conservatives, nationalists and liberals have agreed to support Dictator von Kapp's proposed government. The appointment and election writs issued within 30 days.

The German fleet, contrary to earlier reports, did not go over to the revolutionaries, it was learned this afternoon. Belief was expressed that order will soon be restored at Frankfurt and Dusseldorf, as they are close to the district held by the allied armies of occupation.

General von Luetwitz, minister of defense in the revolutionary government in Berlin, declared in an interview that the revolution will be suppressed, the revolutionaries using machine guns if necessary, a Berlin dispatch said today.

**FEELING AGAINST JEWS IN
GERMANY REPORTED INTENSE**
Paris, March 15.—A sudden anti-Semitic movement of extreme violence throughout Germany is reported early tonight from a reliable source via Basel, Switzerland.

The theory of the counter revolution theorists to be accompanied by pogroms.

A "holy war" against the Jews has been preached openly and systematically by a group of nationalist meeting for a fortnight.

J. Kahn, elder son of a prominent banker of Baden-Baden, was shot dead yesterday in the street by a crowd of students after an anti-Semitic meeting.

Premier Calls Meeting
Paris, March 15.—(I. N. S.)—Premier Millerand has telegraphed to Premier Lloyd George and Premier Nitti suggesting a special meeting of the supreme council for an exchange of views on Germany.

If the developments warrant, the conference may be held in Paris on Wednesday or Thursday to outline a new allied attitude towards Germany.

Bernstorff to Confer
London, March 15.—(I. N. S.)—Count von Bernstorff, former German ambassador to the United States, has left Berlin for Stuttgart to attempt new negotiations with Herr Ebert, president of the old German government, and Herr Bauer, the chancellor.

**3 Held for Having
Big Dynamite Cache
Will Be Sentenced**

John Wemmer, Charles Bonier and Mathew Anderson appeared before Municipal Judge Roessman Saturday afternoon for sentence, but after hearing the statements of the attorney for the state, agreed to defer sentence until next Thursday. The three were arrested as suspects in the Montavilla streetcar holdup. After their arrest the police found a large cache of dynamite and nitro-glycerine concealed in a barn near East Twenty-eighth and Mall streets.

The police, district attorney and judge have endeavored to make the accused tell what they did to do with the explosive, but so far without success.

The attorney for the defendants told the court he was getting out of patience with them and that they did not talk by Thursday he would not appear for them when court passed sentence. The police believe the accused can give information that will be of value in catching other criminals.

**Work to Commence

During This Week**

Construction work on the new Labor Temple to be erected at the southwest corner of Fourth and Jefferson streets, was started today. The contract was signed Friday afternoon and calls for an expenditure of approximately \$250,000. The building is to be of brick and reinforced concrete, 100 by 150 feet in dimensions and four stories in height.

A large auditorium will occupy the first floor. The second and mezzanine floors will be used for office purposes, and the third and fourth floors will be divided into halls for the accommodation of the various labor organizations.

Bids for the building were opened last December and the lowest bidder, the contract was held up pending the sale of bonds which has now been completed.

**Carsner Candidate
For Representative
In 28th District**

R. J. Carsner of Spray is a candidate for the Republican nomination to the house of representatives from the twenty-eighth district, consisting of Gilliam, Sherman and Wheeler counties. Mr. Carsner is a sheep and cattle grower who, during the past 10 years, has built up large holdings both in land and livestock in Eastern and Central Oregon.

The district which he seeks to represent in the legislature has two representatives apportioned to it, which places are now held by James S. Stewart and A. M. Wright, the latter being a candidate to succeed himself.

Minott wants to graduate unfettered—and besides, he's coming to Portland this summer, probably to enter business.

Believes Himself Immune
Eastham has expressed himself as confident that the laws of Oregon cannot touch him for his part in the attempted rape of the initiative law.

"I did not set his 'fee' for killing the proposed measure until he had ascertained to a moral certainty that the measure would be ruinous to financial interests of the state. PLAN IS UNFOLDED
The attorney had his campaign plans carefully mapped out to achieve his purpose and shield the perpetrators.

"What I want to do," said Eastham, "is to get the newspapers to talking about the bill. We have to work up some excitement and get the bankers fearful that the initiative measure will carry. After that he can be told that it would be to their advantage to see me."

The price is somewhat higher than I had expected to get in the beginning," the attorney declared. "My attention has been called to many important effects of the law, if it should pass, and the amount of my fee to the banks will be \$20,000."

Of that amount Eastham was to take \$10,000 and "take care of Albright." Eastham's personal record is made clear by his own statements. Albright's record is outlined on police court docket in Oregon City, as well as upon the minute book of the Oregon City council, where, under date of March 3, 1917, the story of his expulsion from that body is noted, with the following charges:

ALBRIGHT IS OUSTED
"Heretofore on various occasions J. F. Albright, a member of the city council, has appeared at council meetings in an intoxicated condition . . . the said Albright has on different occasions been arrested and found guilty of violating city ordinances here and elsewhere by the conduct of the said Albright has been such that it has become the duty of this council to take official notice thereof and to take such action as in their judgment the case demands."

Eight members of the council of which Albright was the ninth member voted "aye" on the question of his expulsion. Albright did not attend the meeting.

SHOOTING TRAGEDY VICTIM IS BELIEVED PORTLAND WOMAN

Denver, March 15.—(I. N. S.)—Helen Smith, believed by police to be Miss Lillian Erickson, daughter of Mrs. Abbie Morris of 508 Alder street, Portland, Or., is dead today, and John Kowalik, a Bulgarian, recently discharged from the United States army, is held by police on a charge of homicide.

Kowalik is suffering from a bullet wound from the same revolver used in the slaying of the girl, police say. He will probably recover. The shooting, which occurred in a downtown hotel Sunday, is thought to be the result of a lover's quarrel, as letters found in the girl's effects indicated she had known Kowalik for some time.

Lillian Erickson met John Kowalik, alias Jim Stakoff, in Green River, Wyo., where she worked in a restaurant and he conducted a poolroom, according to Mrs. Guy Wooding, 61 Seventeenth street, sister of the dead girl.

"Lillian visited mother and me during Christmas, and I remember having heard her mention the man's name," she said.

Mrs. Wooding believes jealousy prompted the killing.

The girl two years ago married Robert Erickson, a railway man. About a year later they separated, and since then Mrs. Wooding has heard little of her sister's whereabouts. Three weeks ago she received a letter from Denver, but it did not say what Lillian was doing or why she was there.

Before her marriage she was Miss Lillian Lowry. At various times she has used the name "Helen Smith," but why Mrs. Wooding does not know. She was 20 years of age on February 1.

Her mother is Mrs. M. A. Morse, 618 East Twenty-fifth street.
