

SALT LAKE COMPANY CHARGES CONSPIRACY TO DEFEAT CONTRACT

Conspiracy to cheat him of the fruits of a contract he had made to sell the entire output of the Adams Brothers' mill interests at Elgin, Or., is charged by the Salt Lake company of Salt Lake in a suit filed today in United States district court.

On September 12, 1919, the Burton company alleges, it entered into contract with the Oregon concern to distribute its box shooks, and other finished lumber products. It booked orders worth more than \$45,000, and was ready to sell in Colorado, Wisconsin, Utah and many other states.

Grover A. Rebenbach was employed by the plaintiff, it is alleged, and thus learned of the plans for widespread sale of the defendants' products. He left his employers, it is said, and became a partner in the Elgin concern with Leonard and William Adams.

With a view to sidestepping the original contract, it is charged, the Elgin concern on March 3, 1920, filed articles of incorporation in Salem, which would probably make impossible fulfillment of the contract with the Burton company. Defendants on March 23 will appear before Federal Judge Wolverton and show cause why the contract should not be continued.
