

BONDING BILL FOR RECLAMATION NOT YET SATISFACTORY

Washington, March 16.—(WASH-INGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL.)—Senator McNary's last reclamation bonding bill, framed, as he has stated, in the hope that it might avoid some or all the objections of the treasury department to the earlier draft introduced about the time the Western governors were here, has been no more successful than its predecessor in passing review by the treasury.

Since the first bill was reported there is a new secretary of the treasury, David F. Houston, succeeding Carter Glass. A communication received by Senator McNary from Secretary Houston reiterates the adverse view of Secretary, now Senator, Glass. Houston says:

"I regret to have to advise the committee that the treasury emphatically disapproves of the financial features of the bill, for substantially the same reasons set forth in Secretary Glass' letter to you of January 26. As you will appreciate from Secretary Glass' letter, the fundamental objection to this bill, as to the previous bill, is that it imposes upon the treasury of the United States the burden of financing reclamation projects, but attempts to avoid the appearance of making a direct appropriation by authorizing the secretary of the treasury to sell certificates of indebtedness to provide the funds required for the purposes of the bill.

OBLIGATIONS ARE PROPOSED
"I may add that under the proposed bill the secretary of the treasury would be obliged to issue obligations called 'certificates of indebtedness,' with maturities running from 10 to 25 years, although under existing law and practice the secretary of the treasury does not issue certificates of indebtedness of a maturity greater than one year, and longer borrowing is done by the issue of bonds or notes."

It is observed that Secretary Houston makes no comment upon the proposed policy of spending \$250,000,000 for reclamation, and makes the point that the form of the bill cloaks the appropriations which would be required. Secretary Glass, in his earlier report, said that a direct appropriation should be made if Congress desired to pursue the policy.

It is because of the known difficulty, if not impossibility, of securing from Congress the authority for direct appropriation that the representatives of western states, who have in January, decided to back a bonding bill. The bonding proposal now seems to be a hurdle of about equal dimensions, although bonding propositions are being urged with great earnestness in other directions, notably by those favoring a bonus for soldiers.

Reclamation is considered by many to have an intimate relationship with the question of aiding the soldiers, as they say that the best form of aid would be to offer the soldiers land, on easy terms, such as proposed in the Mondell bill.

VETERANS ARE OPPOSED
This immediately meets the objection by some of the soldier organization representatives, who say that large numbers of soldiers do not want to "fight another battle with the land." Yet the soldier settlement plan is one of the alternatives presented by the American Legion committee, and it was at their request that Representative Sinnott introduced the Mondell bill over again the other day, so soldier representatives may appear before the ways and means committee in favor of it as one of the things that will meet in part the wishes of the soldiers.

Flood Washes Away Eagle Creek Bridge

The Eagle creek bridge has disappeared. Placidly the waters flow along as though no bridge had ever existed at the camp grounds. The assumption is that the high waters the first of the

year washed it into the Columbia river. This is the second year the bridge has been washed out and forest service officials are considering the erection of a suspension bridge which will be unaffected by high water.

Infant Care Will Be Lecture Subject By Doctor Ramsey

The child welfare committee of the Social Workers' association will hold a special meeting in room 520, courthouse, Thursday evening, at which Dr. Walter R. Ramsey, associate professor of pediatrics at the University of Minnesota, will speak on the "Modern Care of Infants."

During the war Dr. Ramsey inaugurated a scheme for coordinating the child welfare work in France, which has been a great benefit to the work in that country.

Plans Formulated For Big Electrical Parade Shrine Week

Plans for the electrical parade to be given during Shrine convention week in June through the joint efforts of the Shrine and the Rose Festival association were worked out at a meeting Monday afternoon. Peter Traglio and George L. Hutchin, who are competing for the contract for building floats, are submitting their plans.

The general committee for the 1920 Shrine convention, in the Gasco building, has received word that the Saladin temple at Grand Rapids is putting on a musical and minstrel show to make money to pay the expenses of its patrol and band to the Portland convention.

Hoover Is Freed of Party for Primary

Sacramento, Cal., March 15.—(U. P.)—In a telegram sent from here today to the East, Secretary of State Frank Jordan ruled that Herbert Hoover need not state his party to get on the California presidential primary ballot.

Klamath Business Men Favor Federal Loan to Indians

Klamath Falls, March 16.—Business men of Klamath Falls have endorsed a resolution, by request of the tribal council of the Klamath Indians and of Walter G. West, superintendent of the Klamath reservation, asking Congress to appropriate \$2,000,000 for an immediate loan to the Indians, reimbursable to the government when timber lands on the reservation are sold.

Otis Elevator Co. Awards Contracts For \$30,000 Block

Contracts have been let for the construction of a one-story brick building at 14 Tenth street, near Everett, for the Otis Elevator company. The building will be 50 by 100 feet in dimensions and will cost approximately \$30,000. Announcement is also made that Parker & Banfield will erect a one-story building, costing \$10,000 at East Third and Davis streets. The building will be 100 by 100 feet.
