

RUSSIA REPORTED INDIGNANT OVER POLISH DEMANDS

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Moscow, March 16.—(Delayed.)—There are two certainties in the situation in Russia at present. One is that the soviet government and the whole of Russia is longing for peace in order to start at last on the work of rebuilding the country. The other is that the Polish demands are arousing widespread indignation which with Polish aggression would inevitably lead to a new war.

When the semi-official Polish reply to the soviet government's peace proposal became known everybody asked, "Is Poland bluffing or is that what she really wants?" Indeed Poland, say the soviet leaders here, demands the frontiers of 1772, a protectorate over all the nations of the former Russian empire and indirectly a change of regime in Russia. Each of these demands is looked upon as challenge to Russia and the specter of war is once more looming over the country.

I had an excellent opportunity to observe the effect of the Polish demands on nonpolitical Russia. In Petrograd for several days I came in close contact with many Russian intellectuals, scientists, artists, writers and representatives of trade and industry. The first question I was asked wherever I went was about the prospect for peace and the second was to whether Po-

land's warlike attitude was serious or merely a bluff. It is quite evident that if Poland insists on her demands she will meet the opposition of a united Russia. Maxim Gorky, who is recognized as the spiritual head of intellectual Russia, told me that his friends among the scientists, writers and representatives of trade and industry were convoking a great meeting in Petrograd on the Polish question. They would, he said, send Poland this message of brotherly warning:

"The new Russia, intellectual and free Russia, deprecates the wrongs done to Poland and is ready to redress them in friendly cooperation but admonishes Poland not to attempt in turn to wrong Russia. Russia needs peace and needs it for constructive work alone. Reconstructed Russia will be fit to help all her neighbors and Poland most of all. Russia is ready to pay a price for peace but will never permit Poland to intervene in Russian internal affairs or assume the role of protector over Ukraine or other peoples of the former Russian empire who are striving for independence. Sincerely and without cavil or ulterior motives Russia is granting the full right of self-determination to all the small nations. Is it too much if Russia demands the same right for herself? If necessary she will fight for it. The Russian intellectuals hope to see the old feud between brotherly peoples ended with harmony and mutual respect reigning. We deplore the haughtiness of the Polish ruling classes that is stirring up new nationalistic passion and reviving the old animosity."

The last point with regard to the arousing of national bitterness is regarded here as important and as constituting a real danger. I witnessed the effect of the Polish demands on a number of young Red officers in Petrograd.

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Air Flights Loosen Tight Taxpayers of Dutch East Indies

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The Hague, Holland, March 17.—The flight of Captain Ross Smith across the larger part of the Dutch East Indies has greatly increased the prestige of the "blondas" or whites. One of the "sultans" who occasionally has given trouble to the authorities declared he would never again quarrel with the whites who were so mighty as to be able to fly and who could at any moment "throw stones" from the skies. Natives of one of the islands where Captain Smith landed came of their own accord to offer their taxes, whereas it generally takes no end of trouble to collect them. When the official in control inquired how this was the delighted natives told him that henceforth they would gladly pay the tax because they had seen their money used for such good purposes as flying and treating them to the spectacle of air evolutions like those of Captain Ross Smith.

American Colony in Berlin More Than 200; Funds Sent

Paris, March 17.—(I. N. S.)—There are more than 200 Americans in Berlin, including 30 women. The women, for the most part, are wives of newspaper correspondents and businessmen who went to Germany seeking trade. The Red Cross has sent funds to the Red Cross representatives at Berlin and is preparing to rush truckloads of food if actual famine is threatened.

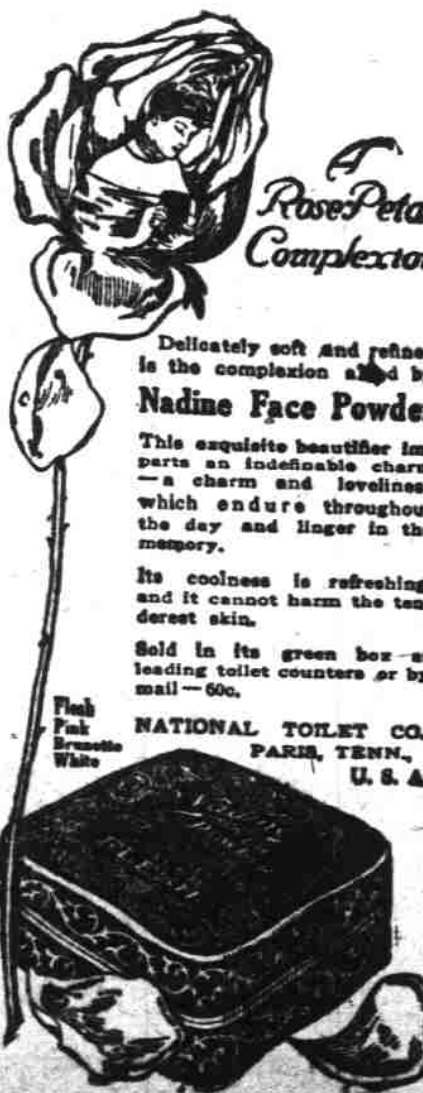
HAS CROSSED ATLANTIC 455 TIMES AS MASTER



Captain Anton G. Thomsen of the Scandinavian-American liner Frederik VIII, who will soon quit the sea after making 455 trips across the Atlantic. He figures that he has guided vessels about 1,784,000 miles at sea since he became master in 1881. During all this time he never lost a ship. While in command of the Hecla she lost a propeller and he brought her into a Scottish port under sail. Captain Thomsen went to sea when 13 years old. He has seen service in all of the seven seas. He is now 71. He proposed to spend the rest of his days in Denmark with his wife and daughter, devoting most of his time to golfing and fishing.

Predicts Bulgaria Will Recover From Her Severe Burden

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Sofia, Bulgaria, March 16.—(Via Paris, France, March 17.)—In a long talk which I had with M. Stamboulsky today the Bulgarian premier expressed himself as optimistic regarding the general situation. The people, he said, were hard at work and Bolshevism was not likely to spread in a country in which 85 per cent of the inhabitants were land owning farmers. The towns, however, were overcrowded with refugees from Macedonia and Thrace who were restless on account of their dark prospects. The unrest was increased by the propaganda of Lenin agents who had come into the country among the refugees from Odessa. The premier said that the presence of so many idle and unproductive people in a country which was just able to feed itself would be likely to increase the existing unrest. Since the arrival of the Russian refugees two bomb outrages had been perpetrated and in both instances they had been traced by the police to Lenin agents. M. Stamboulsky, however, was confident that drastic measures would check the anarchistic movement and allow Bulgaria to recover from the eight years of war in spite of the harsh peace terms.



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New "President" of Dutch Republic Is Routed by "Subjects"

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The Hague, Holland, March 16.—M. Mynkoop, the self styled "president of the Dutch republic," recently tried to hold a meeting in a street in Friesland. Long before the time set for his arrival peasants from the surrounding districts crowded into the hall where he was to talk and all the streets leading from the station. When Mynkoop appeared the mob began singing Orangist songs and would have torn him in pieces if the police had not protected him. After the meeting the mob shouted "Throw him in the water!" and again the police had to interfere.

Wynkoop fled precipitately in a motor car to Lemmer and thence by boat to Amsterdam.

American Tipsters Are Most Generous

London, March 17.—(I. N. S.)—Americans are the most generous tipsters in the world, according to a Savoy hotel barber. Russians come second, he says, Englishmen third, Italians fourth, Frenchmen fifth and Germans sixth. "Give an American what he wants and when he wants it, and he doesn't seem to care about the price," was the barber's verdict. The barber is an Englishman.

RECENTLY ELECTED HEAD OF HUNGARY IS VERY POPULAR

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Budapest, March 17.—Admiral Nicholas Horthy, the newly elected regent governor of Hungary, is without doubt the most popular man in the country today. Everyone likes him and what is more important, all respect him.

The hope of Hungary is that he will bring order out of the present chaos. He is looked upon as a man who will fight the insanity of illness and the rotting influence of corruption. For instance, while in charge of the Austro-Hungarian base at Pola Admiral Horthy caused sailors and petty officers caught pilfering the funds of the base to be tried and shot. Over their bodies the admiral said: "There are a lot more who will be served the same way if the thievery is not stopped."

OFFICER IN NAVY

Nicholas Horthy de Nagybanya, son of a noble family, was born in 1868 in Keder, a small village. Having finished the middle school studies, he entered the naval academy at Fiume. In 1888 he joined the fleet and was an officer on the Austrian ship Sankt George, on which he visited America. A cutter crew of this ship won a small boat race in Hampton Roads. He became captain of Taurus and cruised in the Mediterranean. From this post he was called to the court of Francis Joseph, becoming the emperor's naval aid de camp. During the Balkan war of 1912-1913 he left his post with the emperor and took command of the battleship Budapest. The Balkan wars finished, he reentered the court service, abandoning this just as the world war began. In August, 1914, he was in command of the battleship Habsburg and soon afterwards of the Neva.

NOT A POLITICIAN

As a good sailor he did not mingle in politics in general, but did as he was told, always carrying out orders to the best of his ability. Captain Horthy earned many decorations and was wounded in action. After his recovery he was given command of the Prinz Eugen. He suppressed the mutiny at Cattaro in February, 1918, and soon afterwards gained the rank of vice-admiral, and was placed in command of the entire fleet. Henceforth all his energies were directed toward reestablishing discipline in the fleet. The greatest blow he ever received was the order to surrender the fleet to the allies.

During the regime of Count Michael Kameley and the Bolshevik rule he remained quietly at his country place, and only after a more stable government was established did he take any active part in the affairs of Hungary. The entrance of Admiral Horthy's army into Budapest in November, 1918, marked a new epoch in the country's history. He has worked hard and successfully to reestablish order in dismembered, unfortunate Hungary.
