

GALLOWAY'S DEATH CLEAVES RANKS OF OREGON PIONEERS

Judge William Galloway, one of Oregon's pioneers and one of the best known judges in the state, died Tuesday at The Dalles, where he had gone to visit his son, Francis V. Galloway, district attorney of Wasco county. Judge Galloway had been in poor health since the death of his wife a year ago.

Galloway was born in Wisconsin, in June, 1845, and crossed the plains by ox team with his parents at the age of 7 years. The family settled in Yamhill county.

EARLY CAREER RECALLED

Judge Galloway, at the age of 16, worked as bellboy for pack trains taking supplies to mining camps in the mountain districts.

He entered Willamette university at the age of 19. Upon his graduation he taught school for several years and farmed with his brother. He was married to Miss Emma Baker in 1874. In 1876 he was elected a member of the legislature, where he served for three years. In 1880 he was elected county judge of Yamhill county. In 1884 he ran for governor of Oregon, but was defeated. He served as receiver of the land office at Oregon City from 1896 to 1903. The following year he was elected circuit judge of the old Third Judicial district, and was reelected in 1910.

Upon the expiration of his term he retired to private life.

OPERATED IN GRAIN

Judge Galloway, in addition to his public career, was one of the largest grain operators in his section of the state.

Since the death of Mrs. Galloway, he had been living with his son, Charles V. Galloway, first at Salem and then in Portland.

Besides his two sons, Galloway is survived by a daughter, Miss Zilpha V. Galloway, a medical student of Portland.

Claiming that they wanted to buy a ton of oat hay, the two men entered the store just as North was closing. North said he had only a dozen bales of the hay, and was conducting the two men to the storeroom when he was struck.

Crawling on his hands and knees, North managed to get back to the office, where he cut the rope with a hatchet and phoned the police station. Lieutenant Jack Goits and Inspectors Howell and Morak investigated. North was taken to Emmanuel hospital, where it is reported he has a bad gash on the top of his head.

Boise, Idaho, March 17.—With 70 persons within 50 feet of him, George Cook, an 8-year-old boy, drowned while swimming in the natatorium here. The boy's parents did not miss him until several minutes after he had disappeared. After a search of the building had been made, guards dived into the pool and pulled the lad out. Efforts to revive him were unsuccessful.

The boy came with his parents and the pool was crowded all afternoon. No one saw him go down and merrymakers played in the water for fully half an hour, with the lifeless body of the youth at the bottom of the pool.

The Russell Jitney collided in Corvallis Monday night, Bogymaka's car dashed into a telephone pole, breaking it off at the base and carrying it about four feet before the car stopped. The pole was held upright by the wires. Both drivers and a number of pedestrians narrowly escaped.

Oregon's Box Making Industry

OREGON'S BOX FACTORIES annually supply 147,000,000 feet of box shooks valued at \$7,350,000 to canneries and packers throughout the United States. To manufacture these shooks 176,000,000 feet of Oregon pine and spruce are converted into box material.

A PAYROLL of \$1,296,000 is distributed annually to 720 workers in the forty-six operating box factories. Plant capacity varies from 5000 to 150,000 per day and average about 36,000 feet per plant.

THOUGH STILL IN ITS INFANCY, this growing industry doubled production in the last four years. Eight years from today the box factories should quadruple production and distribute an annual payroll of over \$5,000,000 to 2800 employees.

THIS INCREASE IS ASSURED by the steady growth of the fish-packing industry and the vast acreage of newly planted orchards soon to bear fruit. Local demand will be overshadowed by eastern shortage caused through dwindling of their suitable timber. Growth of foreign trade, too, will increase wooden box usage from year to year.

THE BOX-MAKING INDUSTRY directly benefits the State of Oregon by creating a profitable outlet for the 20 per cent low-grade lumber unfit for transportation and not adapted to other industrial purposes or building. The income derived from national sales is retained in the state and distributed for local material and labor.
