

UNITED ARTISANS ARE PURCHASERS OF BECK BUILDING

Negotiations for the purchase of the Beck building at the northwest corner of Broadway and Oak streets by the United Artisans, announced in The Journal several weeks ago, were completed Wednesday evening.

The price paid for the building to the Beck Investment company was announced as between \$250,000 and \$260,000 in cash.

GROUND FLOOR LEASED

The entire ground floor has been leased to the Lumbermen Trust company for a 15 year period at a rental aggregating \$25,000.

Offices of the Lumbermen Trust company will be moved to the new location in June, according to John A. Keating, president of the company.

Plans for furnishings and equipment already have been completed and call for enlarged quarters for the various departments of the company's business.

GROWTH IS RAPID

The order of United Artisans was organized in Portland in 1895 and has a strong and rapidly increasing membership throughout the Northwest.

Officers of the Beck Investment company are: Samuel J. Taylor, president; Julius P. Levy, secretary, and E. Beck, treasurer.

The sale is one of the most important transfers of business property in the past year and the removal of the Lumbermen Trust company from the Lumbermen's building, on Fifth, between Stark and Oak, to their new location on Broadway marks an important step in the expansion of the financial district.

U. Students Raise \$500 in Drive to Help Missionaries

Willamette University, Salem, March 17.—Five hundred dollars was raised among the students of Willamette university Wednesday in a missionary drive conducted by a committee of nine students from the three Christian associations.

The drive was held for the purpose of establishing a living link between Willamette and alumni in foreign fields. Four hundred dollars will be given to build a chapel in India, where Royal Elstee, a Willamette graduate, is district superintendent. One hundred will go to Gingling college in China.

Boys and School Authorities Once More Are at Odds

Chehalis, Wash., March 18.—With the school strike settled Wednesday, the strikers this morning returned to school, following a meeting of the school board and the faculty. School Director Cory met the students in the assembly room and read a list of requirements, which the boys say were copied to the settlement they thought was made.

They asserted Cory said that all students who did not agree with the provisions read should quit school, whereupon 42 boys walked out and say they will not return. The high school teachers this morning informed the board that unless their authority is upheld they will resign in a body. The school board says the boys now out are suspended.

"When a city attracts a manufacturer who is a man with courage, energy, ability, training and judgment, it has acquired a million dollar asset," declared H. C. Huntington, president of the Associated Industries of Oregon, in an address before the Portland Ad club Wednesday afternoon.

WINTER BREAKS EARLY IN ALASKA, ACTIVITIES START

Juneau, Alaska, March 18.—(U. P.)—The hoary mantle of winter is being shaken off Alaska and her many industries are taking on the active life that characterizes the Far North during the spring period.

Every point in Alaska from Ketchikan to Kodiak has supplied stampede to the oil belt just thrown open by act of congress and other hundreds are coming from the States, all bent on staking oil claims.

Another reason for the turn of the tide of travel to this country is the renewed activity that will be inaugurated within a few weeks on the government railroad from Seward and Anchorage to the interior, for which congress recently appropriated an additional \$8,000,000.

ment, Dr. Von Kapp regards his mission as fulfilled.

Earlier in the day the Von Kapp forces had announced that the ultimatum of the independent Socialists demanding withdrawal of the revolutionary government and disarmament of troops had been flatly refused.

It was evident, however, that the dictator was greatly worried because of the rising influence of the Spartacists. A report was received that Bolshevik groups were in control of Wilhelmshaven.

Shortly after this, Ernest Daumig issued a statement calling on the proletariat to "hold firm" until its dictatorship could be established through an election.

Military reinforcements arrived in Berlin to assist in maintaining order. Troops took advantage of a meeting of striking workmen at the electrical plants at Charlottenburg to surround the workers and force them to return to their posts, so the plant could be operated to supply Berlin with electricity.

Berlin is virtually in control of communists.

By Karl H. Von Wiegand (Copyright, 1920, by Universal Service.) Spartacists have annihilated an entire battalion of the national guard and captured a battery of artillery in the Ruhr district.

Communist troops have disarmed the citizens guard in three of Berlin's suburbs, and the eastern edge of Berlin, known as the upper Spree region, is in control of communists, who have also occupied various railroad stations.

I was in the foreign office when the news of these radical coups came over the telephone. Lieutenant Commander Ebert reached an agreement with the communists to begin their attacks sooner than they had planned. It is known that they have been carefully preparing for the government's official telephone office bribes with machine guns.

Should the present government fall before adequate protection is assured, there is reason to expect a return to anarchy as to future events here.

Clashes between troops and civilians, with sporadic firing, began in various parts of the city during the night. Vast crowds gathered, listening to speakers harangue resistance to the Kapp government, and when they failed to scatter at the commands of officers the troops began to fire. A wild panic ensued.

Soon afterward disturbances broke out all over the city, many casualties resulting from clashes between troops and strikers. In South Berlin a mob attempted to throw soldiers into the canal, but were finally scattered by rifle fire, several being killed.

Bolsheviks and not Ebert SAID TO HAVE UNSEATED KAPP. London, March 18.—The Kapp-Luegwig militarist regime in Berlin has withdrawn, not a result of a promise with the Ebert government, but under compulsion of an ultimatum by the Berlin Reds.

The soviet leaders, says a dispatch received by way of Frankfurt on Main, threatened that they would attack the Kapp-Luegwig troops if the militarist rebels had not stepped out of office. Both Dr. Wolfgang Kapp and General Baron von Luegwig are said to have withdrawn their troops from this threat, after obtaining guarantees for their safety.

AMSTERDAM REPORTS KAPP HAS COMMITTED SUICIDE. London, March 18.—(I. N. S.)—An Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Amsterdam today stated that, according to telephone messages received there from Berlin, the rumor is current in the German capital that Wolfgang von Kapp, who resigned yesterday as chancellor of the German revolutionary government, had committed suicide.

A telegram received earlier in the day by the Times from Amsterdam quoted Berlin dispatches to the Telegraph as saying that Von Kapp and General von Luegwig had both fled from Berlin in automobiles immediately after their resignation. General von Luegwig commanded the revolutionary troops in Berlin.

President Ebert ordered the arrest of Von Kapp and Von Luegwig. It was reported from Paris.

BLOODSHED MARKS RIOTING IN STREETS OF LEIPZIG. London, March 18.—(I. N. S.)—Fighting in the streets of Leipzig has been continuous since 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon, according to a Central News dispatch received here today. Barricades have been erected in the city's thoroughfares.

Twenty persons were killed in an attack on the railway station at Nurnberg. The attack was repulsed.

At Rastock, a German seaport, workers made a surprise attack and captured the military barracks.

Soviet Movement Spreads. London, March 18.—(I. N. S.)—The communist movement in Germany is spreading, according to advice received here from German sources just before noon. Agricultural workers are proclaiming soviets. In Mecklenburg, the communists seized a number of estates.

Communist in Power. Berlin, March 17.—(Delayed)—(I. N. S.)—A soviet has been established by the communists and workmen at Wilhelmshaven, according to official information received here today.

Quiet has been restored at Munich and Kiel, said advices from those cities.

Noke to Attack Reds. Paris, March 18.—(I. N. S.)—Gustav Noke, minister of defense in the Ebert constitutional government, has gone to Berlin from Stuttgart to inaugurate military measures against the Spartacists. It was reported from Berlin today.

ALLIES WILL NOT ADVANCE PRESENT LINE IN GERMANY

Paris, March 18.—(U. P.)—American troops along the Rhine "are ready for any emergency" that may arise from the chaotic situation in Germany, Major General Allen, their commander, declared in an interview at Coblenz which was received here today.

Paris, March 18.—(I. N. S.)—The allies have reached the definite decision not to advance a single foot beyond their present military lines in Germany unless some new turn in German affairs actually threatens a resumption of the war, it was learned in official circles today.

It was pointed out that, as the British and French have already ratified the treaty of Versailles, an advance by the Anglo-French armies would create an Anglo state of war and upset the peace treaty.

As the United States has not ratified the treaty, it is held that only the United States troops that are still on the Rhine under the armistice terms could advance into Germany.

One view advanced today was that if German conditions compel allied military measures the first serious invasion probably would be made from Poland. The crack "Kosciusko" squadron of the Polish army, which is made up almost wholly of Americans, is only 160 miles east of Berlin. French strategists also point out that practically all of the important German coalfields, are under the allies' guns.

That will be the harvest time, during the spring and summer of 1921. When the campaign of 1921 opens they expect to be ready to move.

TO JOIN LABOR FORCES. The Nonpartisan league directors expect to move the Land and Labor party, recently organized here, to one side, or to absorb it. They play their own game, when and where they play. They expect to form the farmers into a working band organized to secure those legislative remedies which the farmers are or may be demanding. They expect to join these forces with the forces of organized labor in the cities and towns of the state, each segment putting forward its own program, with both moulding the program until it is acceptable to all, and then getting back of it with united effort.

In Clarke county each of the 3900 voters who have signed the Nonpartisan roster has contributed \$18 toward the campaign fund, a total of \$38,000. Of this, \$14,000 is for organization and campaign work in that county, \$14,000 for the state campaign fund and \$9,000 for the national fund. Clarke is but one of the counties of the state. What is done there in that direction is to be done in Oregon when the work starts here. Men who have their money in a game usually play to win it back. They stick. The Nonpartisan league is some organization, with some organizers at its helm. Oregon is to be introduced to it and it is going to be introduced in and to Oregon. It will make quite a difference in political conditions here. How much, the future will tell.
