

PORTLAND TO RETAIN N. P. HEADQUARTERS OFFICIALS ANNOUNCE

Headquarters of the Northern Pacific railroad passenger department in the Northwest will remain in Portland and A. D. Charlton, present assistant general passenger agent in this district, will assume the position of general passenger agent, with jurisdiction over passenger affairs from Montana west, including Alaska and California, according to a message received Thursday by Charlton.

All Northern Pacific officials remain in their former positions with the following exceptions: J. G. Baird, freight traffic manager; A. M. Cleveland, passenger traffic manager; and Henry Blakeley, general freight agent, all of St. Paul; A. Tingling, general freight agent, Seattle; and F. H. Fogarty, assistant general freight agent, Portland.

Charlton had charge of the inauguration of the first passenger service of the Northern Pacific to the North Pacific coast, opening offices in Portland in 1914. He has served as assistant general passenger agent here for a long term of years.

W. H. Ude, at present in charge of the consolidated ticket office at Spokane, has been selected by Charlton as general agent for the Northern Pacific in Spokane, succeeding R. T. Bretts in Spokane, who left for St. Paul recently to become assistant to the vice president in charge of traffic. R. T. Bretts is assistant general freight and passenger agent at Tacoma and offices will be opened later at Victoria, Vancouver and San Francisco.

Charlton will be assisted in opening the office in that city.

"All Northern Pacific offices in Portland will be united in the Spaulding building and will be expanded," said Charlton. Portland city passenger and traveling agents will be announced later.

Frank P. Gilmore Tenders Resignation

Frank P. Gilmore, who has held the position of Portland advertising representative of the Christian Science Monitor since July, 1918, has resigned. Gilmore assigns as reason for his resignation that the Monitor is no longer under the control of the Christian Science church. This condition, Gilmore says, is the result of a civil suit brought by the trustees of the publishing society against the board of directors of the mother church, to gain control of the publications. Gilmore's resignation was tendered February 28, to take effect April 1. He has not yet been advised of the name of his successor.

Former Editor of Baptist Paper Dies

McMinnville, March 15.—Mr. James A. Clarke, former editor of the Pacific Baptist in Portland and McMinnville, died at his home in New Rochelle, N. Y., Wednesday. He left here in January, 1918, to take X-ray treatment with a specialist in New York for blood trouble. He is survived by his wife and one daughter. He was compelled to cease editing his paper on account of ill health and the paper was merged with the Chicago Standard last July.

Army Store Prices Force Competition

Albany, Or., March 15.—Thousands of pounds of bacon were offered at 20 cents Thursday by merchants on the second day of competitive bidding against the prices of the army store. The same products were offered Wednesday at 25 cents. The 3 cent cut by the army store Thursday was met by local merchants. Consumers are reported holding off for lower prices.

La Grande, March 15.—The city of La Grande will go 50-50 with Union county in paying the expenses and salary of a police matron, who will serve as a city police deputy, county deputy and truant officer.

Bridge Condemned At Coburg; Roller Damages Structure

Eugene, March 15.—The river bridge at Coburg has been declared unsafe for loads of 3000 pounds or more. When the county roller passed over the bridge recently damage resulted, making it necessary to ship the big roller to Eugene by railroad. Repairs will be made as soon as water conditions permit.

The position of postmaster at Mabel will soon be open and the civil service

commission has set April 10, in Eugene, as the examination date. The job pays about \$485 a year.

Gold Bearing Vein Of High Values Is Found Near Baker

Baker, March 15.—Gold discoveries that may lead to extensive mining operations within 15 miles of Baker are reported by Ray Spencer, who says that he and his partner, Godard Bomen, have uncovered a vein of gold bearing porphyry of which average samples indicate a value of \$217.20 a ton, according to assay returns. The ledge is 14 feet wide at the top and increases in width as it descends, Spencer says. The

new discovery is in the Virtue district on Ruckles creek, six miles east of the Virtue mine.

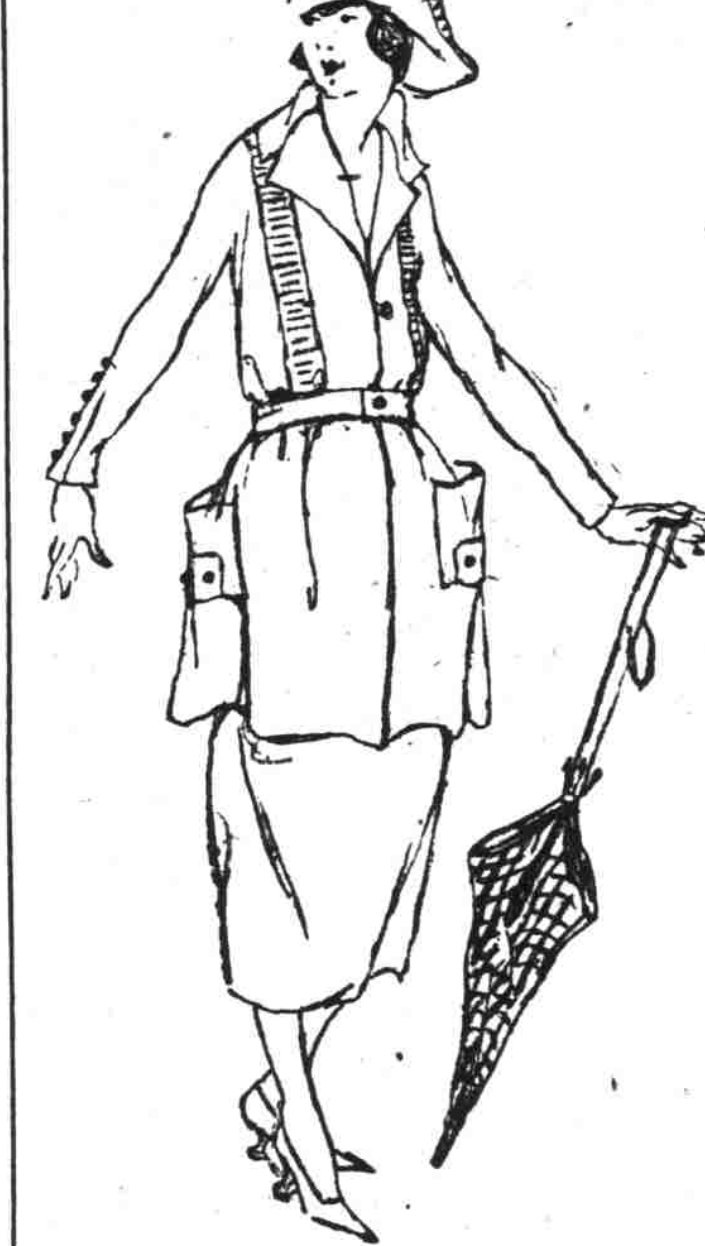
