

G. O. P. FIGHT IN PRIMARIES BEGINS TO GET WARMER

Presidential Candidates Hit the Trail in Hunt for Delegates in Several States This Week.

Chicago, March 20.—(U. P.)—With the Republican national convention only 11 weeks away, G. O. P. presidential candidates next week enter one of the crucial weeks of the pre-convention campaign.

A direct primary will be held in South Dakota Tuesday and state conventions are scheduled in Connecticut, Maine and New Mexico on Tuesday, Thursday and Friday, respectively.

Wood and Lowden headquarters here tonight were planning an "up-to-the-minute campaign" in South Dakota.

WOOD IN SOUTH DAKOTA

Wood is now in the state and will continue stumping until Monday night. Tonight he met Senator Polindexter, also a candidate, in a debate at Pierre, S. D. Lowden forces will make a whirlwind campaign in South Dakota Sunday and Monday.

Hamlin, who is a candidate for delegate at large to the convention, believes Wood will win the Colorado delegation. Today marked another victory for the Wood forces.

Indications tonight were that the Minnesota delegation to the G. O. P. convention will be instructed for Wood. All four delegates at large elected today are claimed by Wood forces.

LOWDEN CLOSES IN MICHIGAN

Lowden closed a week's campaigning in Michigan today. Next week Wood will make a stumping tour over the ground Lowden covered.

Little activity among the Democrats has been reported here thus far. In the West the candidacy of Attorney General Palmer is receiving prominent attention. In the South Governor Cox of Ohio is said to be popular.

GENERAL STRIKE MAY HAVE PASSED BEYOND ITS LEADERS

Berlin, March 20.—(U. P.)—Strike leaders called off the general strike at noon today.

Their decision followed a series of conferences with the government in which they stood fast in their demands for governmental reform before ordering the workers back to their posts.

The government representatives finally yielded to the strikers' demands, which were understood to include: Formation of a new cabinet with labor representation.

Resignation of Gustave Noske, president Ebert's minister of defense.

New laws giving greater freedom of action to labor in conduct of the government.

In many quarters, however, it was believed the strike has passed beyond the control of its leaders as well as the government. Dispatches today reported radical uprisings in many cities. The great industrial district of Westphalia, centering about the giant Krupp steel works in Essen, was described as "aflame with insurrection."

Meanwhile Berlin is under drastic martial law. No one was allowed in the streets last night without a pass from the military authorities. Officers said the measure was necessary to protect life. Sporadic gunfire continued. Similar measures have been put into effect in other cities in control of the Ebert forces. It was said.

HUNDREDS ARE KILLED

Hundreds of persons have been killed in fighting throughout the country.

Attempts of radicals to establish soviet rule in many districts have resulted in bloody warfare between the radicals and troops loyal to the government.

The radicals were reported in control of Mulheim, Oberhausen, Elberfeld, Kattowitz, Dusseldorf, Leipzig, Kiel and other cities. At Leipzig the government forces used an airplane in efforts to drive radicals from the city. Bombs were dropped and many persons killed.

VON KAPP DEATH ON NEWS BUREAUS

Number of Prominent Editors Arrested and Threatened With Execution, Report.

Berlin, March 19.—(Delayed.)—The Von Kapp regime carried on its press censorship with a ruthless hand during the four and one half days it was in power. A number of prominent editors, including George Bernhart, were arrested and it was learned today that they were threatened with execution.

A press bureau was established which gave out much false information. This course was responsible for reports that Gustav Noske and Bauer (the chancellor in the Ebert government) had been arrested at Dresden. The offices of the Holland news bureau were raided by troops and the telephone lines cut, but as a general rule Dutch, Swedish and Swiss correspondents were given much more liberty in sending dispatches than American and British reporters.

Sentences Delayed In I. W. W. Cases

Montesano, Wash., March 20.—Hearing on the motion for a new trial for the seven I. W. W. convicted of second degree murder for the slaying of Warren O. Grimm in Centralia, has been postponed from Monday until the afternoon of March 23 by Judge Wilson. Postponement was made in compliance with a request of George Vanderveer, their attorney, made by telephone from Portland. Sentencing of the prisoners, Judge Wilson said, would not occur until after arguments on the motion for a new trial are heard.

COMMUNIST OUTBREAKS

THREATENED ALLIED PLAN

London, March 20.—(U. P.)—British officials tonight viewed the situation in Germany with unconcealed anxiety.

The rapid spread of communist outbreaks, they believed, threatens not only the treaty of Versailles, but the entire allied plan for future relations with Germany.

A Paris dispatch said that because of the seriousness of the communist insurrectionary movement in the Rhine industrial district, the entente authorities had granted permission for reichswehr troops to enter the occupied zones to put down soviet movements.

The seriousness of the situation was reflected in a Stuttgart dispatch which said the Ebert government had been forced to mobilize the civil militia to protect itself from the communists. An uprising in the temporary headquarters of the government was threatened, the dispatch said.

REDS SEIZE CONTROL

A Spartacus army of 7500 was reported seizing control of the important Westphalian industrial cities. It was said to have driven government forces from Dusseldorf and other cities. The Ebert forces took refuge in the British zone of occupation.

Belgian outposts on the right bank of the Rhine have crossed to the left bank.

Dispatches here indicate that the Spartacus movement is strongest in the great industrial district of Westphalia. The German delegation in Paris officially confirmed reports that the Spartacans have captured Dusseldorf, Oberhausen,

Elberfeld and Mulheim. Earlier dispatches from Aix-la-Chapelle said that a soviet republic had been proclaimed at Essen, the steel manufacturing center of Germany.

REWARD FOR VON KAPP

An Amsterdam dispatch, quoting another dispatch from Baden, said the Ebert government had offered a high reward for the arrest of Dr. von Kapp, leader of the Berlin insurrection, and General Baron von Luetwitz, his minister of war.

There were indications, this dispatch said, that the allies are preparing to enter Germany unless order is restored soon. Strong allied forces were being concentrated at Strasbourg and Metz.

Raids on Reds Save Nation From Revolt, Congressman Says

New York, March 20.—(U. P.)—Only the recent raids on "Reds" and consequent deportations saved the United States from an attempt at organized revolution, Congressman Albert Johnson of Washington declared in a speech in Brooklyn today.

"The greatest misfortune the country has had," Johnson said, "is that aliens from every country on the globe participated in our political affairs."

"I contend that, while we should not disturb our free speech and free press from one iota, these rights belong to us as citizens and not to those who come here to harm us."

Johnson defended the stand of residents of the Pacific coast states in opposing the entry of Asiatic foreigners. "If they had been brought in," said Johnson, "we would have had second, third and fourth class Tokios up and down the coast."

Dallas, March 20.—The wash women of Dallas have organized and have adopted a scale of prices to be charged for "rough dry" and family washings.

Kerr of the Oregon Agricultural college made a strong plea for the measure at the open session Wednesday, which was held at the home of Evening Star Grange. No opposition to the measure was made manifest.

Restaurant Man Arrested

R. Wood, proprietor of Wood's cafe, 101 Sixth street, was arrested Saturday night by the police on a warrant charging him with maintaining an unsanitary restaurant. The complaint is signed by J. B. Nye of the health bureau. Wood was released on his own recognizance. Trial will be held Monday in the municipal court.


