

CHARLES E. LADD FUNERAL WILL BE HELD ON MONDAY

Native Portlander Had Taken an Active Part in Promoting the Interests of County and State.

Funeral services for Charles Elliott Ladd, who died at Westerlock, his Carlton, Or., home, early Saturday morning, will be held from the home of Mrs. Helen Ladd Corbett, 293 Sixth street, at 2 o'clock Monday afternoon.

Charles Elliott Ladd, second son of William Sargeant and Caroline Elliott Ladd, who were among the builders of the Oregon empire, was born in Portland on August 3, 1857.

Mr. Ladd's first business venture in Oregon came when he entered the Ladd & Tilton bank, of which his father was owner, remaining there until he and Theodore B. Wilcox became associated in the affairs of the Portland Flouring Mills company.

Mr. Ladd was a very active figure in Portland commercial activities during his residence in this city. He was a member of the Arlington club of Portland and of the Grolier club of New York.

COUNTIES GET BIG SUM FROM MOTOR VEHICLE LICENSES

State Distributes \$381,548 of Total of \$1,526,194.63 Taken in Under New State Measure.

Salem, March 20.—Receipts from the registration of motor vehicles for 1920 were distributed by the secretary of state's office this week among the various counties of the state and the state highway fund, as required by the law of 1919.

March 15, less \$47,305.37 for administrative expenses, or a net distribution of \$1,526,194.63. Of this amount, one-fourth, or \$381,548.66, is distributed among the 36 counties of the state in proportion to the total amount of the fund arising out of each county through motor vehicle registrations.
