HIRAM JOHNSON LAUGHS AT RIVALS' TALKING POINTS

Washington, March 24.—(WASH-
INGTON BUREAU OF THE JOUR-
NAL)—Militarism, the high cost of
living and the League of Nations
are given by Senator Hiram W.
Johnson as the principal things in
which the people of the middle
Western states are interested, as he
has judged from his recent campaign
tours.

Sitting at ease in his office, the Cal-
ifornia senator told a group of cor-
respondents his recent observations, em-
bellished with Johnsonesque turns of
satire aimed at his chief opponents in
the presidential race.

Asked to define what he means by
"militarism," Senator Johnson replied
that he has found the people of the
West "fearful of universal military
training, and there is no question as to
how they feel about it."

SORE OVER LIVING COSTS
As to the high cost of living, he could
find no definite expression as to what
remedy the people may desire to en-
force. It is just a sore spot, a general
desire to escape from burdens which
they keenly feel.

On the third issue, the league, John-
son said there is "real interest" in it,
and he finds it to be one of the things
in which people are strongly concerned.

At the national capital one may often
hear that the people are weary of the
league and treaty, but this, says John-
son, is not so in the great West through
which he has traveled.

"Are the other candidates discussing
league?"
"Oh, yes," said the Californian. "We
are told that 'truth crushed to earth will
rise again'; 'be good and you will be
happy'; 'honesty is the best policy';
and let us be up and doing.'"

HITS AT LOWDEN, WOOD
Then, in more serious way, he re-
marked that one candidate makes the
budget system his great talking point,
and another is championing the cause
of greater salaries for school teachers,
though he could not see just what a
president will have to do with the pay
of the teachers. These were manifest
hits at Lowden and Wood.

The country is in a period of po-
litical reaction, said Johnson, and he
is unable to predict how long it will
last. In this statement he had particu-
larly in mind the repeal of direct pri-
mary laws in Minnesota, Washington
and other states. His policy is to wage
a campaign in all the direct primary
states, except in the homes of rival can-
didates.

He leaves Illinois to Lowden and
Ohio to Harding, although Wood is
fighting in both of those states. He is
leaving Washington to Poindexter and
will keep out of Idaho, understanding
that Idaho will be for Borah.

WANT VISIT OREGON
He is not fully decided about visiting
Oregon. He is being urged to go there,
but is making no promises until ar-
rangements elsewhere will enable him
to lay out his line of travel. If he goes,
it will be for a rapid swing through all
the Pacific coast states, to build up sec-
ond choice sentiment in Washington, to
fight for Oregon, and to strengthen his
ties in the battle with Hoover in Cali-
fornia.

Oregon, in a manner, is in a pocket,
surrounded by states in which Johnson
is making no fight, except as to his
home state. Montana is the nearest
state where he is entered for a big

fight. The Montana primaries will be
held April 23, and if he skims down the
coast, the most likely time for such a
trip will be just after that date, en-
abling him to return East in time for
some of the early May primaries where
the delegates are thickest.

Officials Disagree Over Hogs Romping On City's Domain

"I can see no harm in keeping goats

practice for any city official," said
