

## COUNTY TO GRADE AND PAVE FOSTER ROAD TO CITY LINE

County Commissioners Holman and Muck agreed to pay from county funds for the grading of a 24 foot strip along Foster road to the established grade of the city as well as the paving of an 18 foot strip, following a conference Tuesday with City Commissioner Barbur and several residents who own property fronting on the road.

The county will give close to \$80,000 toward completing the paving of the road, Holman announced. In the last budget \$42,000 was appropriated. Holman and Muck have agreed to provide for the additional \$40,000 next November at the completion of the budget for 1921. Commissioner Hoyt could not be reached this morning to determine whether he was in accord with his colleagues' decision. It will be next November before the sewer is completed, Barbur estimates.

Foster road will be taken over as a city street and sewers will be started immediately if the city council Wednesday approves a resolution authorizing City Engineer Laugaard to proceed with the work. Fifty-two per cent of the property owners fronting on Foster

## Canadian Timbermen Call on Allen to Assist in Taxation

Canadian timber owners, the department of finance and the department of forestry are calling upon the United States forestry experts and particularly E. T. Allen, secretary of the Western Forestry and Conservation association, for assistance in straightening out their system of taxation.

Allen, who has made a special study of forest taxation and who has just returned from Washington, D. C., where he assisted in untangling the income tax mystery, expects a visit soon from Canadian representatives to discuss the proposal of the taxation of fee lands over which owners are much disturbed, fearing it will result in confiscation and bad management.

Licensed timber lands, the other form of forest holdings, are taxed by means of royalties paid the government.

## Man Kills Friend; Woman in Case Was Wife of Survivor

Fresno, Cal., March 23.—(U. P.)—M. E. Pittman today shot and killed A. Nicholson, a contractor. The two had been the best of friends for years. ## SHORT ON CLOTH, LONG ON PRICE, IS MOTTO IN EAST, SICHEL WRITES

"Short on cloth, long on price," is New York's motto for spring and summer wear, according to H. H. Sichel, local clothier, now in the East.

Jade green is the color for Easter, Sichel says. Wear that and you're "right." "In ladies' styles," he writes, "capotes are still being worn to some extent, and also a great many fur coats and wraps. Gray squirrel, Hudson seal and mink seem to be favored. Although it is very cold, the French low shoes are being worn with the thinnest of thin hosiery. Skirts are rather short, with a very tight band around the bottom. Sleeves are short and gloves are long. Men are wearing woolen hose a great deal and the heavy brogue low shoes, while women do not seem to be wearing woolen hosiery as much as they do on the coast.

"The most extensive thing in styles for men is a tendency toward lighter clothes, smaller shaped hats and the almost universal wearing of reefers by men. Low collars and narrow neckties are enjoying popularity for winter. You see very few soft collars, practically no cloth hats, but more soft hats in proportion to the number of derbies in previous years."

## New Rule Covering Canadian Messages Effective April 1
