

PROHIBITIONISTS TALK OF ENTRY RACE FOR PRESIDENCY IN JULY

Chicago, March 28.—(U. P.)—Prohibitionists may put a candidate in the race for the presidency unless one of the major parties can give strong guarantee that its candidate will be for prohibition enforcement, it was stated at national prohibition headquarters here today.

Prospects of a prohibition ticket being injected into the presidential campaign looked better today, when it was learned that a strong minority of the prohibition party are demanding that a dry candidate be named.

Just what action will be taken by the prohibitionists at their convention in Lincoln, Neb., July 21, depends on the selections to be made by the Democrats and Republicans, said L. D. Fackler of the dry headquarters here.

"There has been a prohibition ticket since 1867," he said. "If the issue isn't raised by either of the major parties it is probable we may take no action."

It was admitted by prohibitionists that their convention might select as its candidate one of the two named by the Republicans and Democrats, depending upon how much of a dry he was.

Bierce Died Gamely Before Firing Squad Of Villa in Mexico

San Francisco, March 28.—(U. P.)—No further action than the publication of his story regarding the manner in which Ambrose Bierce met death is planned by James H. Wilkins, he said today, when asked if it would be forwarded to the state department.

Bierce, the San Francisco writer, "folded his arms contemptuously and faced a Villa firing squad," according to Wilkins' story published here in the Bulletin. Wilkins learned details of Bierce's death after a careful investigation in Mexico.

"So America's foremost satirist met death in 1915 near the Mexican village of Icamoh on the trail to Monterey," writes Wilkins.

Wilkins says Bierce often expressed the desire to die in battle. He was employed as a military expert by Carranza and was captured by Villistas.

"Senior" Wilkins' informant is quoted as saying, "I could only admire the bravery with which the stately, white-haired man met death."

The end of Bierce had been clouded in mystery.

Vote to Be Against 5 Socialists Ousted In N. Y. Legislature

Albany, N. Y., March 28.—The assembly judiciary committee stands 7 to 8 to expel the five suspended Socialists, according to reliable information today.

A formal vote will be taken Monday when a meeting of the full committee has been called, following which a majority report and individual statements from a number of committee members are expected. A vote in the assembly, following the report of the committee will definitely settle the fate of the Socialists. Speaker Sweet is said to have enough votes pledged to expel the suspended five.

Following this action, attempts will be made to pass legislation which will seek to bar the Socialist party from state politics. A number of bills along this line are now being prepared by Assemblyman Louis A. Cuvillier, member of the judiciary committee.

Banks Refuse Loan For Wage Increase

Chicago, March 28.—(U. P.)—City employees today were despairing of getting their 10 per cent pay increase, granted by the city council. Bankers have refused to lend the city \$4,000,000 more to meet the employees' demands. The city's only course now, it was said, is to ask the state legislature for help when the funds are exhausted.

Shrine Club Formed
Roseburg, March 28.—The Umpqua Shrine club has been organized in this city by 40 nobles and with plans to establish a temple here. The local members have been affiliated with Hillah temple of Ashland. Guy Black is president, and Richard Williams, secretary.

Drug Store Robbed In Early Morning; Two Escape in Auto

At about 4:30 a. m. today the Richmond Pharmacy at Forty-first and Division streets was broken into by two men who drove to the place in a high powered motor truck. The till was rifled and a telephone strong box was emptied of its contents. Only a small amount of money was secured, according to the proprietor of the place.

People living in the neighborhood who were awakened by the clumsy operations of the burglars, describe them as being young men of average height and slender build. One of them wore khaki pants and puttees. Patrolman Arnold reported seeing two men answering this description at Fifty-fifth avenue and Seventy-second street at 2:30 a. m. Their actions aroused suspicions of the officer but before he could approach and question them they sprang into the waiting machine and made their escape.

Trip Around World in Four Days, Aviation Plans in Few Years

Paris, March 27.—(I. N. S.)—Around the world in four days!

This is not the wild dream of a supervisory, but a practical prediction by Andre Michelin today of what may be expected from aviation within the next few years. M. Michelin, who is the newly elected president of the Aero club of France, said:

"This is not a romantic dream. We are only in the infancy of aviation. In a few years 250 miles an hour will be the normal rate of travel. Any aviator of average ability will be able to travel 6000 or 7000 miles without a stop. New York will be 12 hours from Paris. A Frenchman may set out in the morning, lunch at Naples and sleep the same night at Cairo. He can go around the world in four days."

London, March 28.—Lilith McCarthy, formerly Mrs. George Grandville Barker, will be married here Saturday to Professor Keeble, a noted Oxford botanist, it was announced today. Mrs. McCarthy has been pronounced the most beautiful woman on the English stage.

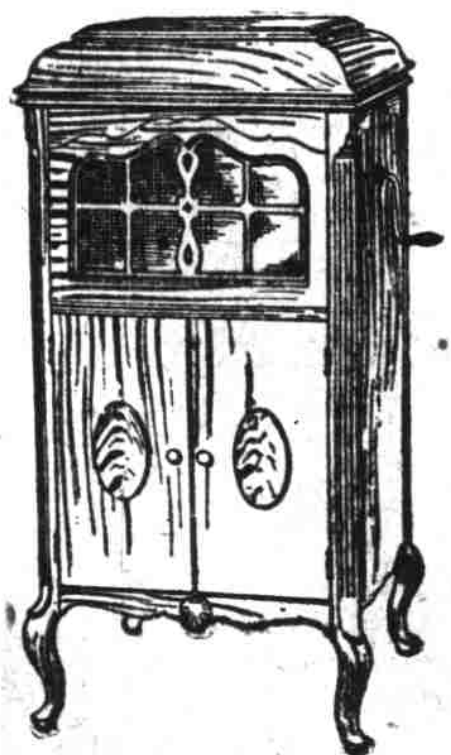
