

M'NARY'S PORT SCHEME DESIGNED TO AID PORTLAND

Washington, March 29.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL.)—Looking to the development of the ports of the country on the basis of their natural advantages, as related to the territory for whose products they form the logical and economic outlet, Senator McNary is considering plans for recognition of this principle in the law declaring the shipping policy of the country.

He has drafted a tentative proposal for inclusion in the bill to be reported by the commerce committee of the senate, which will lay down the policy of the United States merchant marine. A sub-committee of seven senators is at work framing this bill, including Senators McNary and Chamberlain, with another Northwest senator, Jones of Washington, as its chairman.

SERVE NEARBY TERRITORY

"Sound principles of economics demand that traffic moving to the coast should go through the nearest port, and not through some far distant outlet," said McNary, in outlining his ideas. "I used to raise hops at Salem, and they went by rail to San Francisco, where their ocean voyage began. The ocean voyage should have begun at the Columbia river, and the same condition is found with respect to many products all over the country."

"There has been a tendency to build up certain large ports, when other points of shipment could be utilized with a much shorter haul. So far as possible the port should serve the territory that is naturally tributary to it, and I hope to see that principle recognized by law."

BENEFIT TO COLUMBIA

"I understand the shipping board has collected data bearing on the matter, and I am asking for that, so I may familiarize myself with what has been done. My understanding is that the shipping board people endorse the principle. I want to find out the practical working and learn what the difficulties may be."

Studies of the cross-movement of traffic assembled by the shipping board are expected to be of value, and Senator McNary has drafted a provision directing investigations which will show the direct routings of traffic throughout the country. He expects that the merchant marine, under direction of the government, will be of immense importance for many years to come, and that in the assignment of ships for operation the shipping board will have a splendid opportunity to distribute commerce on natural lines.

"This will be to the advantage of the Columbia river and to other ports of the country," said McNary, "but not less to the advantage of the country at large in rounding out its business for service on the most direct and economical lines."

Brokerage Firm Employees Indicted
Chicago, March 29.—(U. P.)—George Silverman, 58, and Frank G. Bader, 52, veteran employees of a brokerage firm here, today are under indictment by a federal grand jury charged with taking \$66,000 of the firm's money.

SUFFRAGISTS GET SESSION BY OLD LAW

Hartford, Conn., March 29.—Gov. M. H. Halcomb's refusal to call the legislature in extra session to act upon the federal suffrage amendment has been met, it was learned today, by a counter move on the part of the pro-suffragists which is expected to result in the convening of the legislative body in spite of the government.

The women's party consulted a former attorney general, who found an ancient and long forgotten constitutional provision under which the legislature can convene itself without waiting for a call by the governor.

Under this provision, it was declared today, the ex-session will be held, the lieutenant governor acting as the convening official and the suffrage amendment will be ratified.

Earthquakes During Year Numbered 87, Low Record in U. S.

Washington, March 29.—Did you experience a little earthquake at any time in the past year?

According to the bulletin of the department of agriculture, issued today, there were 87 earthquakes in the United States in 1931 and it was an "off year" at that, as there are usually from 100 to 200 such disturbances every year. The majority of quakes were reported from the Pacific coast, but out there, the bulletin says, "slight earth tremors are of sufficient frequency to cause no comment whatever."

A surprising feature, though, is that more than a score of the quakes occurred in the Mississippi valley. The region comprising southern Illinois and Indiana, western Kentucky and Tennessee experienced 20 quakes, while one was reported in northeastern Missouri, two in Kansas and one in Washington, D. C.

State Board Favored Choral Music in California Schools

Sacramento, Cal., March 29.—(U. P.)—The Suwanee river has been saved.

For the purpose of "eliminating the growing tendency toward jazz music," the state board of education is today on record recommending the establishment of choral music in all high schools.

The recommendation, introduced by Mrs. Agnes Ray of Berkeley was taken as a step to "preserve American music." It was adopted by the board after considerable discussion. "This goes to show," declared Will C. Wood, state superintendent of public instruction, "with what harmony we are transacting business."

BOODLE CHARGES WORRY WOOD IN MICHIGAN FIGHT

Washington, March 29.—The anti-Wood campaign within the Republican party has received such impetus of late that the result of the Michigan primary a week from today is expected to forecast in a large measure the success or failure of the general at the Chicago convention.

The outlook in Michigan for General Wood is not especially good. Senator Johnson of California has a strong organization and much Johnson sentiment has been reported from Detroit and other large population centers. Moreover, Michigan has just experienced the sensation of having its junior senator, Truman H. Newberry, and a number of his Republican supporters convicted on a charge of conspiracy as a result of unlawful campaign expenditures.

TOO MUCH MONEY
The charges that a "millionaires' ring" is backing General Wood, and that his followers have unlimited resources behind them are of such a nature to convey hardly a good impression to the Michigan electorate.

If General Wood is headed off in Michigan by either Senator Johnson, or Governor Frank O. Lowden of Illinois, observers here declare he will have slight chance of being nominated at Chicago. He might, however, they admit, retrieve his fortunes by capturing the Indiana primary, which falls on May 4, but in Indiana all the "old timers" are burning up the rails and spending money on new motor tires for travels to tell the Hoosier voters why they should not vote for Wood.

WOOD HOLDS ADVANTAGE

If the drumfire of campaign oratory against "unlimited resources" and "pork barrel" methods is reacted to favorably by the voters, Senator Johnson will have his great opportunity in Michigan, for Governor Lowden's followers have also been singled out as "lavish spenders."

The fight in the Wolverine state is admittedly between Wood, Johnson and Lowden, and despite the concentrated attacks on the soldier candidate he is deemed the possessor of a slight advantage.

England and Mexico Are to Be Parties To a Special Treaty

Washington, March 29.—(U. P.)—A special treaty is being negotiated between Great Britain and Mexico for protection of the border between the Mexican province of Quintanaroo and British Honduras, according to a recent copy of the Mexico City newspaper Universal, received here.

The treaty is designed to prohibit shipment of arms and ammunition from British Honduras into Quintanaroo, where the arms would fall into the hands of scattering rebel bands.

Regulations Over United Gas Meet Much Opposition

Washington, March 29.—(I. N. S.)—Protests against any drastic regulations on the use of nitro gas were voiced here before the nitro gas conservation committee of the bureau of mines by F. F. Currie of Erie, Pa., and Reed L. Carr of New York, representing the Columbia Carbon company. They declared that nitro gas is necessary to the manufacture of carbon black, which is the only satisfactory base for newspaper ink, and that restrictions of the use of nitro gas for this purpose would be injurious to the newspaper industry.

A delegation of appliance manufacturers, headed by William M. Crans of New York before the committee and suggested certain methods of procedure in regard to the use of closed and open top stoves for the burning of natural gas.

H. E. Hunter, president of the Baltimore Gas Appliance & Manufacturing company declared that the gas distributing companies will not assume the responsibility for the use of open top cooking stoves.

Those appearing before the committee included H. D. Schall, Detroit Stove works and Frank J. Silabee, Shreveport, La.

WEALTHY DIVORCEE TO FACE CHARGE OF ATTEMPTED MURDER

San Francisco, March 29.—(U. P.)—Mrs. Agnes Hunter, divorced wife of William M. Hunter, capturing Los Angeles and Texas oil man, will be placed on trial here today, charged with assault with intent to commit murder.

Mrs. Hunter shot and seriously wounded her former husband in the lobby of a local hotel November 26 last, after Hunter is said to have repeatedly refused to her a more liberal allowance for the support of herself and their 5-year-old son.

The shooting occurred just four days after Hunter married Miss Catherine Kinney of this city, who was with him at the time. The couple left San Francisco on December 7 and have not been heard from since by the police.

Although efforts have been made by the police to find Hunter, who is wanted as a witness for the prosecution, his whereabouts have not been ascertained. The trial will proceed without the principal complaining witness, according to Assistant District Attorney Friedman, who will direct the prosecution.

25 Boston Brokers Are Charged With Advertising Stocks

Boston, March 29.—(I. N. S.)—At least 25 arrests of Boston curb brokers are expected to be made before Attorney General Allen ends his crusade against those whom he charges are violating the statutes by advertising stocks for sale without filing a statement of conditions with the corporation commissioner. Already nine brokers have been taken into custody. Four were arraigned in municipal court today. They are John J. Ford, George L. Ware, Joseph Fynney and Edward F. Wallis. All are charged with advertising silver issues illegally.

Another broker, Albert H. Cutter, whose partner is Fynney, was arrested today.

James Benisha, the eleventh broker to surrender, was booked at police headquarters. All of the defendants pleaded not guilty. They were released on bonds and their cases set for hearing in April.

Military Schemes For Handling of Labor Soviet Idea

Washington, March 29.—(I. N. S.)—An attempt to organize labor in a military manner is to be made by soviet Russia, according to advices to the state department here. Four military battalions have been already formed into labor battalions, reports state.

These battalions were no longer needed for military purposes, and will be used for labor purposes in Pograd, the Don region, Ukraine and Siberia.
