At most of the stations the amounts were small. The temperature is below normal in the southwest, and middle western states and above normal in other sections.

Dr. James Elvin, Salem, will tell of the work done and other animals performed during the year. The humane society has been holding its annual meetings in the Unitarian church for 20 years. Dr. T. L. Chased by Chinese—Aroused by the unusual sight of a man hurrying across

the Steel bridge with half a dozen Chinamen stringing out behind him at a safe distance, Inspector Swennes and McCulloch drove up to the man Sunday afternoon and stopped him, to discover he was accused of stealing a can of peas from the store of Low Pond, 45 North Fourth street. Referendum Vote On City Zoning Is Aim of Petitions

A petition for referendum on the city zoning ordinance, recently passed by the city council, is being circulated by members of the "Citizens Anti-Zoning League." The petition was placed in circulation Friday, and according to officers, more than 1000 signatures were secured the first day. It is necessary to secure 5000 signatures if the petition is to be made effective, but members of the league declare they will have 20,000 signers before the end of this week.

SCHAUFF CLAIMS NEW DEVICE INSURES MARK HIT WITH EVERY SHOT

Obviating necessity of all mathematical calculations before gun firing, an ingenious device has been patented by Charles Schauf of Oak Grove. According to Schauf his patent will save thousands of dollars in the past wasted in target practice by "misses," enabling gunners to hit their object every time.

He accomplishes this by means of telescopic sights, one placed behind the gun and two others placed on flat cars which travel on a semi-circular track behind the gun and fixed sight.

In coast defense shooting, should an enemy vessel be seen, the central sight, behind the gun or battery, would immediately sight the vessel. One of the sights on a flat car, depending upon which side of the fixed sight the vessel is, would roll on the track until it completed a right triangle, the fixed sight occupying the apex. An indicator on the gun is so graduated that immedi-

ately the angles of the movable and fixed sights towards the vessel are known, distance to the vessel is automatically computed.

The device can be used for coast defense or frontier defense. It was patented February 3, 1920, Schauf having made application for a patent March 27, 1919.

Subscriptions for Irish Loan Reported To Commission Meet

The American commission on Irish independence held a meeting Sunday afternoon at the Portland hotel, at which was announced the Irish loan subscriptions received to date. Lake and Klamath counties were reported as having \$16,700. State headquarters in the Broadway building will remain open during April, so that all Portland districts may be canvassed.

Resolutions were adopted, setting forth what the commission proclaims to be the real conditions in Ireland, and calling upon congress to give the Emerald Isle international recognition.
