

# ULTIMATUM IS REJECTED BY DANISH RULER

### King Christian X Defies Socialists and Trades Unionists Demanding Reinstatement of Former Premier, Palace Guards

London, March 30.—(I. N. S.)—King Christian X of Denmark has rejected the ultimatum of Socialists and trade unionists demanding the reinstatement of former Premier Zahle, said an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Copenhagen this afternoon. The Socialists and trade unionists threatened a general strike if their demand was not met.

London, March 30.—(I. N. S.)—Clashes occurred during the night at Copenhagen between troops who were guarding the palace of King Christian X and crowds that were clamoring for a republic in Denmark, said an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from the Danish capital this afternoon.

The public square surrounding the Danish king's palace was guarded by soldiers with drawn bayonets, who held back the crowds that moved up and down shouting, "Long live the republic."

The Zahle cabinet is to be replaced at once, according to the Exchange Telegraph dispatch. It stated that Dr. Liebe, a member of the Danish supreme court, had been commissioned to form a new ministry.

The Danish newspaper, Social Demokraten, was quoted as saying:  
"By the anger of the people the king must be shown the cost of defying the unanimous will of the workers."

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**SOCIALISTS PLAN GENERAL STRIKE TO WIN DEMAND**

Copenhagen, March 29. — (U. P.) (Night).—Socialists tonight planned a general strike in protest against the king's action in dismissing the cabinet of Premier Zahle. They characterized the king's action as arbitrary and dictatorial.

The situation tonight was confused. After Zahle had refused to stay in office until a new government could be formed, the king summoned the Liberal leader, Neergaard, charging him with formation of a cabinet. Neergaard, it was believed, will call in the leaders of the various parties of the Left.

King Christian's action was supposed to have been caused by the government's attitude in the plebiscite in the second zone of Schleswig, which went to Germany after the first zone had voted overwhelmingly to join Denmark.

It was charged that the Zehle government did not make sufficient effort to insure a Danish victory in the second zone.
