POLES RESIST REDS IN EAST FRONT BATTLE

WASHINGTON, March 30.—(I. N. S.)—Polish military forces have been successful in resisting the attacks of Bolsheviks on the eastern front and the anti-Bolshevik spirit among the Poles is increasing, dispatches to the state department this afternoon declared.

The reports announced that the Poles expect to enter peace negotiations with the Bolsheviks at Borsulsk, Minsk, April 1, as suggested by the Polish government.

UP TO WOOD HIMSELF TO DISCLOSE SOURCE OF CAMPAIGN FUNDS

New York, March 30.—(I. N. S.)—The reply of Major General Leonard Wood to Senator Borah's challenge to make public a list of his campaign contributors and the amounts will have to come from the general himself. His eastern campaign managers declined today to comment and referred all questions to Chicago headquarters.

"We have nothing to do with the raising of funds," said Representative Norman H. Gould, eastern manager. "Chicago raises the money, we spend it."

Wood headquarters today claimed the absolute pledging of 77 delegates to the general in June. The entire delegations of Arizona with 6, Maine with 12, New Hampshire with 6, New Mexico with 6, and South Dakota with 10 were claimed.

In addition they claimed 3 of Georgia's 14, 8 of North Dakota's 10, 2 of Oklahoma's 20, 10 of Tennessee's 20 and 2 of Virginia's 15.

Only one state was conceded as lost in its entirety. California they conceded to Johnson. They figured on splitting Washington with Pounder, Pennsylvania with Spruille, Ohio with Harding, Massachusetts with Coolidge and Indiana with Watson.

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SOCIALISTS FOUND UNWORTHY TO SIT IN N. Y. ASSEMBLY

Albany, N. Y., March 30.—(U. P.)—Five suspended Socialist members of the New York assembly were declared disloyal and unworthy of their seats in the majority report of the judiciary committee filed today.

A minority report, filed by William S. Evans, one of the 13 members of the committee, asserts that while the five Socialists have been proved disloyal, the assembly has no constitutional right to prescribe loyalty as a test of eligibility for its members and urges they be re-seated.

Regarding evidence tending to show the Socialist party is a revolutionary body, Evans says:

"We cannot try and acquit or convict the Socialist party."

WOULD OUST MEMBERS

The majority report recommends that the assembly vote to declare vacant the seats of the five men—August Claessens, Louis Weidman, Charles Solomon, Samuel A. De Witt and Samuel Orr. It holds that all charges made against them on the opening day of the session have been fully sustained; that the Socialist party has been proved to advocate force and violence, for overthrow of the United States government, and that the American Socialists are in full accord and sympathy with the Russian soviet government.

Further, the majority report urges legislation which would in effect prevent the Socialist party from occupying a place on the official ballot.

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Basement of New Community Hall Is Dug by Grangers

The Dalles, March 30.—Members of the Nansene grange of Wasco county have raised by popular subscription \$5000 with which to erect a modern grange and community hall at Nansene. Approximately 75 farmers turned out and in one day excavated the basement. Merchants from The Dalles and farmers in the immediate neighborhood are supporting the hall, the lumber for which has been purchased. Officers of the grange are: Ernest Tabler, president; John Godchneck, vice president; H. Fish, secretary-treasurer.

peated objections from the state as to the action of the I. W. W. organization as a whole at Butte also brought the observation from the court that inasmuch as the prosecution had been allowed to introduce testimony showing the bad side of the organization, surely the defense was entitled to give testimony in its favor.

The witness Shannon said he had been a member of the I. W. W. since 1906 and that he had represented Silver Bow county in the Montana legislature for two terms, 1903-1905. He is 57 years old. Recently, Shannon said, he had been employed in the shipyards at Seattle.

During the 1917 strike in Butte, Shannon testified, the I. W. W. asked the government to take over the mines during the war, fixing the copper price at 22 cents a pound and its members would go to work. At that time, it was testified, the operators were getting 35 cents a pound.

Violence was opposed.

During the strike, said the witness, the position of the I. W. W. constantly was against violence. At every meeting, he narrated, members were admonished against violence, and this same caution was printed in the daily strike bulletins.

The strikers had access to the powder magazines in the mines and did not take advantage of the opportunity to wreak destruction, had they been so minded, he added.

Another member of the I. W. W., Thomas McKinley, secretary-treasurer of local 225, Shipyard Workers' Industrial union of the I. W. W., Seattle, was the first witness called by the defense.

SABOTAGE IS BARRED

Publications of the organization were censored by the central propaganda committee of Seattle, he said, and nothing regarding sabotage was allowed to go in circulation. Defense Attorney Vandervier had previously maintained that no central propaganda committee was maintained at Seattle.

The defense scored a victory in the court's ruling permitting the I. W. W. publication on the industrial relations commission report, known among the members as the "I. W. W. Bible," to go in evidence. The state objected that it was incompetent evidence, in that the I. W. W. did not publish the report, which was issued from the government printing bureau, but copied portions of it.

"The Bible" went in, however, on the court's ruling that anything put into circulation by the I. W. W. as published matter, even a copy of a speech, was propaganda, and therefore admissible.
