Moderately high pressure prevails on the Atlantic coast, in California, Nevada, and Southern Utah, and in Northern Alberta and Saskatchewan. In other parts of the country the pressure is low, the principal depressions being central in Missouri and Washington. Precipitation has occurred at a large number of northwestern stations, and over a broad area reaching from Colorado eastward to Tennessee. The following heavy precipitation is reported: Memphis, Tenn., 3.4; Los Angeles, 1.1; San Francisco, 1.1; Seattle, 1.1; Portland, 1.1; and in the lower Lake region and lower Mississippi valley. The temperature is generally below normal in the West and above normal in the East and South.
