

\$141,183 CHECK IS HANDLED TO COUNTY

One-Quarter Share of Automobile
License Receipts Received;
Highway Fund Swelled.

Multnomah county's first revenue from the state automobile license law was realized Tuesday when County Auditor S. B. Martin received a check for \$141,183.43, one-quarter of the total net license proceeds of the county.

This covers license money paid from January 1 to March 15, in the county. Under the act, which was passed by the 1919 legislature, the state highway fund gets three-quarters of the net revenue and the county in which the licenses are paid, one-quarter.

In Multnomah county the total net was \$564,733.72, of which \$423,550.29 goes into the highway fund. Throughout the state, in the period mentioned, the grand total of license moneys paid in, and this includes chauffeur's licenses as well as those of motor vehicles, was \$1,526,194.63, and of this amount the state fund gets \$1,144,645.97.

This is the first payment under the new statute, and probably will be the largest of the year, as by far the greater percentage of licenses are passed out the first two months of the year. The payment is made from the secretary of state's office.

Statutory provision is that the county money may be used on any roads in the state, with the consideration that the road to which it is applied is a direct trunk leading into the county furnishing the funds. The county commission is authorized to designate to the state highway commission how the fund is to be used.

Teachers' Pay Held By Rural Directors To Be Inadequate

That rural school boards in Multnomah county should pay teachers salaries adequate to meet the increased cost of living, including the expense of six weeks' normal training during the summer, was the substance of a resolution adopted Tuesday at a meeting of the county school directors' commission.

No definite minimum figures were decided upon and it is understood that the suggestions made by the committee recently appointed, of \$900 for beginners, \$1200 for teachers fresh from normal schools and \$1320 for experienced normal school teachers, paid on the 12 payment plan, were tabled.
