

O. A. C. LECTURES IN PORTLAND ON RAISING FRUIT AND POULTRY

A series of week end lectures on fruit raising, gardening, poultry raising and other similar subjects has been announced by the Oregon Agricultural college to be given in Portland every Friday evening in April and May, beginning this week.

Two lectures will be given April 2. Professor W. S. Brown will discuss "Insect Enemies and Diseases of Our Fruits and Their Control" in room C. Central library, and Professor E. B. Pitts will talk on the "Care, Feeding and Management of the City Cow," at the East Side library, East Eleventh and Alder streets. Both lectures will take place at 8 p. m.

The remaining lectures to be given in April are:

April 9—"Spring Gardening Work," "Soil," "Fertilization," "Seeding," "Transplanting," etc.

April 16—"Making the Home Grounds Attractive," by Professor A. L. Peck.

April 23—"Small Fruits—Care and Management," by Henry Hartman.

April 30—"Vegetable Garden Management in Late Spring and Summer," "Insect Control," and "Vegetables for Fall and Winter."

These lectures are free to the public and everyone interested is urged to attend.

Where practicable the speakers will give field demonstrations on Saturday afternoons following the lectures.

Fight on Scabies In Klamath to Be Begun Immediately

Klamath Falls, April 1.—For the purpose of stamping out sheep scabies, which has constantly increased in its destruction in Klamath county flocks during the past few years, a quarantine order affecting all sheep in this county except those on the Indian reservation has been issued by the state livestock sanitary board, effective today. Regulations were adopted by Klamath County Wool Growers' association urging such an order. Sheep moved to California ranges for spring lambing must have an inspector's certificate showing that they have been properly treated.

An effort will be made to reach every home and business establishment in Klamath county by committees of citizens who are conducting a community survey for the purpose of ascertaining "what we have and what we need," in the way of civic and rural life and resources. A house to house canvass will be made with questionnaires.

Scuffling for the possession of a shotgun nearly cost Hayden Bell, 37-year-old son of H. H. Bell of Klamath Falls, his leg, when the piece was accidentally discharged while in the hands of his brother, aged 18. A wound three inches long and an inch deep in the calf of the leg made it necessary for the youth to be confined to the hospital.

The Klamath county grand jury is in session for the first time since last November.

Baker Depot Is to Be Provided With Drinking Fountains

Baker, April 1.—Permission was granted by the O. W. R. & N. Tuesday to the Baker county Chamber of Commerce to install two drinking fountains near the depot. The pedestals will be furnished by the chamber, constructed of quartz ore. The fountains will be installed and supplied with water by the city.

Organization has been effected and officers elected by the Haines high school alumni. Miss Nellie Christensen was elected president; Mrs. Kitty Bricket.



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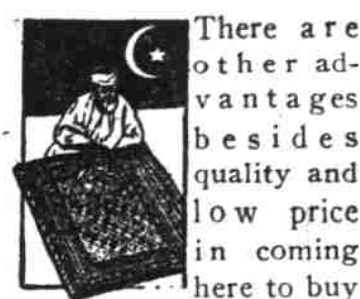
