

RHEA LUPER SEEKS G. O. P. NOMINATION FOR STATE OFFICE

Rhea Luper, assistant state engineer, has made formal announcement of his candidacy for the Republican nomination as public service commissioner for the Eastern Oregon district and will contest with H. H. Corey, incumbent, for the position.

Though born in Lane county Mr. Luper spent his boyhood and early manhood on a Morrow county ranch and is well acquainted with people and conditions existing in the eastern section of the state, where, before entering the service of the engineering department, he followed his profession of civil engineering for a number of years. In announcing his candidacy Mr. Luper says: "I believe that as a technically trained man I can be of particular service to the people of Eastern Oregon as a member of the public service commission."

I have always been of the opinion that at least one member of the commission should be a qualified civil engineer. In the valuation of railways and other public utilities and the regulation of rates, practices and service, the commission is almost entirely dependent on the advice of expert engineers and on a correct analysis of engineering data. It is my belief that a fair and just decision, the work of the commission is seriously hampered because the force of engineers is not sufficient to obtain the necessary engineering data with promptness.

I was raised on an Eastern Oregon ranch, received my education in the Heppner schools, and my engineering training in the Oregon Agricultural college. For 10 years I have engaged in the practice of civil and irrigation engineering in Eastern Oregon, and my work as an assistant state engineer and as engineer for the state water board has given me an intimate acquaintance with the people of Eastern Oregon and their problems.

If I am nominated and elected, I will act with equal fairness to the public and public utilities alike, believing that the welfare of one is not independent of the other. I will not tolerate any unjust rates or regulations on the part of any railroad, telephone, express, electric, water or irrigation company or any other public utility, and it will be my aim to see that a sufficient number of cars are provided for the transportation of Eastern Oregon products. I will also endeavor to reorganize the department, coordinating the work of the various employees so as to secure the highest efficiency of the force and prompt and satisfactory results to the public.

SWEENEY RESIGNS FROM COMMITTEE OF LEGION

Thomas A. Sweeney, candidate for the Republican nomination for congress from the third district, yesterday tendered his resignation as a member of the department executive committee of the American Legion of which he has been an active member since last September when he was elected by the first convention in Oregon of the Legion. ignation was handed to William B. Follett, department commander, following Mr. Sweeney's entry into the congressional contest. Mr. Follett said the resignation had been accepted in conformity with provisions of the national constitution of the Legion, which requires such action in the cases of active entry into politics by Legion members holding elective offices in that organization.

"I regret very much that I have to give up this work," said Mr. Sweeney yesterday, in commenting upon his resignation, "but my continued presence on the department executive committee might be misunderstood. I have been only too glad to give my time to this important work in the past, believing the organization of veterans has a great service to perform in the state and nation in perpetuation of true democracy and individual rights."

MAN WHO IS ARRANGING FOR G. O. P. CONVENTION, IN CITY

A. T. Hert, chairman of the committee on arrangements for the Republican national convention, was a fleeting Portland visitor Sunday. He reached Portland Sunday morning, accompanied by Mrs. Hert, registered at the Benson, met a few friends who knew of his coming, motored out the Columbia highway during the afternoon and left Sunday evening for Seattle and the East.

Mr. Hert came to the Pacific coast some weeks ago to escape the rigors of the eastern winter climate and to recuperate from an extended season of hard work incident to getting the machinery of the Chicago convention oiled and running in good order, for it is upon his committee on arrangements that all the varied pre-convention details fall. Every little thing from re-

serving headquarters for state delegations to fixing the seating plan of the convention hall come under the jurisdiction of Mr. Hert's committee, and it is no little job to get the paper all put together so they will run without friction when the delegates commence to arrive and the day for the big meeting finally dawns.

From Seattle, Mr. Hert will go direct to Chicago to take charge of the final work that has to be done before June 8, the date of the convention.

MCGEE MAY STUMP OREGON IN BEHALF OF JOHNSON

Charles A. A. McGee, past supreme dictator of the Loyal Order of Moose, is to spend two weeks in Oregon in the interest of Senator Hiram W. Johnson's campaign for the Republican nomination for president. If Sanfield McDonald, Johnson's state manager, has his way, Senator Kenyon of Iowa is also expected to come to the state for a speaking tour if present plans do not go awry.

McGee is a noted campaign speaker and was a follower of the Roosevelt standard in 1912. A strong friendship existed between him and Roosevelt, so much so that the former president named him the basis of an article which he wrote under the title of "The Typical American." McDonald has asked national headquarters of the Johnson campaign to have McGee sent to Oregon for a two weeks' tour of the state. The same request has been made regarding Senator Kenyon.

Senator Johnson himself will also make a tour of the state, starting at Baker in Eastern Oregon, coming down the O.W. R. & N. main line and going from Portland to Southern Oregon over the Southern Pacific line and stopping at

the principal points. He will return to Portland for his closing meeting. The itinerary has been mapped out by McDonald, but will not be announced until Senator Johnson has approved the dates or suggested new ones more convenient for him.

Traffic Collision Puts Ex-Soldier Back in Hospital

T. W. Ingram, 21 years old, an overseas veteran whose home is in The Dalles, was discharged at 7 o'clock Wednesday evening from St. Vincent's hospital, where an old battle wound in his leg was treated.

At Twenty-third and Washington streets at 7:05 o'clock a streetcar collided with an automobile and this ex-soldier, cut and bruised, was returned to the hospital.

With him was J. F. Reinke, who drove in his automobile from The Dalles to motor his friend home. He also was hurt. Their injuries are not serious.

Director Thomas Is Missing; In East for Benson Polytechnic

School officials have as yet received no intimation of the whereabouts of Director George B. Thomas, who went to Washington, D. C., to select equipment for Benson Polytechnic school for use in the work of the federal board of vocational education in the rehabilitation of disabled soldiers.

Since Thomas' telegrams asking if 150 soldiers might be accommodated at the school, sent from the Willard hotel, at which an answer failed to reach the director, no word has been received.

Thomas left with authority to purchase \$7000 worth of machinery by the district and with an allowance of \$1250 for his personal expenses.

Portables Planned To House Students Of Local Schools

Approximately 30 more rooms will be needed to care for the pupils in Portland's elementary schools next year, estimates of Superintendent D. A. Grout show. More portables will probably be built, adding to the collection of more than 50 already owned by the district.
