

GOOD FRIDAY TO BE OBSERVED IN FITTING MANNER

Portland churches will observe Good Friday with special services and music expressing the tone of the occasion. Both Protestant and Catholic churches will celebrate the anniversary of the Lord's supper and the crucifixion of Christ.

St. John's Episcopal church at Mill-vaukie will hold a Good Friday service at 8 p. m., when the vicar, the Rev. John D. Rice, will review the scenes of the passion, making applications to present day conditions. On Easter Sunday St. John's will celebrate the Holy Communion at 11 a. m., featured by special music in which the Sunday school choir will participate. Children's service will be held at 3 p. m., when programs will be given by the Sunday school children and an address will be made by the vicar.

The Highland Congregational church will commemorate the crucifixion of Christ Friday night with services at 7:45 o'clock, including devotions and three short addresses. There will also be music from "Parafal" and "He Was Despaired" from Handel's "Messiah."

Archbishop Christie celebrated solemn pontifical mass at 9 o'clock this morning, consecrating the holy oils to be used during the coming year. Tonight the Tenebrae will be chanted by the choir, clergy and sanctuary, followed by a sermon by Father Edwin O'Hara at 7:45 o'clock.

St. Mary's pro-cathedral will observe Good Friday by an 8 o'clock morning mass, a service from 1:20 p. m. to 3 o'clock and an evening service at 7:45. Veneration of the cross and the mass of the pre-sanctified will be features of the morning service. In the afternoon a special choir will sing "The Seven Last Words of Christ," under the direction of Frederick W. Goodrich. Father Campbell will deliver seven short sermons during the oratorio. Saturday morning solemn mass will be held at the pro-cathedral from 7 to 9 o'clock for blessing of the baptismal font.

Christ as Antidote For Social Disease Is Urged by Bishop

"Christ's entrance into society is a panacea for all social disease," said Bishop William H. Washington of the United Brethren church who spoke at the Panthea theatre at noon today under auspices of the Portland Federation of Churches.

"Christ is an antidote for all political disorder. Where Christ enters the national life there is peace and prosperity. Our vital question is not capital and labor but it is that of the application of Christian principles to this question. To accomplish this a revival of a national scope is needed that will permeate the industrial sphere with the spirit of Jesus Christ. We need a national revival of religion to check the growing tide of un-Godliness."

Dr. Howard Agnew Johnston of the First Presbyterian church will give the last evangelistic talk of the series on Good Friday.

Spanish-American War Veterans to Hold Big Meeting

United Spanish War Veterans numbering 700 will be in Portland from all parts of the state on April 6 to attend a big meeting in Veterans hall, 575 Courthouse building. Arrangements for their entertainment are being completed today by Camp Commander H. V. Reed of Scout Young camp here.

Every post department commander living in Oregon will be present. Marshfield camp will have a committee present to tell of arrangements for the next department encampment, which will be held there.

A big army "feed" will be served to the visiting veterans.

Among those to be present are L. W. Hyde of Hillsboro, one of four national officials of the Veterans; A. Tyner Woolpert, department commander with A. M. Southwick and C. W. Brant, his department adjutant and quartermaster, from Salem, and Ed S. Houker, junior vice commander of Albany and delegation.

Frank B. Tichenor, department inspector, will inspect the camp.

Portland Leads in Community Service, Declares Carrigan

Portland is serving as a model for many other Pacific coast cities in developing better and happier communities along the lines urged by Portland community service, according to John B. Carrigan, press representative of the Pacific coast district for national community service, who is in the city following a survey of the Pacific states.

Portland's leadership in this community field he attributes to her early adoption of the community service idea, the Rose City being first on the coast to adopt the program for continuance of the finer and better community life, which was the finest heritage of the war.

Other cities engaged at this time in raising community service budgets are San Francisco, for \$40,000; Oakland, for \$50,000, and Tacoma, for \$20,000.

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Demand for Lane County Goats Big; O. A. C. in Market

Eugene, April 1.—The Lane County Purebred Livestock association is receiving calls from all parts of the state for names of goat owners, according to W. A. Ayres, secretary. Even the Oregon Agricultural college is in the market for goats. Ayres estimated that a carload shipment of goats could be made from the county if owners of sufficient number would combine on a shipment.

Rural school teachers are contracting at \$100 a month where they have had some, teaching experience. Indications are that the minimum of \$75 a month is in the discard. One district contracted with its two teachers at a flat rate of \$1000 for the year, giving the directors the option of holding school in session either eight or nine months.

Fred Wentworth was elected treasurer of Eugene by the city council, succeeding A. T. Fraley, resigned. The salary is \$140 a month.

Due to the mix-up of Eugene merchants to agree on a closing hour, retail clerks of the city threaten to form a union and join the Federation of Labor. The closing hour now varies from 7 o'clock and the clerks want a uniform hour. Three fourths of the merchants prefer a 5 o'clock closing.

The precipitation at Eugene for March was 4.12 inches. The average for 20 years in this section of the valley is 4.59 inches. There is still a shortage of 6 inches for the year.

First Full Carload Of Flour Shipped by New Pendleton Mill

Pendleton, April 1.—The first carload of flour produced by the new Collins Flour mills was shipped to Portland Wednesday for export by the Government Grain corporation. Between 800 and 900 barrels are being milled each day and hereafter two carloads will be shipped until an order for 10,000 barrels is filled.

Summer Camp of R. O. T. C. Men Is to Be at Camp Kearny

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, April 1.—Camp Kearny, near San Diego, Cal., will be the place of summer camp for infantry R. O. T. C. men this year, instead of the Presidio at San Francisco, according to word received by Major J. K. Partello. The camp is four miles from the Mexican border.

H. S. Peterson and E. R. Carroll of the Seattle office of the board of vocational education, are visiting the campus. Peterson is training officer in trades and industries, and Carroll in commerce.
