BIG YEAR AHEAD FOR TRAP SHOOTERS OF UNITED STATES

Annual Grand American Classic Is Set for Cleveland, Ohio, August 25 to 28.

NEW YORK, April 2.—(I. N. S.)—Nineteen-twenty is going to be a banner year for the trapshooters.

Thirty-six states and four Canadian provinces have granted registration for championship matches and tournaments during the year.

The first trapshooting event of any importance will be held in Arizona in April, starting the ninth, and from this date on until the Grand American Handicap is shot off at Cleveland, Ohio, August 25-28, the shooters will be busy at the traps almost continually. Sectional handicaps are on the schedule this year and the many state championships are expected to bring out bigger fields of shooters than ever before.

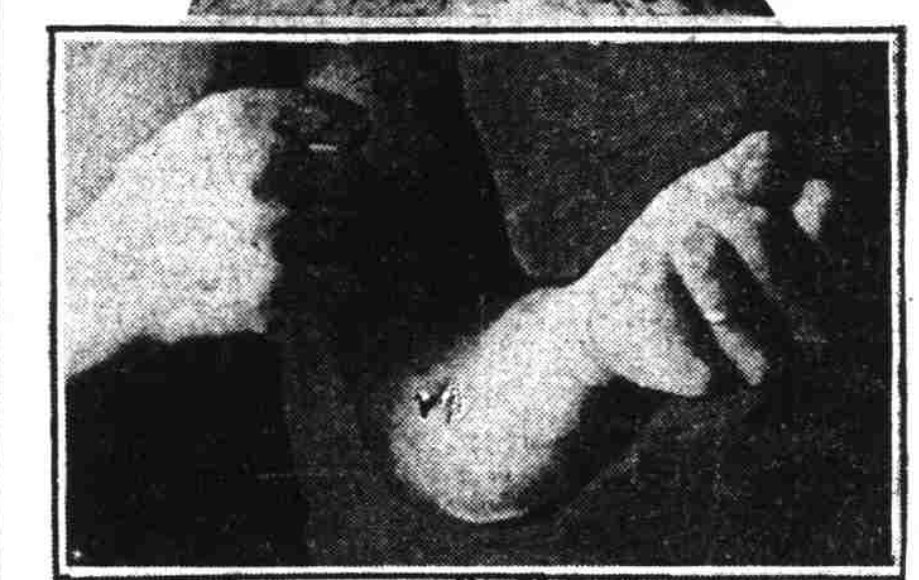
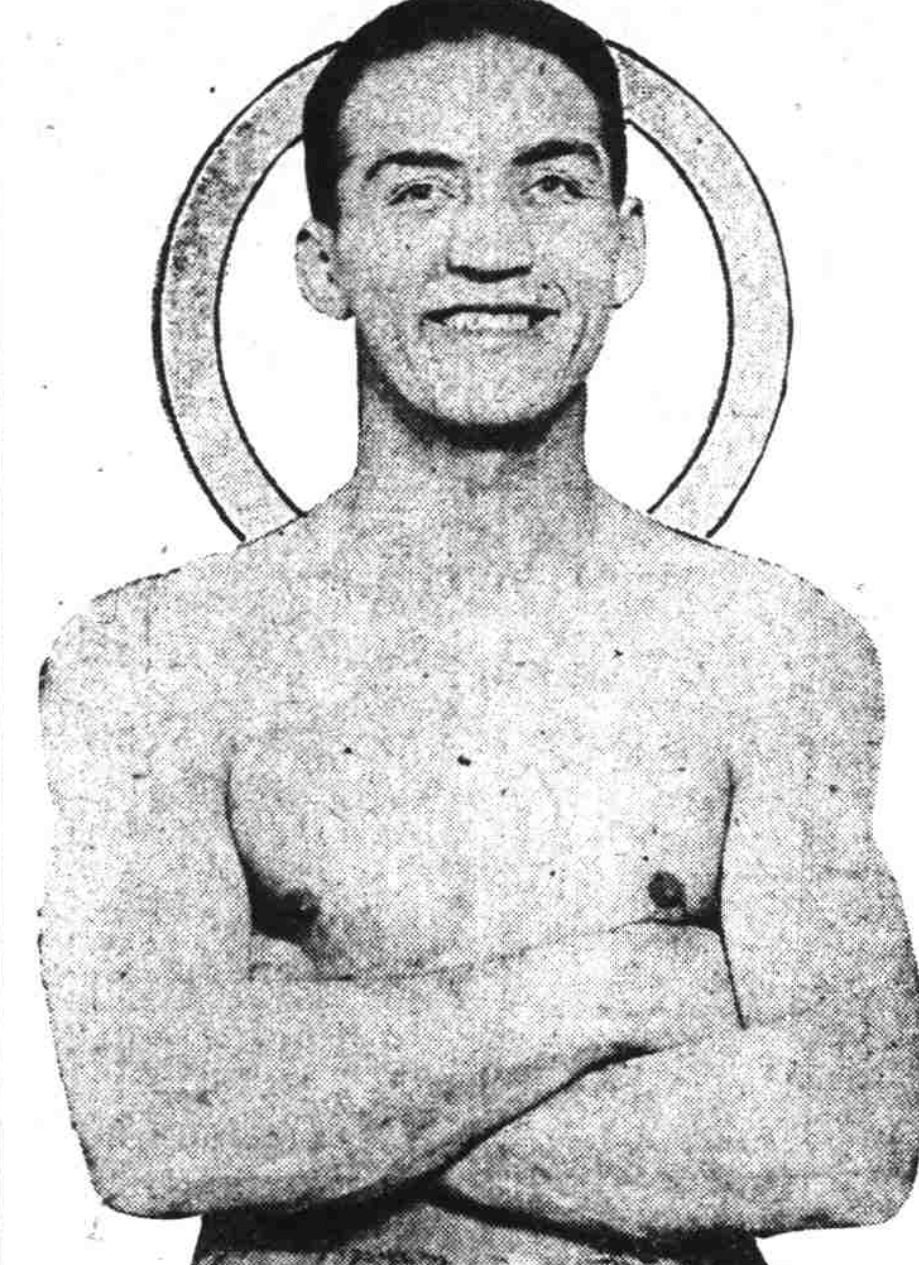

Every Boxer Claims Title Woods Full Championships

NEW YORK, April 3.—(U. P.)—Claim a title and you can have it. That seems to be the theory of modern fighters and wrestlers.

It's a cinch to become a champion when acquisition of the crown entails no more effort than the wind of a few words from some manager.

The woods are full of "A. E. F. champions," "Inter-Allied champions," "French champions," "English champions," etc. The records do not bear out the claims of most of the assuming champions and near champions.

Holders of the world's title are established. The International Boxing Union has recognized as legitimate the crowns held by Jack Dempsey, heavyweight; Mike O'Dowd, middleweight; Jack Britton, welterweight; Benny Leonard, lightweight; Johnny Kilbane, featherweight; Pete Herman, bantamweight; and Jimmy Wilde, flyweight. The title of light heavyweight champion was declared vacant.

The European champions recognized by the I. B. U. are Jimmy Wilde, flyweight; Charles Lehoucq, France, bantamweight; Albert Badou, France, welterweight; and Georges Carpentier, light heavyweight and heavyweight. The featherweight, lightweight and middleweight divisions were declared championless.

Most of the haze surrounds the claimants of the "Inter-Allied" championship held by the athletic committee of the United States army, headed by Colonel Walt C. Johnson, under whose supervision the "military Olympic" was held. The following "Inter-Allied" champions are listed:

Bantamweight, "Digger" Evans of Australia; featherweight, Louis De Bonthieu, France; lightweight, Benny McNeill, Philadelphia; welterweight, Joe Atwood, Canada; middleweight, Eddie Egan, now captain of the Yale boxing team and the amateur champion of the world; light heavyweight, Spauld of Italy; heavyweight, Bob Martin of Akron.

The A. E. F. champions recognized by the army athletic board are: Bantamweight, Charles Rubel, Audubon, Iowa; light heavyweight, Ralph Parcaut, of Royal, Iowa; middleweight, Cal Farley, Minneapolis; welterweight, Pete Metropolis, Gary, Ind.; lightweight, Johnny Vores, Chicago; featherweight, Louis Frazer, Pittsburgh; and bantamweight, Oscar Hansen, Chicago.

The recognized national amateur boxing champions are: D. Kaminis, New York, 108 pounds; Ashton Denze, New Orleans, 115 pounds; William P. Corbett, Somerville, 125 pounds; Frank B. Cassidy, New York, 135 pounds; Dave Rosenberger, New York, 145 pounds; Sam Lagonia, New York, 155 pounds; Al Rocha, Somerville, 175 pounds; and Edward P. Egan, Denver, heavyweight.

Los Angeles, April 3.—Although the track and field Olympic games tryouts for the Pacific coast slated for Pasadena are little less than three months away, officials of the Ogden Athletic club have written to Robert Weaver, president of the Southern Pacific Association of the Amateur Athletic Union, to the effect that at least 12 star athletes of the Ogden club will be on hand to contest June 26. Entries from every athletic center west of the Rocky mountains is expected to send its quota to the tryouts.

THERE will be no tie score game played Sunday between the Waverleigh Athletic club and Peninsula soccer football teams on the Columbia Park grounds, according to an announcement of the managers.

The two elevens are starting at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon, slated to battle to a finish, rain or shine. Three contests have been staged between the two squads, the first resulting in a 1 to 1 tie, the second in a 3 to 1 victory for the Waverleigh representatives, while last Sunday they played the most exciting soccer football game ever seen in these parts, according to the largest crowd that ever witnessed a soccer match in Portland. It resulted 1 to 1.

It has been agreed to play to a finish should the count happen to be a tie at the end of the two 45-minute regulation periods, says Robert M. D. Rankin, secretary of the association. The elevens are tied for the 1919-20 championship of the circuit, and the winners of Sunday's fracas will receive the beautiful Cameron trophy for one year.

NEW YORK, April 3.—(I. N. S.)—After five weeks of intensive training in the Southland most of the 16 major league teams have broken camp and started trekking northward or will do so by the first of the week.

Most of the clubs enjoyed favorable training weather at their base camps this spring and the players, for the most part, are in good condition to open the season a week from next Wednesday.

WEATHER HANDICAPS

Several teams that have been hampered by the weather for the last week, particularly the Giants, Red Sox, Tigers and Braves, have run into much bad baseball weather and some very poor playing fields.

Of the three Greater New York clubs the Giants appear to be in the best condition. McGraw's men found Texas weather favorable and despite gloomy forecasts that have been made for them they look like a team that may set a fast pace when the season opens.

The fine showing made by Frank Frisch at third base and George Kelly at first has balanced the loss of Chase and Zimmerman. McGraw's pitching staff is apparently in great condition and the weakest spot in the Giant machine today is second base, where the veteran Larry Doyle is making a brave stand.

DODGERS APPEAR STRONG

The Brooklyn Dodgers have shown surprising strength in their series with the Yankees. Manager Robinson has a club that will bear watching and his pitchers are ready. The success of Jimmy Johnston at third base and the "discovery" of Bernie Neils, who is filling Tommy Griffith's shoes, put an end to Robinson's biggest problems.

The Yankees apparently are being trailed once again by the hoodoo that held away in Bill Donovan's time. The injury to Wilson Fawcett and the retirement of Frank Baker completely upset the plans of Miller Huggins. Derrill Pratt, veteran second baseman, has evidently lost his grip and the Yanks are destined to start the season with two young players on the infield—Bob Muesel at third, and Arapah Ward at second. Rumors along the baseball railroads today hinted that Huggins may close a deal with the Red Sox for Oscar Vitt, using Ping Bodie as trading material.
