

RAILROAD HEADS VISIT PORTLAND

Accompanied by heads of various departments of the Northern Pacific railroad, J. M. Hannaford, president of that line, arrived at noon today on a special train from Grays Harbor. The party left St. Paul about a week ago on an inspection trip over the Northern Pacific lines and will leave for the East this evening to attend an annual meeting of directors of the road at Chicago.

President Hannaford had no criticism to offer as to the management of the Northern Pacific under federal control. The new railroad bill under which the lines are returned to their owners is capable of a variety of interpretations, he said, and it is doubtful if new construction on a large scale will be undertaken by any of the roads during the current year.

NEW TRACKAGE PLANNED

The Northern Pacific company owns 40 per cent of the stock of the Northern Pacific Terminal company, which controls the yards at the Union station. Congestion of traffic in these yards will in the near future necessitate considerable construction of new trackage, the only alternative being the use of the North Bank station by the Great Northern line.

This matter will be determined by the officials of the terminal company during Hannaford's stay here, it is announced.

GIVEN LOCAL RECEPTION

The party was met at the station by President Gilman of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle line, and a committee of the Chamber of Commerce. Woodworth is well known in Portland and others of the party have been frequent visitors here. Tyler attained considerable prominence in the United States railroad administration, succeeding Carl Gray as director of the division of operations. Following the return of the roads to their owners Tyler succeeded George T. Slade as vice president in charge of operations on the Northern Pacific.

—HAVE YOU REGISTERED?— Mysterious Phase Features Death of Former Navy Man

Ernest Broilard, aged 30, was found dead at 6 o'clock this morning at the foot of the stairs leading to his apartment at 150 Eleventh street.

Broilard, who was an ex-service man, is believed to have met death from natural causes. He had been a sufferer from chronic throat trouble, according to a doctor who examined him some time ago. Deputy Coroner Goetsch and the police are investigating to ascertain the exact cause of his death. An honorable discharge from the navy, dated April 5, 1919, at Mare Island found among Broilard's belongings does not show any record of throat trouble, according to the police.

Broilard had been in Portland for 10 days and was employed by the Portland Railway, Light & Power company. Goetsch has notified his parents who live in Wilber, Neb., and will hold the young man's body pending word from them.

—HAVE YOU REGISTERED?— First Registration Drive Expected to Add to Enrollment

The drive for registration of voters started off today with every prospect of the largest enrollment for any day since the books were opened in January.

Figures in County Clerk J. W. Beveridge's office indicated the complete registration Saturday was 457, the largest day yet, but it is likely that this will be surpassed today, it was said. The total registration to date is \$3,824, of which \$2,629 are Republicans, 19,249 are Democrats and the balance, consisting of all other leanings, 4216.

Ten booths in outlying sections of the city, with special deputies in charge, are now in operation. They will be open from 10 a. m. to 7 p. m. daily until next Monday night. The registration office at the court house, beginning today, will remain open until 9 p. m. until the books are closed on April 20.

Europe Is Sending Many War Widows And Girls to U. S.

New York, April 5.—While most of the persons emigrating from America are male workers who have thrown up their factory, mill or mine jobs to take their savings, averaging \$200 each, to their native land, immigrants coming to the United States are largely composed of industrial non-producers, including thousands of war widows, it was declared today by the Inter-Racial council.

Sixty per cent of the immigrants who during the last few months have reached this port have been women and girls, it was stated. The council expressed the belief that foreign governments are placing obstacles in the way of emigration of able bodied male workers, while encouraging women to seek homes in America.

More than half a billion dollars in savings has been taken from this country since the armistice by workmen returning to their own countries. It was estimated today, and another quarter billion will be taken away when transportation and passport conditions are improved.

—HAVE YOU REGISTERED?— Three Are Arrested For Violation of the Prohibition Statute

The police arrested three men Sunday on charges of violation of the prohibition law and are holding them for federal investigation. Michael Koberech was arrested at Seventeenth and Lovejoy streets when the officers found a complete still concealed in a gunny sack he was carrying. Marion Boemere, 408 North Sixteenth street, is under arrest because the police found 15 gallons of wine and 9 quarts of moonshine whiskey at his house. Mark Domatz was arrested at Sixteenth and Thurman streets. The police say he had six pints of moonshine in his possession. The above arrests were made by Patrolmen Fair, Smith and Powell of the first night relief, who have been working on liquor cases for Captain Inskeep. During March these men made 51 arrests. Their convictions netted the city \$1100 in fines, according to a report submitted to the captain. They confiscated 83 gallons of wine, 145 pints of whiskey and one still.

—HAVE YOU REGISTERED?— Auto Salesman Is Fined \$100 in Case Of Reckless Driving

E. P. Matthews, an automobile salesman, was fined \$100 in the municipal court this morning on a charge of reckless driving preferred by Motorcycle Patrolman T. C. Freiberg. Freiberg arrested Matthews Sunday evening after an accident at Ninth and Couch streets. Matthews' car struck an automobile in charge of Antonio Ackerman of 841 Ninety-fourth street. Three-year-old Roy Ackerman was injured. A very small amount of wine, found by Freiberg, was introduced as evidence against Matthews.

—HAVE YOU REGISTERED?— Julius Meier Buys Old Maxwell Home

Negotiations were closed this morning for the sale of Mrs. Maxwell's home at 721 King's Court to Julius L. Meier, head of the Meier & Frank company. The price was not made public, but it is understood the sum paid was approximately \$25,000. Meier has occupied the property as a home for several years and will continue to reside there.

SEN. CHAMBERLAIN IS BACK IN SENATE

Washington, April 5.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL.)—Senator Chamberlain returned to his seat in the senate today, having recovered from the effects of a minor operation upon his ear. He returns just in time to take part in consideration of the army reorganization bill, in which he is much interested.

NEW HOPE SEEN FOR SOLDIER AID AND RECLAMATION BILL

Washington, April 5.—New hope for reclamation on a large scale, perhaps practical adoption of plans of western governors for ultimate expenditure of \$250,000,000, comes today with the appointment of a subcommittee of the house ways and means committee to prepare a soldiers' aid bill. Representative Hawley was named chairman of the subcommittee dealing with soldier settlement, with Mott of New York, Fear of Wisconsin, Republicans, and Hull of Tennessee and Dickinson of Missouri, Democrats. He expresses confidence that substantial funds will be provided for reclamation and that the plan of the western governors is likely to be followed.

Appropriations will be spread over 10 years or longer, probably starting with \$10,000,000 or \$15,000,000 next year. Leaders in both houses are practically

agreed that soldier bonus legislation, which will be part of the same bill, must pass. The present outlook is that the bonus plan will be accompanied by direct taxation, either sales or consumption taxes, and that only a small part of the expense, of any, will be covered by bond issues.

McNary Bill Passes Washington, April 5.—Senator McNary's bill enlarging Crater lake national park to include the Diamond lake region passed the senate today.

—HAVE YOU REGISTERED?— Move in House Aims At Quick Repeal of Seven Wartime Acts

Washington, April 5.—(I. N. S.)—Representative Wright of Georgia this afternoon introduced in the house a resolution for immediate repeal of the following war time acts: Selective service act; act creating the war finance corporation; the war housing act; the act regulating use of explosives; the Overman act; the soldiers' and sailors' civil relief act, and the trading with the enemy act.

Washington, April 5.—(U. P.)—House and senate conferees today agreed to the postoffice appropriations bill, with an amendment authorizing an air mail service between New York and San Francisco via Cleveland and Omaha.

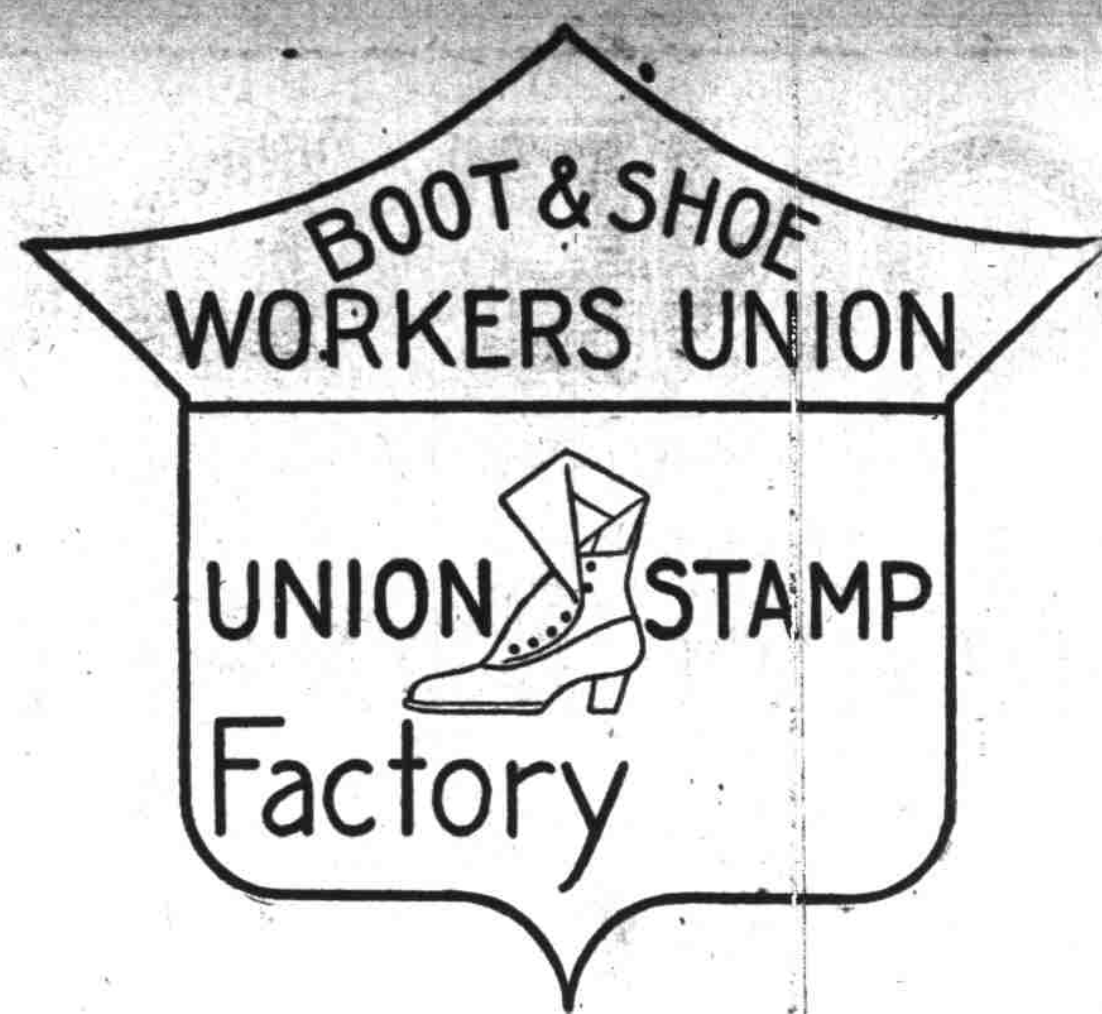
