Rockslide Blocks Pacific Highway in Vicinity of Kelso

Kelso, Wash., April 6.—The Pacific Highway was completely blocked at Rocky Point, two miles north of Kelso, Sunday by a heavy rock slide which buried the road to a depth of several feet. The county has a crew clearing the road.

As the west side highway between Kelso and Castlerock was closed a short time ago when the Cowlitz river cut into the road at the Hagle place this slide stops all travel between Kelso and Castlerock. North of Castlerock the condition of the highway is also bad. Travel must go over the west side road, and practically all machines must be towed through one bad mud hole.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, April 6.—After an egg-laying career of 15 years, Granny, a grade Plymouth Rock hen owned by Leston C. Rice, North Fifteenth street, Corvallis, is dead and has been buried in state by the owner's family. Granny was 16 years old, and her death ended what is considered one of the longest laying careers known here. She was exhibited as a prodigy at the Benton county corn show last November and attracted much attention there. She has produced eggs regularly for 15 years and successfully raised a brood almost every season. Ten of her eggs out of a dozen laid when she was 15 years old hatched strong chicks. During the present spring the old hen had laid 15 eggs. She was normally active and seemed possessed of abundant vitality until the last week.

PORTLAND LIKELY TO OBTAIN VOCATIONAL ENGINEERING SCHOOL

Portland will probably be the home within the next few weeks of an engineering school under the federal board for vocational training according to the announcement by Alex R. Bailey, in charge of the school, who is here preparing to transfer his activities from Seattle to the Benson Polytechnic school.

Bailey has been making plans with Principal Cleveland at Benson and a definite decision will be ready by morning, he believes. Other branches of federal education have been or will be established at Benson, but the engineering school is something new, in which work will be confined to returned soldiers who are disabled. Bailey will be the chief instructor.

If the school is transferred to Portland, and it will be so far as Bailey is concerned, 25 pupils will come from Seattle to study here. The class will be augmented when it is established.

The proposed school provides a thorough training in steam engineering from six to eight months of intensive training and will be the only one west of Cincinnati, drawing pupils from all Western states. The men will be paid while learning a trade.

"Portland's advantages for this work are superior to those of Seattle and Benson offers excellent accommodations. These are the prime objects in considering the transfer of the school to Portland," Bailey declared.

Outlook for Early Timber Operations In Lincoln Bright

Newport, Or., April 6.—C. J. Eastman and A. L. New of Los Angeles met with the Port of Newport commissioners Monday and discussed plans for developing timber resources. An inspection of Spruce Production corporation properties was made by Eastman and New. The proposition made by them appears to be that the ports of New-

port and Toledo take over the North Coast railway and mill at Toledo and sublet these to them. Eastman is interested in a paper pulp mill and New in spruce lumber for airplane stock and other purposes.

The Toledo sawmill has been separated from the North Coast line and attached to the Alsea Southern railway, which taps the Blodgett timber tract on Yahate, containing 12,500 acres and estimated at \$60,000,000 feet of timber.

Another meeting will be held with the port commissioners Thursday evening, at which other plans will be submitted, which, it is thought, would include one to lease the North Coast line from the Port of Newport with the privilege to purchase within five years. Portland men are expected to attend the meeting with another proposition. The outlook for early operations in Lincoln county timber is bright.

600 Miles of Phone Lines Will Be Built In National Forests

Six hundred miles of telephone line are to be built in the national forests of Oregon and Washington next year in an effort to complete telephone construction through a concentration of funds upon that particular phase of forest protection. It was announced at the forest service this morning. Telephone Engineer C. M. Allen and Forest Examiner M. L. Merritt are going over plans for location of the lines.

"We will build no lookout houses next year," said Merritt, "but will try to finish up most of the lines that are needed to connect up the regularly protective workers. We now have many men stationed around off the telephone lines and are trying to remedy this."

PASTOR'S JOLT ON NEW YORK'S MORALS TO HASTEN INQUIRY

New York, April 6.—The Rev. Dr. John Roach Stratton's charge delivered from his pulpit that immorality and the illegal sale of liquor are openly flaunted in New York are to be presented to the federal and the county grand jurors in specific form, it was learned today after Dr. Stratton had been asked to appear before both bodies.

"What I revealed in my sermon Sunday did not half tell the story," declared Dr. Stratton today, after he had conferred with Assistant Attorney Smith. "There is not a section of the city where conditions of immorality do not prevail. The four instances I cited Sunday are merely typical."

"Our women have become a cigarette smoking, half clothed, loose lived lot. Things we regarded as mortal sins in days gone by are now thought of as mere peccadilloes."

"Mothers of families have got the habit of piling the dishes in the sink, neglecting their husbands and going out to flirt without the slightest compunction. Husbands, on the other hand, accept the situation and are off on their own hook. The only thing they have in common is 'I hope we don't meet.'"

Boy Fisherman Is Recovering After Fifty-Foot Tumble

The Dallas, April 6.—Plunging down a rocky cliff at Seufert for a distance of about 50 feet, Roland Van Orman, 14-year-old son of Mrs. D. O. Davis, narrowly escaped death Saturday. The boy suffered a nasty cut on his forehead and sprained his right elbow and wrist and one of his hips is somewhat bruised.

In company with two other boys Young Van Orman was enjoying fishing in Fifteen Mile creek at its mouth, near Seufert's cannery. At this place the creek runs through a narrow gorge, the rocky walls extending almost perpendicularly from the water. The boy attempted to climb up the cliff. When he neared the top a large rock on which he attempted to raise himself gave away and the lad fell backward down the cliff with the large boulder crashing after him. Striking the bottom the lad stopped rolling just a few feet from the water's edge. Had he rolled into the creek he would have been drowned, the water at the mouth of the creek being swift and deep. He is recovering.
