

COURT HOLDS TWO KLAMATH SLAYERS MUST SERVE TIME

Salem, April 6.—The verdict of the Klamath county circuit court by which William Holbrook and J. E. Paddock were sentenced to serve from one to fifteen years in the state prison for killing O. T. McKendree is affirmed in an opinion written by Justice Burnett and handed down by the Oregon supreme court this morning.

McKendree, who was a large sheep owner in Klamath county, was killed in April, 1918, while engaged in a controversy with Holbrook and Paddock, an employee of Holbrook, over the right to the grazing land in the Dry Prairie country. Holbrook and Paddock pleaded self defense, asserting that McKendree had threatened violence. The jury, however, found them guilty of murder in the second degree and Judge Kuykendall passed the sentence.

Other opinions were handed down as follows: In the matter of the estate of J. P. Frissell, appeal from Marion county; proceeding by widow on behalf of herself and minor child to have an exempt homestead, consisting of house and lot in Salem, set aside as her own individual property and to have allowance set aside to her in addition to the amount of \$100 per month for the first year after death of her husband. Opinion by Justice Bennett. Judge George G. Bingham affirmed. Clatsop county, appellant, for the use

and benefit of Frye & Co., vs. Fidelity & Deposit company of Maryland et al, appeal from Multnomah county; an action instituted by Clatsop county for benefit of Frye & Co., on bond guaranteeing performance of contract for construction of part of Columbia highway. Opinion by Justice Bean. Judge George W. Stapleton reversed.

Ex-Bank Cashier Convict Paroled; Prison Is Avoided

Seattle, Wash., April 6.—(U. P.)—J. Harwood Morris, former cashier of the defunct Fremont State bank, convicted of misappropriation of bank funds, was under parole today before he had served one day of a one to 15-year prison sentence. Governor Hart paroled Morris to Griffith Davies, retired tea merchant of Seattle.

Morris was ordered committed to prison March 28, but was never committed. Nine of the jurors who convicted Morris, the trial judge and prosecuting witness petitioned a parole. Hart said. Morris has a large family.

Topeka Teachers' Pay Increased
Topeka, Kan., April 6.—(U. P.)—The Topeka board of education has granted an average increase of \$400 a year to all city school teachers. The minimum increase is \$350 a year and the maximum \$600.

New Assistant Named
Camas, Wash., April 6.—The Crown Willamette Paper company has a new assistant paper mill superintendent at this place, J. A. Johnson from Waterville, Me.

CASON USED WITH UNDUE ROUGHNESS, WITNESSES ASSERT

Undue violence was used Sunday by patrolmen who arrested Wayne Cason, and their rough tactics in part were responsible for the fight in which the 19-year-old boy met his death, several witnesses claimed Monday night while testifying at the coroner's inquest.

So voluminous was the testimony that at midnight County Coroner Earle Smith adjourned the session until tonight. The principal witnesses yet to be heard are Patrolman J. S. Smith, whose gun caused Cason's death, and Motorcycle Policeman Jack O'Halloran, who has been charged with striking Cason on the head several times with a sap.

CROWD AGAINST POLICE
The sympathies of 500 spectators seemed to be against the police, for they applauded each time witnesses scored the patrolmen's methods Sunday. Several times Dr. Smith had to call for order.

No witness of the shooting, which occurred in the lobby of the police headquarters whence patrolmen had brought Cason after arrest on a drunkenness charge, could tell the coroner's jury whether the gun was discharged when it struck the floor or before falling. One witness said that the first he saw of the gun was when it was spinning around on the floor where it had fallen. Another declared the gun was pointed

toward the crumpled figure of the dying boy when he first noticed it.

EXPLOSION MUFFLED
Patrolman John L. Wendorf, on duty at the information desk at the time of the shooting, asserted the report of the explosion was muffled, as if the gun had been fired close to the body. Wendorf also stated that the regulations of the police department require all guns to be loaded in five chambers only, the hammer resting on the black chamber.

"Two detectives came up with a boy," said Antonio Elplanchich, 966 Division street, describing Cason's arrest on complaint of Sam Goldstein, who declared he had been slapped by the intoxicated man. "Sam pointed out Cason, saying: 'That's him.'"

DIDN'T SHOW BADGES
"Cason said he hadn't hit Sam. The two detectives didn't show their badges. At first I thought one of them must be the boy's father."

"Cason admitted drinking, but denied having hit Sam. He said he didn't want to be arrested because he didn't want his father to know he had been drinking."

"Patrolman Smith grabbed him by the collar and the seat of his trousers, hurrying him down the street. Cason's trousers were badly ripped. He tried to hit one of the patrolmen then, and they threw him on the sidewalk, striking his head on the pavement and hitting him. Earle Kaney asked them whether they were trying to arrest him or kill him."

"When they reached the lobby of the police station, Smith shoved him against the wall. Then Cason began to fight again."

LEGION TAKES INTEREST
Lieutenant Commander John A. Beckwith, secretary of the Portland post of the American Legion, today sent to Mayor Baker a letter calling attention to the military provision against carrying a fully loaded revolver. The letter was only Beckwith's personal effort to avert further fatalities such as that at the police station Sunday night, he said.

Military men are instructed to carry their guns with one empty chamber for the hammer to rest upon. Thus, if a gun were dropped, a bullet would not be discharged.

**THIEVES BREAK INTO
DWELLING AND TAKE
EVERYTHING OF VALUE**
By breaking open the kitchen window, burglars gained entrance to the J. A. Stein home, 573 Knott street, Monday afternoon and made away with nearly all the family valuables. A large amount of jewelry, book of thrift stamps and two gold pieces were reported stolen.

By climbing through a back window, a thief gained entrance to the R. M. Richards poolroom, 725 Russell street, Monday and stole \$1.85 in cash and 20 packages of cigarettes. Police suspect boys in the neighborhood.

The office of Second & Struise, 123½ First street, was entered during the night and \$64 in currency stolen. The thieves gained entrance by climbing through a second story window from an adjoining building.

A burglar broke out a pane of glass in the skylight at the Northern dry goods store, 51 North Third street, about 3 o'clock this morning, but he did not get a chance to steal anything, as the noise of the falling glass awakened the Japanese proprietor, who was sleeping in a rear room. The intruder left a blanket, which he brought to carry away loot in.

Bicycles stolen from F. E. Salstrom, 965 East Fourteenth street north, and Harry Meesher, 622 Third street, were recovered Monday by Inspector Smith and returned to their owners.

**Walla Walla River
To Supply Market
For Large Section**
Walla Walla, Wash., April 6.—Farmers of the Walla Walla and Burbank districts will get water in plenty for irrigation purposes and the output of the Walla Walla valley will be materially increased, when pipelines from the Walla Walla river to those regions are completed, probably about the first of May.

More than 2000 feet of 48-inch concrete pipeline is being laid in the Walla Walla district and a mile and a half of 30-inch and 36-inch concrete pipe is being laid on the Burbank project. The Burbank project last year went into the hands of the receiver for a sum of \$40,000 to complete necessary arrangements to get water needed.

**Striking Electrical
Workers Return to
San Francisco Jobs**

San Francisco, April 6.—(U. P.)—Striking linemen and station workers of the Pacific Gas & Electric company are reported back at their jobs today, following an agreement with company officials to postpone their threatened general walkout.

Representatives of the electrical workers and of the power company will meet with the state railroad commission today in an effort to settle their wage differences.

The strikers demand an increase from \$6 to \$8 daily wage.
