

### YOUNG GIRL DENIES RUNNING AWAY WITH HUSBAND OF SISTER

San Francisco, April 6.—(U. P.)—Bertha Akers, 19-year-old Idaho girl, today faced her sisters in Federal Judge Best's court and denied that she had run away with William H. Watson, the husband of one of her sisters.

Watson was arrested on a white slave charge on the ground that he and Miss Akers came to San Francisco from Oregon.

Mrs. Watson and Mrs. Viola Rolph of Winona, Idaho, appeared in court. Across the courtroom sat Miss Akers. The sisters glared at each other.

Miss Akers testified that although she had come to California with Watson, she had at no time lived with him. At night he slept under the automobile and she slept in it, she testified. She also told of how they crossed the Oregon-California line.

According to the girl's story, the machine broke down just as they came to a large white sign on which were the words, "California-Oregon."

The girl then left the machine, she said, and walked past the sign. Watson repaired the car and caught up with her later.

### Court Must Decide Disputed Claim of Waterfront Strip

Just who owns the major portion of a valuable strip of waterfront on the east side, extending south to Reno street and on part of which municipal terminal No. 4 stands, must be determined by the courts. Federal Judge Wolverson, Monday, decreed in denying motion of County Commissioner Alvin Muck and his wife for dismissal of the Weyerhaeuser Timber company's suit against them.

The Mucks, the O-W-R. & N. company and the city of Portland are named as defendants in the Weyerhaeuser company's suit. The O-W-R. & N. and the city are involved because they own adjacent lands and a readjustment of boundaries would affect them.

Weyerhaeuser maintains that Muck removed survey marks and substituted fraudulent marks with the purpose of keeping for himself a strip of land containing 25 acres and extending between two and three city blocks in length along the river. It is worth thousands of dollars.

The Mucks are in possession of the disputed land and are endeavoring to establish a homestead and eventually to quiet a patent. This land is part of the old James Loomis donation land claim.

### \$400,000 Reputed Timber Land Price; Portland Men Buy

Marshfield, April 6.—A big timber deal was closed Monday when Adelsperger & Conrad sold to R. J. Hubbard and John Kierman of Portland 170,000,000 feet of timber located south of the Umpqua river in the coast country. The buyers are owners of the Winchester Bay Lumber company at Reedsport, and will log the tract and build a railroad to transport the logs to Reedsport mill.

The timber is part of the big holdings which Adelsperger & Conrad some months ago purchased from the Gardner Mill company. Most all of the timber has been sold to mills at Reedsport, so all the plants at that place now have their own timber. The price paid for the land is said to be about \$400,000.

### Employers to Sue Unions to Enforce Arbitration Award

Denver, Colo., April 6.—(U. P.)—The Employers' association here has announced it would bring suit to enforce the recent building trades arbitration award, which postponed wage increases until June 1. Three crafts ignored the award and went on strike April 1, union planters winning their demand for \$10 a day. Carpenters and lathers are still on strike.

The employers will seek to force the unions to live up to the arbitration award accepted by their representatives.

**Mill Force Increased**  
Bond, April 6.—Adding approximately 150 men to its payroll and changing from two shifts of 10 hours each to three shifts of eight hours each, with 20 minute lunch periods on company time, marked a new development in the lumber industry here as the Brookings-Seanlon Lumber company went on a new schedule Monday morning at 8 o'clock. Of the 150 additional men on the payroll, 50 will be employed at a new camp to be established in the woods.

### Irish Sympathizers In Portland Do Honor To Easter Week Martyrs

Honoring the memory of the "martyrs of Easter week, 1916," Portland sympathizers of an Irish republic, at a celebration at Lincoln high school, Sunday night passed resolutions denouncing England's measures of militarism, calling on congress and the president to recognize the Irish government and calling upon the house to take immediate favorable action on the Mason bill providing for a diplomatic and consular service from the United States to Ireland.

Dudley G. Wooten of Seattle was the speaker of the evening. He told of Ireland's long struggle toward independence, likening the underlying principles to those of the American Revolution and not to the Civil war because he claimed the Irish people had never been by their own free will a part of Great Britain.

"Ireland's only hope is in the recognition and support of America," declared Wooten. "More than 20,000,000 Irishmen have blended their blood with the blood of the American people and are today among the most valuable and reputable citizens in this country. In the dark days of the revolution they contributed more than any other one race or country to the success of our struggle against the same government that today oppresses them in their old home beyond the sea and through all our history they have furnished the finest samples of citizenship and of loyalty to the Union."

### Okanogan Cattle Men Progressives In Better Breeding

E. N. Kavanagh, assistant district forester, has returned from Okanogan where he has been attending a meeting of the livestock association. O. M. Plummer and R. A. Blanchard were other Portland visitors.

"Members of the association are wide awake, progressive stockmen," said Kavanagh, "and they have some especially high grade animals. They are planning to put on a livestock show this fall. Adjustments were made between the forest service and the association as to distribution of stock on the range, special rates governing salting and round-up expenses, and the recognition of the association in connection with forest service administration was effected."

### Inquiry Is Ordered Of Cotton Profits

Washington, April 6.—(I. N. S.)—Cotton manufacturers are ordered investigated by the federal trade commission, for the purpose of ascertaining their profits since 1914 and whether they have indulged in practices to boost unduly the prices of cotton yarns and cotton goods, under a resolution which passed the house today.

### Life Convict Escapes From Guard in Crowd

Sacramento, Cal., April 6.—(U. P.)—John Hammond, a prisoner serving a life sentence at San Quentin prison, is still at large today after escaping from his guard while en route to Folsom penitentiary. Hammond, who was handcuffed to another prisoner, slipped the cuff and escaped in the crowd at the Southern Pacific station last night.
