

Milwaukie Arena Boxing Card Reel Magnet.: Portland Players Clout Ball Hard But Lose

Battlers in Shape For Encounters in Milwaukie Circle

Many Out-of-Town Fans Telephone for Reservations; Huge Crowd Expected to Witness Boxing Card; Fulton Confident He Will Gain Decision Over Smith; Martin Is to Referee.

WHEN Freddie Lough and Carl Martin step in the squared circle in the Milwaukie arena this evening in the curtain-raiser of what appears to be the classiest mill card ever arranged for the local fight fans, the largest crowd that ever attended a smelter in this neck of the woods is expected to be in attendance.

The advance sale has been the largest of any show held at Milwaukie and the ticket handlers were busy answering long distance calls from out-of-town fans Tuesday, which indicates that interest in the Fred Fulton-Gunboat Smith bout is at a fever's heat.

Both battlers went through light training stunts Tuesday afternoon, and when they climb through the ropes this evening the local fans will see each man in the best of condition. Fulton is a favorite over Smith, although the "Gooner" is hopeful of obtaining a draw with the Minnesotan.

Fulton's ambition is to secure another match with Jack Dempsey, world's champion, and this contest is the first of a series he has planned to force the champion to step into the ring with him again. Fulton is not a bit worried over the outcome of his contest with Smith. He believes he should win easily.

WALKER FAVORED

Hugh Walker, who meets Frank Farmer, in the same weight division, trained diligently for the bout and he hopes to be returned winner. Walker made a hit with the local fans in his bout with Willie Meehan. Many followers of the sport pick him to beat Farmer.

Farmer arrived from Tacoma this morning and is in great shape. The Tacoma heavyweight is anxious to gain back the prestige he lost when he met defeat at the hands of Boy McCormick, who is scheduled to return to Portland some time in June.

MANDOT IN COMEBACK

The bout between Muff Bronson and Joe Mandot is creating much talk. Muff Bronson is a great showing against Harry Casey that many fans figure he is on the road to the top of the lightweight ladder on the coast.

Mandot is endeavoring to stage a comeback in the fight game. He retired sometime ago, but is confident of his ability to regain his place among the 135-pounders.

SALT LAKE, April 7.—Wildness on the part of four new twirlers—Polson, Burnin, S. Johnson and June—on the Portland pitching staff coupled with some timely wallops gave the Salt Lake Bees a 10 to 6 victory over Walter McCredie's hurlers in the opening game Tuesday, 10 to 6. The contest was played on a soggy field, which was covered with sawdust.

The Beavers collected a total of 13 hits, but were unable to punch them effectively until the last frame when Ralph Stroud was touched up for three tallies. Wistful, the Portland club on the offensive with three hits in five times up. Malsel and Spranger each collected two safe ones. 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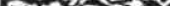
