

FISHERMEN MAKE DEMAND FOR RISE IN SALMON PRICE

Astoria, April 8.—The Columbia River Fishermen's Protective union announced today that it would open Wednesday that it would open at noon, May 1. Prices have been fixed at 14 cents a pound for small or cannery fish, those weighing less than 23 pounds each; and 16 cents a pound for large cold storage fish, those weighing 23 pounds each or over. This is an advance over the figure which prevailed last year of 2 1/2 cents per pound for small fish and 4 1/2 cents a pound for large fish. In the season of 1919 the price paid fishermen by packers was 11 1/4 cents a pound flat for all sizes of fish, the distinction between the large and small salmon which had been in vogue for many years having been dropped during the war period on account of the limited demand for pickled salmon and the consequent turning of the great bulk of the fish, regardless of size, into the canneries. In former years the dividing line between the two classes of fish was 25 pounds, but in reestablishing this distinction the union has set the line at 23 pounds. The fishermen contend that the conditions prevailing warrant the increased prices asked. They say the cost of supplies which fishermen use has advanced materially and so has the selling price of the canned product. In support of this contention, the fishermen say that a few years ago when twine was \$1.15 a pound, they were paid from 7 to 8 cents a pound for fish, and now twine is selling at \$4.65 a pound, while gasoline and other supplies have advanced proportionately. On the other hand, Columbia river spring packed tails are now quoted in the New York markets at \$17 a case. At 14 cents a pound, the new price asked, the fishermen claim the fish for a full case of salmon would cost the packer only \$9.10, leaving them a handsome profit after adding the expense of packing.

Brownsville, April 8.—The Graves Canning company of Sheridan, which has purchased a building site in the business district for a cannery, has practically concluded a deal for the purchase of the Brownsville Cannery company's plant. The Brownsville company, if the deal is made, will in the future confine its efforts to operating its canneries at Corvallis and Forest Grove.

The Brownsville cannery is owned largely by two Portland men, H. A. Lewis and C. D. Minton. It was established by Edward Holloway about 19 years ago. Ira Hutchins is manager.

Lighting Airplane Kills 5-Year-Old Boy While He Is at Play

San Jose, Cal., April 8.—When 5-year-old Joseph Vierra was run down and killed by an alighting airplane here Wednesday afternoon, a new type of fatal accident was entered in the California records. The lad, with a boy companion, was playing in the tall grass of the aviation field when R. L. Tennington, in a de Havilland alighting. The aviator was unable to see the child. The heavy machine crushed his life out instantly. The aviation field is fenced off, but the two children had crawled through the wires unnoticed.

Corvallis to Have \$25,000 Clubhouse For Legion Branch

Corvallis, April 8.—A building will be erected in Corvallis for the use of the American Legion. The association elected the following officers: President, H. J. Anderson; vice president, H. M. Guthrie; secretary, C. G. Blakeley; treasurer, Nash O. Taylor. The following were chosen as a board of control: H. M. Guthrie, Hershel Ellenberg, Victor Arpke, H. Belknap and Major Partello. The plan agreed upon contemplates a building in which the legion may not only hold its meetings, but have a dance hall, a reading room, baths and a swimming pool. It is estimated that the cost of grounds and building will be about \$25,000, and in order to raise this sum it was voted to issue bonds of the county and sell them to the ex-service men and others. There are 1500 ex-service men in this county. The campaign was started Monday evening at the meeting, and \$2725 was subscribed in a few minutes.

The campaign now on by the Corvallis Moose to increase their membership has swelled their number to over 500. The goal is 700. Plans will be laid for a big barbecue to come off in a few weeks at the city park, when an organization will be effected to start a big drive for funds with which to erect a lodge building in Corvallis.

Roseburg Council Authorizes Bridge To Span Umpqua

Roseburg, April 8.—The Roseburg city council voted to appropriate \$5000 for the construction of a bridge over the Umpqua river to replace the Alexander (privately owned) bridge which fell last winter. With the erection of this bridge the city will gain use of a city park, donated by Sam Evans some time ago but not available because of lack of a bridge. The council also authorized City Attorney Carl E. Wimberly to make another request for \$14,000 held by the county paid as road tax to the county for the district comprising the city of Roseburg. The councilmen say if the money is not forthcoming a suit will be instituted. An appropriation was made by the city to maintain the camp grounds for the season.

The Ladies' 35 Mental Culture club has presented the city of Roseburg with a deed to a lot on South Jackson street, to be the site of a public library. The women raised the money to buy the property by sales of home cooking, selling old papers, socials and dances. The city will

provide for the upkeep of the library, which will be built by the Carnegie fund.
