

CITY WINS SUIT ON VALUATION OF IRVING ACREAGE

In its condemnation proceedings to procure title to approximately 16 acres of land at the southeast corner of East Seventh and Fremont streets, a part of the old Irving estate formerly constituting a major portion of what was known as the race track property, the city of Portland registered a sweeping victory in Circuit Judge Morrow's court today.

The city in its suit against the Irving Real Estate company offered a valuation of \$58,666.66 on the property. The defendants claimed a valuation of \$75,000, but the jury, after a short deliberation, fixed the proper condemnation price at the figure named by the city.

R. W. Montague, representing the defendants, said today that an appeal probably would not be taken. The property is being acquired for playground purposes. It is said to be in the center of the city's heaviest populated school district.

WIFE SEEKS DIVORCE FROM MAN WHO SLURRED LOYALTY

Stung by constant slurring references to "100 per cent Americans" and insults to the patriotism of her son, who was a wireless operator in the United States army transport service, Mrs. Mary J. Smith, in a complaint filed in the circuit court Wednesday, asks for a divorce from George Wilhelm Smith, an unaffiliated German, whom she married at Vancouver, November 18, 1918.

Smith, it is charged, was angered because he was forced to register as an enemy alien during the war, and the wife complains that he took pains to point out weaknesses of the Americans and gloat over them.

The husband also refused to permit his wife to visit her children and grandchildren, it is charged, and her old friends were refused admission to their home.

DEPUTY U. S. MARSHAL SEEKS SHERIFF'S JOB

Deputy United States Marshal Ernest T. Mass, who was for two terms sheriff of Clackamas county, will again enter the contest for the Democratic nomination for that office, he has announced. Mass will file a statement of his candidacy at Oregon City within a few days.

Mass has added to his record for law enforcement in Clackamas county by his work in the United States marshal's office here, and is said to be responding to the demand of his friends to try again for the job of being sheriff.

Mass retains his home in Oregon City and before he entered the marshal's office he was in business there. W. J. Wilson, Republican, is present sheriff of Clackamas county and will seek the nomination again.

Require \$10,000 for Kiwanis Convention

Portland Kiwanis will raise \$10,000 within the next few weeks towards completing the \$15,000 fund to be used in entertaining visiting Kiwanis during the national convention here this summer. It was announced Monday night at a dinner at the Benson hotel, John L. Etheridge, finance director for the convention, pledged himself to raise \$5000 and the remainder of the club members will raise \$5000 more.

U. OF O. STUDENT OF 30 YEARS AGO GIVES BUILDING FUND \$500

University of Oregon, Eugene, April 8.—John Welch of Portland, a student at the University 30 years ago, has subscribed \$500 toward the woman's building fund as the result of a campaign by Dean John Straub and Mrs. G. T. Gerlinger, university regent. Dean Straub estimates that the campaign netted \$2000. A gift of \$250 was reported and many additions to the fund, to be made at commencement, were promised.

Fifty dollars was subscribed by Rushlight & Hastorf of Portland, to whom the contract for the plumbing of the women's building has been awarded for \$24,000. Work is to begin immediately. The construction is progressing rapidly. The walls for the first floor are completed and the window frames for the second floor are being set. Difficulty in obtaining brick is delaying the work.

Men's fraternities have pledged seven men with the opening of the new term. They are as follows: Kappa Sigma, Hubert L. A deal has been closed by the Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity with P. A. Nelson of Eugene for the purchase of the latter's home at 1417 Alder street. The house will not move into the house until the fall term. Sigma Alpha Epsilon is the latest fraternity installed on the campus.

Bishop Walter T. Sumner will make his annual visit to the University of Oregon April 15-17. He will speak at the university assembly April 15 and will address other meetings on the campus and in town.

Professor Dodge of the Pacific School of Religion is scheduled to visit the campus of the University of Oregon this week.

Vancouver Gives Thanks Vote to Journal Bureau

Vancouver, Wash., April 8.—Referring to the success of the Chamber of Commerce committee in getting an appropriation for the paving of East Fifth street through the garrison, attention was called Wednesday night at the chamber meeting to the assistance rendered by Congressman Johnson and Carl G. Smith of The Journal Washington bureau, and to the hearty cooperation of Colonel Koester, commanding officer of the Vancouver barracks. Colonel Koester was given a rising vote of thanks, and Congressman Johnson and Carl G. Smith will receive letters conveying the appreciation of the community.

With reference to the proposed road extending Fifteenth street through the garrison, Colonel Koester said that the war department will not consider it for a moment unless the city council make an official request for the road, accompanying with their petition a statement of the proposed cost and who is to pay it.

The road, Colonel Koester said, would be of no advantage to the post, as it would have to be policed and kept up, and in reality would be a detriment. He has other information ready to forward to the war department upon receipt of the official petition of the city, he said.

New Hand at Mill Drowned on First Day at New Work

Cottage Grove, April 8.—Elmer Shell, 25 years old, was drowned Wednesday in the pond at the Pallett sawmill, near Divide, three miles from Cottage Grove. He was a new hand at the mill, having recently returned from Colorado, where he was in the spruce division during the war. He began work on the pond Wednesday morning. A log turned and threw him into the water.

Arthur Dugan, one of the boys working with him, tried to save him and almost lost his own life. C. W. Pallett of Portland, owner of the mill, was near the pond at the time of the accident. Elmer was the oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Shell, who live three miles east of Cottage Grove.

Tuesday evening an automobile belonging to Kenneth McKeenolds was stolen from in front of the Cottage Grove high school building. It bears Oregon license No. 63279.

HULL IN VANCOUVER YARD IS MORTGAGED FOR \$600,000 LOAN

Vancouver, Wash., April 8.—A chattel mortgage was filed Wednesday in which the Green Star Steamship company of New York is the mortgagor and the Equitable Trust company of that city mortgagee.

Steel hull No. 11, a ship of 9500 ton capacity, recently built by the Standifer Construction corporation of this city for the mortgagor, and now at the company's outfitting dock, is given as security for a loan of \$600,000, to be repaid within 30 days at 6 per cent or renewed under the agreement at that time.

The boat given as security for the above loan was launched here March 31 and is the first of several being built for the Green Star Steamship company.
