Gunboat Is Sunk in The Second Round by Lanky Fred Fulton

Minnesotan Has Easy Time Winning Contest From Smith; Hugh Walker Loses to Frank Farmer and Billy Mascot Beats Danny Edwards in Fast Battle at Milwaukie.

SO BRIEF are my notes on the Fred Fulton-Gunboat Smith fight that I can't find 'em, so will have to describe it from memory.

Using only two of the multitude of tentacle-like arms that he makes opponents believe he carries into the ring with him, big Fred Fulton snaked his left, in half-upper-cut fashion, to the Gunner's jaw twice, quickly following it with a short right smash on the same spot, and Smith went down a crumpled, crushed, defeated mass of pugilism in the second round of their scheduled 10-round bout at Milwaukie Wednesday night before one of the largest crowds that had ever assembled to see a fist fight in Portland.

The Gunner apparently made a desperate effort to rise at the count of seven and did manage to pull himself partly off the floor by the second rope, but when he reached for the top piece of hempen, he fell back inertly and semi-consciously heard the fatal ten pronounced over his limp form. Fulton and Smith's seconds picked up the boneless form and carried it to its corner, where five or more minutes passed before the defeated man again had a mental grasp on affairs mundane.

DOWN TWICE IN FIRST

Smith went down twice in the first round from straight lefts. The blows traveled so short a distance and appeared so light that Referee Denver Ed Martin thought he was falling without making sufficient punishment and severely warned him to stand up and fight. However doubtful those first blows may have been, there need be no skepticism regarding the knockout and its immediate predecessors. They were murderous.

Fulton worked like a well-oiled machine. He was cool and calm and deliberate. Smith scarcely hit him once. Twice the Gunner swung his mighty right and while it carried much force it landed harmlessly, because Fulton took the impact from it by veering with the blow. Fulton looks like a world beater.

DOPE IS UPSET

The dope of the evening was violently disjunct when Frank Farmer, the surly, bald-headed Kapowian logger, beat Hugh Walker of Kansas City in every one of the 10 rounds of the semi-windup. Walker was dazed and nearly blinded the rest of the fight by a hook that opened his right eye in the first round. All he had after that was superhuman ruggedness and an appetite to consume superman punishment. He nearly closed Farmer's left eye with a right in the second round. That was his best blow. Nearly all the rest of his leads were ineffective. Farmer punched Walker about the body and face at will and the marvel was that he stayed on his feet, although wobbly at times. Farmer looks 50 per cent better than he did when Boy McCormick put him out in nine rounds, and it is doubtful if the Boy could defeat the Farmer for the winners while Wiprud and Grove worked for the uppers.

Bad weather has put a crimp in outdoor practice of the varsity aggregation but Manager H. M. Miller is confident that his North Pacific Dental college nine will be able to battle with the best of them. 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WINS BANTAM TITLE ON FOUL GEORGES KNOCKED OUT ONCE

THIRD INSTALLMENT By Jack Velock

THESE sporting lions—Bantamweight champion Georges Carpentier and challenger Laffite, who idolized Kid Salmon, was prepared to witness something akin to a funeral the night Georges Carpentier was to meet the clever Canadian in the main event of the night, was introduced as Salmon's opponent.

What chance had this pale wisp of a lad with the sturdy little bulldog that was Salmon? It appeared that a crime was about to be committed, and just before the timekeeper called the principles together for the first round wagers were offered at the ringside favoring Salmon at 20 to 1.

There was something pathetic about Carpentier as he stood there in the almost complete nakedness of boxing attire, yet not a nerve twitched in his trim, young body, and his large blue eyes bore the fire of conquest and the light of confidence. In contrast to Carpentier the then great Salmon was lumpy with muscles and, though small of stature, was built on Herculean lines. Carpentier was more of the youthful Apollo. But Carpentier's sang-froid glared an impression. Even Salmon glanced at this lamb that had been brought in for the slaughter with something like a look of admiration, for Georges was as cool as ice.

SHOWED CRAFTINESS

Before the first round ended the young challenger from the North had convinced the crowd that he was not only a super-vigilant fighter, but a tactician. He came out as a boxer, and as a boxer he was a terror. He was apparently fresh and strong. This increased the admiration of the crowd, for a boxer of such tender years with the power to assimilate a decision now and then to knock out a champion, declaring Carpentier the winner. Georges was prostrate on the floor. He knew nothing of what was going on about him, and it was some time before he was able to get on his feet. He was a severe beating and at the end of the fourth session Descamps tossed in the sponge.

GETS SECOND MATCH

Thus Carpentier won the bantamweight championship of France on a foul from one of the great old boxers of the day. The fight was a victory, however, did not suit Georges. Most boxers would have been willing to rest and realize on the title so won. But Carpentier was not a quitter. He sought and obtained another match with Salmon, and some six weeks later they met again under practically the same conditions.

His credit Carpentier with a knockout victory over Salmon in the eighteenth round. But one English authority who claims to have witnessed the day's fight, through Descamps, seconds tossed a sponge into the ring and that he was carried away from the ringside fighting like a young tiger with legs streaming in the air. Carpentier having been knocked through the ropes. Be that as it may, Carpentier continued on his successful career in the ring, while Salmon faded from the fight limelight.

HARDLY GOOD FIGHT

It is well said that when Carpentier won from Salmon in 13 rounds he was hardly a good flyweight, yet he came into the bantamweight championship of his country at an age when the odds were against him. At the age of 15 he began to take on more flesh. His athletic mode of living kept the fat away and he was lithe and hard as nails, so to speak, yet showed none of the boxing muscle that are so common among gymnast-trained men.

Carpentier's next important victories were against Legerand, whom he defeated in six rounds when they first met and later outpointed a second time in a 20-round contest. He was now beginning to make money. Descamps' promise to his parents were beginning to be realized and young Georges was in demand.

In 1909 the young Lousian's name was known throughout France. He was considered a sort of super-murderer. He knocked out a boxer named Lamplon on two occasions, outpointed Legerand a third time in a 15-round bout, and won decisions from B. Rasmie, Jean Telpine and Ledoux. But he also met a tartar that year.

LOSES ON KNOCKOUT

France had a remarkably clever boxer at the time by the name of Gloria. This lad, with Salmon retired from the ring, was one of the best small men in France, and eventually he was matched with Carpentier. The bout was scheduled for 10 rounds, and at that time there was not a lad living of Carpentier's age who could have taught him anything about boxing, for he was now a highly polished performer.

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
