

PICKFORD DIVORCE AND HER MARRIAGE MAY BE SET ASIDE

Carson City, Nev., April 8.—(U. P.)—The Mary Pickford divorce case and recent developments springing from it have aroused the courts of Nevada, from the supreme court down to the smallest police court, as they have never been aroused.

With the receipt of news here that a Healdsburg, Cal., newspaper, on authority of a letter written by Mrs. Sadie Brown of Gardnerville to her mother, published charges and insinuations involving Superior Judge Frank Langan and Sheriff Nelson of Douglas county, attorneys and jurists alike are demanding a thorough and rigid investigation of the entire proceedings.

Sufficient evidence to warrant his going ahead in pressing a suit in the Douglas county court to have the Pickford-Moore divorce decree set aside has been gathered by Assistant Attorney General Richards.

"The complaint will be predicated on the contention that Judge Langan acted without jurisdiction and the divorce was obtained as a result of collusion and conspiracy," Richards said.

The suit to set aside the divorce will not be filed until next week, the attorney general said, although the papers are now being prepared.

Washington, April 8.—Eggs have been nationalized in Soviet Russia, according to a dispatch received today by the department of state. A decree apportioning the amount of eggs to be consumed in each soviet district has been signed by Nicolai Lenin. If the hens do their full duty all will be well.

The Pickford divorce, is awaiting the return of the letter carrying the charges from California. Unless a complete retraction is made, Mrs. Brown will be "prosecuted to the limit," officials said today.

Women Pickets Take Posts in Spite of Warning by Official

Washington, April 8.—(I. N. S.)—After being warned that they faced arrest and a three year penitentiary sentence, three women sympathizers with Ireland today volunteered to again picket the British embassy.

They were Misses Mary Calvin and Catherine McCune of Philadelphia and Miss Maura Quinn of Boston. They prepared pro-Irish banners and nounced at the headquarters that they would take their posts before the embassy in a short time.

Soda Clerk Killed By Blow From Fist Of Writer of Songs

Chicago, April 7.—(U. P.)—Joseph Manna, five feet and 120 pounds, was held by police today in connection with the death of Travers Walsh, a soda clerk, Manna knocked Walsh down when he swore in front of Mrs. Manna. Walsh died en route to a hospital.

When Manna read that Walsh died he waited outside the detective bureau and buttonholed the first officer he saw and told him he had hit Walsh. Manna is a song writer and his wife sings his compositions in a cabaret.

McNary to Inquire Into Shoe Prices

P.)—Investigation into alleged profiteering in shoes and leather will begin before a senate subcommittee next week, according to Senator McNary, Oregon, whose resolution called for the investigation. McNary was today appointed chairman of the subcommittee to make the inquiry.

CHAPLIN WORSTED IN FIGHT WITH WIFE'S MANAGER

Los Angeles, April 8.—(I. N. S.)—The rough stuff of "reel" life has nothing on real life.

Charley Chaplin, film comedy star, today can so testify as a result of an encounter he had last night with Louis B. Mayer, manager of Mildred Harris Chaplin, in the lobby of the Hotel Alexandria.

According to witnesses, Chaplin challenged his wife's manager "to take off his glasses." Then the scrap was on. Chaplin swung and missed. Mayer swung and landed. Then came the clinch during which Chaplin went to the floor "a la film style." However, his head struck a scaffold used in hotel repair work and blood was drawn.

By this time hotel attaches were on the job. Chaplin was borne off to a washroom to staunch the flow of blood and Mayer disappeared from the hotel in another direction.

Witnesses said Chaplin, who met Mayer first in the hotel dining room, attributed the conflict to advice Mayer was said to have given Mrs. Chaplin in regard to her proposed divorce proceedings. Friends of Chaplin said the comedian had charged Mayer with using his influence to widen the Chaplin family split.
