winter wheat—A condition of 91.0 per cent ers, 51 @. for Oregon and of 75.6 per cent for the U. S. on April 1, indicated a probable production of 15.700,000 bu, in Oregon, and a total U. S. crop of 483,817,000 bu, for the 12.90 harvest. Last year's crop was estimated at 16,010,000 bu, for Oregon, and 731,636,000 bu, for the U. S. Two years ago the crop was 10,795,000 bu, in Oregon, and 565,009,000 bu, for the nation. In the state the 10-year average condition figure April 1 is 95.0 per cent. The 10-year average for the U.S. is 81.4 per cent. If ye weather early last fall and resulting late seeding, together with rather unfavorable conditions for together with rather unfavorable conditions for apring growth are factors tending to the low aver-age condition in the state. Somewhat similar conditions exist throughout the country, with in some Middle Western states. A reduction of 24.0 per cent in the acreage sown last fall as compared with the seeding of a year ago last fall.

Rye-In Oregon rye is grown as a forage crop and comparatively little of the acreage sown is matured and threshed. The condition of the crop on April 1, is reported as 94.0 per cent The area seeded last fall is estimated a cent. The area seeded last fall is estimated at 59,000 acres. The U.S. April 1 condution figure is reported as 86.8 per cent, compared with 90.6 per cent a year ago, and a 10-year average of 89.0 per cent. Faulty Banking Judgment, Says Vanderlip.

"The federal reserve system saved the ountry from a financial panic. But. on account of the lack of banking and ecoof credit," said Frank A. Vanderlip in 5,167,981.83 his address at the Chamber of Commerce Wednesday evening. To overcome 721,301.00 in spite of its effort to restrict credit inflation, the commercial loans of the member banks have increased from nearly \$13,000,000,000 in January to over \$14,000,000,000 in March. A large amount of the loans made during February and 1.203,146.93 March were made to large investors to meet the requirements of the income tax. The recipients of large incomes during 1919 had to face a 79 per cent tax on their income, and in some states additional tax had to be met.

The present income taxation explains the tightening of the adventurous dollar and the broadening inquiry of tax free vested \$14,000,000,000. It is estimated that 9130 large investors, if investing in taxable securities, would have to figure on an 18 per cent basis to realize as much as 9750 41/2 per cent on tax exempt investments.
