

JOHNSON HIGHLY LAUDED IN SPEECH BY JOSEPH SCOTT

Campaign Worker Says He Is
Hurry to California to Tell
What Great Man Senator Is.

Laudations of Hiram W. Johnson as the equal of Abraham Lincoln and Theodore Roosevelt, and attacks on the League of Nations were the features of the address given by Joseph Scott of Los Angeles, Saturday night at Masonic Temple to an audience of less than 300 people.

Mr. Scott is one of the national speakers in the Johnson campaign, and he frankly admitted that he is hastening back from the East to try to save California to Johnson.

"If Johnson were a politician and not a lover of his country," said the speaker, "he would have had a great chance to 'get by' and by expounding the League of Nations he could have been swept into the White House and the president's chair with scarcely any opposition.

"His own state is against him. Its newspapers are pounding the life out of him, but he is strong on the job as an American citizen, protesting against the inequalities of the League of Nations. It seems to me pitiable that I should have to be hurrying back to California to tell Hiram Johnson's neighbors what a great man he is. A prophet is not without honor save in his own country, and I am hurrying back to tell California what the people of the East think of Mr. Johnson. Your people ought to be familiar with his record in California, and his stand on national affairs. He preaches a free press and free speech, and his creed is a belief in the necessity of standing by America so that we shall not be committed to having our boys become international policemen.

"America never was built to indorse and guarantee the territorial outlines of European countries. America does not want to go into an alliance that would be controlled by its debtors. The question is so big that it should have expression of the popular vote—whether your boy or mine shall be an international policeman."

Sanfield MacDonald, manager of the Johnson campaign in Oregon, presided at last night's meeting and declared that the campaign is moving quickly along, with expenditure of but a small amount of money.

"We have no ivory soapbuds to smooth the way," said MacDonald. "If you people knew where vast amounts of money are coming from for another presidential candidate's campaign you might better appreciate this remark."

MacDonald declared that the Johnson campaign in Oregon is to be free from "mudslinging," and he branded as "a damnable lie" the report he said was in circulation to the effect that the Johnson organization had ordered from Washington a vast number of copies of the speech of Reed attacking Herbert Hoover, "late of London."

Joseph Scott's for many years, made an address and introduced Scott.

M'ARTHUR FOR DEFENSE; ANTI-STRIKE LEGISLATION

Washington, April 10.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL.)—Representative McArthur today issued a statement to the Republicans of his third district giving his platform in his campaign for another term. He gives first place to national defense, favoring a first class navy and universal military training.

He declares for anti-strike legislation

and bide defiance to the American Federation of Labor. He favors stricter immigration laws and "reasonable compensation" for ex-service men, concluding with brief endorsement of water power and irrigation legislation, economy, upbuilding of the merchant marine and a 35 foot channel from Portland to the sea.

The statement covers the ground of his official declaration for inclusion in the voters' pamphlet, and reads in part: "I will continue to discharge my duties to the best of my ability and to keep in mind the welfare of my country, its

institutions and all of its people. I will continue to oppose humbug and demagoguery and the schemes of those who would subvert the government to their own selfish purposes.

"Specific legislation which I shall support, if reelected, includes the following: 'A first class navy, with adequate bases on the Pacific coast and a small but highly efficient standing army, backed up by a system of universal military training.

MILITARY TRAINING URGED
"I adhere to the belief that such a system will equalize the burden of military duty among men of all classes and conditions rather than place it entirely upon the shoulders of those who served in the recent war. Furthermore, I regard universal military training as our best possible insurance against war. Had such a system been adopted in this country three years prior to our entrance into the great war, we would have been fully prepared for the conflict and would have saved thousands of lives and billions of treasure."

"Anti-strike legislation that will insure the uninterrupted movement of passenger, freight and express in interstate commerce. Our transportation systems are as essential to national life as the blood arteries of our bodies to human life, and every man engaged in interstate commerce is performing a service in which the public has a direct interest.

STRIKE RIGHT DENIED

"As individuals, these men should enjoy the right to quit work whenever they please, but I deny their right to engage in a strike and thereby cut off the supplies of food, fuel and clothing of our people.

"Stricter laws for the punishment of those who seek to overthrow our government and more rigid immigration laws.

"Reasonable compensation adjustment for ex-service men. They are entitled to consideration because they received only a small fraction of the wages paid to men who remained at home and worked in shipyards and other war industries.

"Development of our irrigation and water power projects in order to increase food production and to utilize energy now going to waste.

"Rigid economy in all congressional appropriations.

"Maritime laws that will develop our commerce and put the American flag on every sea.

"All proper measures of interest to my district and including a 35 foot channel from Portland to the sea."

MRS. McNAUGHT FILES FOR DELEGATE TO SAN FRANCISCO

With the phrase "for democracy," which is the honest sentiment of the masses," as her ballot slogan Mrs. Alice M. McNaught has filed her formal declaration of candidacy as a delegate to the Democratic national convention to be held at San Francisco. She seeks election from the third congressional district, Multnomah county.

In her statement of principles, filed with her declaration, Mrs. McNaught says:

"I believe that women should have equal rights and privileges with men socially and politically in all affairs of the nation and state. I am first, last and always a Democrat. I believe in democracy in the fullest sense of the word. I am for the League of Nations. I am for the great seething mass of employed men and women—not as expressed through their leaders, always, but for the rank and file of which I am one. I indorse President Wilson and his policies during the world war. I urge a square deal for ex-service men."

COUSIN FILES FOR PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSIONER

With the slogan "Guarantees real public service," Edward M. Cousin launched his campaign yesterday for reelection to the public service commission for the district west of the Cascades. He opposes Fred L. Buchtel, incumbent.

Cousin forwarded his declaration of candidacy to the secretary of state Saturday, and says:

"If I am nominated and elected I will during my term of office be governed always by the paramount interest and rights of the public. If a privately owned utility seeks the advantages and privileges of a publicly owned utility, I believe the privately owned utility should submit to a complete public control and regulation of its operations, including securities and expenditures. I shall not dodge responsibility. My aim shall be to invest the office with a real public service character, making it a refuge for the oppressed, at the same time promoting wise constructive policies so necessary for the development of the resources of the state and the comfort of the people."

Cousin in the past has been connected with a number of important rate hearings before the interstate commerce commission and for two years was public utility expert for Portland, attached to the city's attorney's office. While there he appeared in the rate hearings of the telephone and streetcar companies.

In a statement issued concerning his candidacy Cousin says:

"This office requires and ought to command experience and ability of the highest character. It should not be a lodging place for politicians who know nothing about the highly specialized problems constantly arising for solution. Many years devoted to study and practical experience of railways and water rates and service, including nearly two years as public utility examiner for the city of Portland, ought to qualify me for useful service in this most important office. I believe the people are entitled to more real public service and less collusion with privately owned utilities. I believe the commission ought to control and regulate expenditures of privately owned utilities as well as their rates and rates. I am at your command for real public service."

HARVEY WELLS MAKES G. O. P. RACE FOR LEGISLATIVE OFFICE

Harvey Wells, former life insurance commissioner, has formally entered the race for the Republican nomination as a member of the house of representatives from Multnomah county. He filed his declaration of candidacy with the secretary of state Saturday, adopting as campaign slogan "for greater Portland and greater Oregon."

Mr. Wells' declaration of candidacy, as filed with the secretary of state, says:

"I pledge myself to the voters to represent their interests and the welfare of the people of Multnomah county and of the state of Oregon."

"I will give every consideration to the merits of any issue placed before me, and will support the proper economic development of the resources of the great state of Oregon."

"I will render the possible assistance to the enactment of safety first legislation and thereby preserve and protect the lives and safety, not only of adults, but children as well."

"My past experience in state office has, I believe, qualified me to distinguish between the legislation that is imperative and measures that should not be passed."

FILES CANDIDACY FOR CIRCUIT JUDGESHIP



Will H. Bard has filed the official declaration of his candidacy for northern district of Oregon circuit judgeship of department 6, Multnomah county. He has adopted the slogan, "Justice without fear or favor to the rich and poor alike."

In his declaration filed with the secretary of state, Bard says:

"If elected I will during my term of office, endeavor to perform the duties incumbent upon me with dispatch and efficiency. I will render decisions without fear or favor and will give all such matters presented to me careful and earnest consideration, extending the utmost courtesy both to attorney and client to the best of my ability and I will uphold the dignity of the court."

Prior to coming to Oregon Bard resided in Illinois, where he was born, and in Pennsylvania. He first came to Oregon in 1887, but went to Alaska in 1908. He was at Dawson for a year when he went to Nome as assistant United States attorney under General Fredericks. He was elected mayor of Nome, being the second mayor of that city after its incorporation. In 1906 he moved to Seattle and returned to Portland in 1908, where he has resided since.

He has adopted as a slogan the phrase, "Will support laws which develop the state, promote education and lower taxes."

In his announcement of candidacy Mr. Korell says:

"If nominated and elected I will during my term of office vote and work for the enactment of laws which tend to develop the natural and agricultural resources of the state, improve roadways, encourage the establishment of new industries and all those which are here; which invite the investment of capital and operation of factories; which give a square deal to the laboring men, women and children; which safeguard the investment and use of public funds; which promote education; which preserve Americanism, and which reduce the taxes in the interest of real economy."

Mr. Korell was born in Portland and has resided here all his life. He is a lawyer, was educated at Bishop Scott academy, University of Oregon and the Yale law school. He was admitted to practice in June, 1910, and is now vice president of the Multnomah Bar association.

After the United States entered the world war Mr. Korell attended the second reserve officers' training camp at the Presidio, and served during the war as captain with the Twelfth infantry, Eighth division of the United States army.

C. C. HINDMAN CANDIDATE FOR STATE LEGISLATURE

With declaration for a state budget system and against "last minute legislation" as the keynotes of his platform, Charles C. Hindman, Portland attorney, has announced his candidacy for lower house of the state legislature from Multnomah county on the Republican ticket.

Hindman, who was born in DuBois, Pa., in 1886, was educated at Bucknell university and the University of Pennsylvania law school from which latter institution he was graduated in 1909.

Removing to Portland, he was admitted to the practice of law in Oregon in 1910. In 1913 he was appointed assistant United States attorney for Oregon by John McCourt and in 1914 he became deputy district attorney for Multnomah county under Walter Evans, resigning this position in 1918, to accept appointment by W. P. La Roche as assistant city attorney. In October, 1919, he returned to the private practice of law.

In 1916, while deputy district attorney, Hindman secured the first and only conviction in this state of a person on a charge of assault and battery for injuring another person by reckless driving of an automobile.

Hindman was married in Portland in 1914 and has one son. The family residence is at 731 Glisan street. His platform contains these declarations:

"I am in favor of a budget system for state offices and departments that will insure closer supervision of the expenditure of public money."

"I am in favor of a law giving the state the right to purchase the bonds of its subdivisions at the best price offered by any private bidder, reserving, however, to the issuing body the right to reject all bids."

Hindman's slogan is "Conscientious performance of public trust."

COREY CANDIDATE FOR REELECTION TO PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION

Member of Board From Eastern
Oregon Says He Stands
On His Record.

Salem, April 10.—Standing on his record as a member of the Oregon public service commission, H. H. Corey today announced his candidacy for reelection from the Eastern district for a second time. Prior to his election four years ago Corey was secretary to the commission for four years.

As a commissioner, Corey has participated in investigations which have resulted in betterment of service and financial savings to Eastern Oregon shippers.

Corey has been a legal resident of Baker since 1886, and gained his earlier education in the Baker schools. He is a volunteer during the Spanish-American war. He is married and has a family of six minor children.

"In conjunction with regulation of the rates and service of railroads and public utilities during the past eight years, the commission has virtually all the railroads and the larger public utilities of this state, leaving its problem for the future to be that of scientific rate making and the regulation of service rather than one of engineering," Corey says in his statement issued in connection with his announcement for reelection.

"If nominated and elected, I will continue to deal fairly, justly and equitably with all questions which arise between the public service corporations and the public involving the intricate and delicate subject of railroad and utility regulation, and will aggressively strive for a broad gauge plan of regulation encouraging the construction of new utilities in the many communities not now served, and the development of present plants to the maximum of their efficiency to the end that a lower average price may be established to the consumer."

"If justice can be established between the investors in these plants and the users of the service they produce, it will enhance the value of all property, both public and privately owned, and promote the general welfare. This busy, progressive state of ours is today at the dawn of a new era of industrial, commercial and social development, and much depends upon proper regulation of the public utilities, all of which require careful fostering, and, at the same time,

the public must be assured of reasonable rates, adequate service and facilities and protection from discrimination and preferential rates.

"I am making no idle promises or empty pledges, but stand squarely upon my record in this office in seeking reelection."

Salem, April 10.—"Finish the job," insists John L.
