

EUGENE BLAZIER WINNER OF GOLD MEDAL AT DRILL

Eugene Blazier of Portland, a pupil at Hill Military academy, won the gold medal Saturday night in the competitive drill, which was witnessed by about 300 spectators.

George Wright of Red Lodge, Mont., was a close contestant for honors, being the last, except Cadet Blazier, to be eliminated. Milton Butters of Seattle received the bronze medal, and Cadet Wright the silver medal. The drill was a special feature of the formal ball given at the academy.

THREE COMPANIES COMPETE

Klepper and Heathman made an especially good showing in the drill, and C Company's entire representation, being from the younger boys of the school, was specially commended.

The judges, detailed by Colonel C. E. Dentler, U. S. A., in charge of the Oregon National Guard, were Sergeants C. A. Krause and A. F. Nugent, military instructors of the O. N. G.

The medals were presented by Miss Gladys Bowen and Miss Florence Holmes. Colonel W. H. C. Bowen, U. S. A., commandant, and Joseph A. Hill, president of the school, then presented the warrants to the non-commissioned officers. Those receiving medals were:

Police Get Bottled Goods in Four Raids On Astoria Homes

Astoria, April 12.—In four raids conducted by the police, 50 gallons of ready to bottle beer, 240 quarts of bottled beer and 12 quarts of malt were taken to headquarters.

The first raid was made on the residence of Charlie Neuman at 127 Washington street. On this raid four men, together with Neuman, were taken by the local authorities. The second was made on the residence of Nester Johnson, 309 Washington street, where two men were taken into custody besides Johnson. The third was the home of Anton Lamp, 428 Floral avenue, and the fourth on the residence of Thomas Mokko, 139 Washington street.

News reached this city Sunday that J. B. Chisholm, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Chisholm of Astoria, was drowned late Saturday afternoon near the Big Creek Logging company's camp near Knappa when he was stunned and knocked into the river by a heavy rope. According to the report Chisholm was working on a launch which was towing some logs from the docks.

Salem, April 12.—George M. Moore, serving time in the state prison here for obtaining money under false pretenses in Union county, has been paroled to George W. Frohman, sheriff of Canyon county, Idaho, who will return him to the Idaho county to face a charge of forgery.

SALVATION ARMY'S MATERNITY HOME IS TO BE DEDICATED

The formal turning over of White Shield home, on Williamette Heights, to the Salvation Army and dedication of it as the army's rescue and maternity home for unfortunate girls of Oregon, will take place at 10:30 o'clock, Tuesday morning at the home.

Lieutenant Colonel Thomas W. Scott, provincial officer for this district, will receive the home from Mayor Baker, acting as chairman of the state advisory board of the Salvation Army home service program for 1920.

Senator Gus Moser will address the flag which will be raised over the home as the concluding ceremony of dedication by a bevy of nurses who attend the score or more babies now sheltered there.

Among the notable salvation Army officers to be present and to participate in the ceremonies will be Colonel Mary Stillwell, who has for years been secretary of the women's and children's social service for the Salvation Army; Colonel S. L. Brengle, Salvation Army international evangelist; Captain Bouterse, his soloist and envoy, Elizabeth Brengle, his daughter, who are accompanying him on a tour of the United States.

Major Sophie Harris, who is in command of the home, will tell of the work that has been done in the cramped quarters of the old rescue home in Portland for the 25 years it has been in operation.

The home is to be thrown open to the visitors following the ceremony Wednesday will be women's day at the home, and Thursday the men of Portland will be welcomed to inspect it.

Cove Interested in Irrigation Project

Cove, April 12.—Much interest has been aroused in Cove over the proposal to bring water from the Little Minam for irrigation of this section. The river lies east of here on the other side of a mountain range. State Engineer Cumpster and County Agent Paul Spillman investigated the feasibility of the project last week.

PAROLED PRISONERS WED; THEY FELL IN LOVE BEHIND BARS

Salem, April 12.—A romance which had its inception within the four gray walls of the state prison here culminated in the marriage at Vancouver, Wash., April 1, of Mrs. Anna Booth to Claude Ross, both paroled prisoners, according to information leaking out here Saturday night. The wedding took place with the knowledge and consent of prison authorities and Mr. and Mrs. Ross returned to Salem immediately thereafter, Ross being employed in a local shoe repair shop and Mrs. Ross having employment in a restaurant here.

Mrs. Ross, formerly Mrs. Booth, was received at the state prison here March 10, 1917, upon conviction of complicity in the murder of her husband William Booth at Willamina, Yamhill county, for which crime William Branson is now serving a life sentence in the Oregon penitentiary. She was paroled January 31 last.

Ross was convicted in Portland on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses, entering the state prison in April, 1914, under a sentence of from

one to five years. While serving this sentence he was convicted of a statutory charge brought against him in Marion county for which he was sentenced to an additional 10 years in prison. He was paroled October 15, 1919.

Both Ross and Mrs. Booth were model prisoners, and are held in high esteem by prison authorities to whom both are now reporting regularly as paroled prisoners.

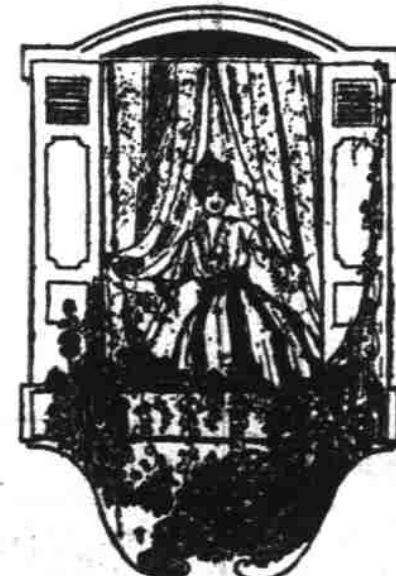
