

ANIMALS' FRIEND BRINGS MESSAGE OF HUMANENESS

Richard C. Craven, field organizer for the American Humane association, is in Portland to preach, teach and encourage kindness to animals. In spite of the fact that the much misused horse has largely disappeared from Portland streets, the visitor expects to find a great deal of work to do in that line.

Not the least of Craven's activity will be to encourage the Oregon Humane Society, whose good works he praises, and to help it with plans, and to lecture for the organization. This morning he addressed an assembly at Lincoln high school. At noon he was a guest at a luncheon of officers of the humane society, and this afternoon he gave over to an inspection of the local society's plant.

ADDRESS STUDENTS

Friday Craven will speak at Salem high school and will address an evening meeting at the Salem library, over which Governor Olcott will preside.

Saturday the visitor will return to Portland to attend a city league luncheon at noon and to address an evening meeting at Central library hall. At each of these meetings he will show his animal pictures. His lecture subject is "Animals in War and Peace." "Effectiveness of the work of humane societies is best attested by its results," Craven said. "You see none of the extreme brutality that was evident a few years ago."

BURROS ARE ABUSED

"On my present tour, Bismarck, Ariz., stood out as an exception. I found no society there and the most gross mistreatment of burros was seen. The town owes its existence largely to this little animal, yet they are mercilessly treated. I find great response to this work among school children and therefore give much attention to organizing activity in the schools. Public sentiment has followed our work everywhere and the people have been so turned against manifestations of cruelty to animals that they will no longer tolerate it."

permitted to do so if they comply with the requirements of the law."

The Oregon state law covering this point, however, provides for the election of a national committeeman in 1914 and every four years thereafter. The last committeeman so elected was Will H. Hornbrook, who was elected in 1910 and whose term would therefore expire April 15. Upon W. Morrow of Portland was named by the central committee to succeed him under a provision of the law which requires vacancies in office to be filled by the central committee of the party in which the vacancy exists.

MORROW FILES PETITION

Whether the law of the state or the action of the national party organization takes precedence in this matter will be checked up to the attorney general for decision.

In the same mail with Brown's letter came a nominating petition for Dr. J. W. Morrow, present incumbent, who is a candidate for reelection in the election that an election is required for that position at the forthcoming election. G. O. P. HAS 7 CANDIDATES FOR SECRETARY OF STATE

Salem, April 15.—The most noticeable ripple on the surface of the political waters about the secretary of state's office, where the nomination petitions are now running at flood stage, appeared shortly after noon Wednesday, when Fred Lockley, Portland, made his formal entry into the race for nomination as secretary of state by the Republican ticket. Lockley's entry brings the list of avowed candidates for this position up to seven—all Republicans.

M. Vernon Parsons of Eugene filed earlier in the day for the same position. Others who have filed for a place on the Republican primary ballot as candidates for the secretaryship are Sam A. Koser, present deputy secretary of state; E. L. Coburn of Grants Pass; B. F. Jones of Newport and W. D. Wood of Hillsboro. H. J. Shulderman, although an avowed candidate, has not yet filed, but is expected to do so before closing time Friday night.

ILLINOIS VOTE ELIMINATES HOOVER, OPPONENTS FIGURE

New York, April 15.—(U. P.)—Supporters of Senator Hiram Johnson and Major General Leonard Wood claim that the Illinois primary, in which Herbert Hoover was not entered, practically eliminated the latter as a candidate for the Republican presidential nomination.

Here is the way they figure it out: Johnson and Hoover had relatively the same status in the Illinois primary, in that neither made a campaign in the state nor was named on the ballot.

Johnson received more than \$6,000 "written-in" ballots while Hoover polled only about 500.

This, they hold, indicates that Johnson is gaining strength at the expense of Hoover, with whom he will contest the primaries in California, Oregon and Montana.

The Johnson group here further asserts that when Hoover declared his allegiance to the Republican party he not only lost all the Democratic support he had but most of the large independent liberal bloc. This latter element, according to the Johnson organization, has transferred its support to the two leading liberals of the Republican and Democratic camps, who—the Johnsonites say—are Johnson and William G. McAdoo.

Wood's eastern campaign leaders, of course, will not admit the latter claim of the Johnson group, but they contend that Hoover's showing in Illinois compared with that of the California senator is a serious blow to the Hoover boom. What the Wood managers emphasize, however, is their candidate's victory in districts which will send 14 delegates to the national convention and this in Governor Frank O. Lowden's home state.

Officials of the Hoover national Republican club would make no comment on these claims, maintaining their policy of refusing to discuss rival candidates. But they pointed out that Hoover is concentrating his strength on the primaries in California, Oregon and Montana and that they had not counted on a single vote in Illinois.

TWO LEADING EUGENE MEN LEGISLATIVE CANDIDATES

Eugene, April 15.—Two prominent Eugene men have been definitely listed as Republican candidates for the legislature to represent Lane county. A group of leading Republicans called upon Louis E. Bean, who has served several terms in the legislature, and he consented to allow his name to be used. The party also called upon W. T. Gordon, assistant

cashier of the First National bank, and received assurance that he would enter the race. E. J. Adams, known to have been considering the office, said on learning that Gordon's name was to be used, that he would not be a candidate, but would use his influence for Gordon.

OREGON LABOR PRESS EDITOR SEEKS SEAT IN STATE SENATE

C. M. Rynerson, editor and business manager of the Oregon Labor Press, has joined the ranks of the other candidates and filed his declaration of candidacy for the Republican nomination as state senator from Multnomah county.

He has adopted as his slogan the phrase, "A business man with practical knowledge of industrial relations," and in his declaration of candidacy as filed with the secretary of state outlines his platform as follows:

"If I am nominated and elected I will during my term of office always have in mind the fact that I am a public servant elected to obey the public will. I believe in and will support any proper legislation looking toward the conciliation and arbitration of industrial disputes."

"I will work for the passage of legislation beneficial to the educational institutions of the state and favor proper remuneration for educators."

"I will support any measure having for its purpose the rendering of full justice without subterfuge to the soldiers of the late war."

"I favor good roads without graft or unnecessary payments and the building up of home industries."

SMITH WOULD FIGHT FREAK LEGISLATION IN SENATE

John U. Smith of Newberg has entered the contest for election on the Republican ticket, as joint senator from Lincoln, Tillamook, Washington and Yamhill counties. He has adopted as a slogan, "Serve people best by opposing expensive, burdensome and freak legislation." In his platform he says:

"I would construction shall insist upon open, honest, competitive bidding on highway specifications."

"Without interfering with present state projects I stand out for better market roads and more state money for them so farmers, horticulturists and dairymen may feed the cities more cheaply. We may wear old clothes and use old machinery but our food must get to us fresh every day."

"Due to their growing importance and common interests the coast counties of this joint senatorial district should have proportionate exclusive representation in the legislature."

"In Yamhill county, having accomplished the designation by county court of a market road through the beautiful Chehalis valley, I am free to devote the energy I may have to the service of my native state, if permitted to do so."

"This country has before faced, now faces and always will face serious problems, but none that calm, cool, responsible and respectable citizens, who have an interest in home, property and liberty, cannot solve."

CANDIDATES ARE SLOW TO FILE FOR OFFICE IN UNION

La Grande, April 15.—Only three candidates have filed their nomination petitions with the county clerk at the present time. They are James Hutchinson, Republican, of Union, for county commissioner; W. W. Knowles, Republican, for assessor, and Charles Calkins, Republican, for sheriff.

A meeting of the central Republican committee of this county has stirred up enthusiasm in the political ring. Judge J. W. Knowles, Republican, who has held office for 12 years, and County Clerk Kenneth McCormick apparently will have no opposition.

Ed Wright, former secretary of the public service commission and a Republican, will run against John Hodgkin, Democrat, present district attorney. Albert Hunter is expected to be the only candidate for representative, while Bruce Dennis is being mentioned for state senator. Valter erce is another whose name is coupled with legislative possibilities.

County Judge Frank Phy and Assessor U. C. Couch are being mentioned for county judge. John Frawley will probably be unopposed for his present post as county treasurer.

For county school superintendent Mrs. A. E. Ivanhoe, incumbent, will run, and Lee Warnick, sheriff, will probably run unopposed on the Democratic ticket, though there are Republicans who would take the office. Charles Calkins has already filed, and E. G. Bailey of Elgin is mentioned.

James B. Wilson of North Powder is being mentioned for county commissioner.

Antonio was found to have \$478 in cash, a bank book belonging to James Linn of Stockton, Cal., and a receipt from an Oakland bank showing he had sent \$10,860 to Italy March 1.

Figro had \$246, a bank book belonging to P. Botta of Los Angeles and a \$50 Liberty bond registered to P. Petrovich.

Boycott on Sugar And Spuds Advised Against by Hotels

Dining rooms in Portland hotels will not boycott potatoes and sugar, but cooperation of the public will be asked to conserve present supplies that they may last as long as possible.

"It is not a question of prices," the Portland hotel declared today. "If the prices of potatoes and sugar rise, we need them, and if he will use as little sugar as possible, he will enable present stocks to last longer."

"Any boycott on potatoes or sugar should begin with the consumer," the Multnomah hotel steward declared. "Just as long as some persons insist on having potatoes, just so long must the hotels serve them."

The Portland Caterers' association called a conference of restaurant men for this afternoon to discuss the potato situation.

Edible Bull Frogs To Be Distributed In Columbia Bogs

Edible bull frogs are to be distributed in the bogs of the Columbia river west of Portland as a result of arrangements just completed by the state game commission with Otto M. Jones, state game warden of Idaho, whereby bass fry will be exchanged for about 100 pairs of bull frogs.

Bull frogs, in the language of Idaho sportsmen, are placed in the same category as game fish. The frogs will arrive about the middle of May from Idaho, but the bass will not be sent in return until August when bass fishing reaches its height in the Willamette slough.

Ex-Governor West at Washington, D. C., In Basin Rate Case

Washington, April 15.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL.)—Ex-Governor Oswald West is here, first of the advance guard of attorneys in the Inland Empire rate case to arrive for argument on Saturday. Because of the limited time for argument and disadvantage of splitting it into small parts, West has decided to turn his time over to Joseph N. Teal, who will make the chief plea in support of the Columbia river basin's right to preferential rates over Puget Sound. Other Northwest attorneys are due today. Tomorrow it is expected that the entire commission will hear the argument, except Commissioner Alchison, who has disqualified himself because of his early connection with some features of it.

Moose of Astoria to Build

Astoria, April 15.—The Moose lodge Wednesday night went on record in favor of purchasing a home and \$6,000 was subscribed. Sixty members subscribed for \$100 worth of bonds each. It is the intention of the lodge to erect a building costing approximately \$60,000.

HEARING HELD ON BIG PORT PROJECT

Without action, the public hearing called by the city council in the council chamber to consider the \$10,000,000 Swan Island-Mocks bottom-Guilds lake port project submitted by the committee of 15, adjourned at noon today.

Ninety-six citizens, including city officials and newspaper representatives, attended the hearing.

Decided sentiment favored the project. The method of choosing members of the merged port-dock commission was contested. The committee recommended selection by the legislature, after the present body has served for a year, and has thereafter been reduced from 12 to nine members serving, three each for two, four and six years. Senator F. W. Mulkey led the forces against this plan, saying the legislature made the port commission a political football.

J. B. Kerr spoke for legal phases of the committee's plan, Frank M. Warren for the issues of physical development involved. Sharp question met Warren's proposal that the maximum price paid for any property involved should not exceed three times the assessed value. Commissioners Mann, Bigelow and Barber said the basis should be the assessed valuation. Commissioner Pier said the plan was not sufficient before the council to warrant adopting a resolution prepared by Committee-man Kerr, endorsing the project and committing its further development, including necessary bills to the port and dock commissions and the committee of 15.

Councilmen called for copies of the resolution. No arrangement was made for further public hearing, but it was assumed hearings would be held.

CITY INDORSSES FIGHT ON SOCIAL DISEASE

Indorsement of the campaign of the United States public health service against social diseases as well as the continuation of the appropriation by congress for the campaign as provided in the Chamberlain-Kahn bill, was passed Wednesday by unanimous vote of the

Petition for Hoover Arrives in Airplane For Filing at Salem

Salem, April 15.—Via airplane from Portland, the petition for placing the name of Herbert Hoover on the Republican ballot in the primary election as a presidential candidate arrived in Salem at 12:31 o'clock this afternoon. Chester Murphy, president of the Hoover Republican club, brought the petition which carried more than 300 names, and at once filed it with the secretary of state.

Pilot Victor Vernon took Governor Olcott for a spin over Salem after Murphy had departed for the statehouse. About 1000 people welcomed the flyers, who reported a delightful trip from Portland. They left Portland at 11:45 a. m. The plane landed at the foot of Court street here after circling about the city.

The trip had been scheduled for Wednesday, but was delayed because of combined weather conditions and engine trouble.

ERECTOR OF IRVINGTON PHONE STATION PERMITTED

After months of wrangling between residents of Irvington and officials of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company the city council passed an ordinance Wednesday allowing the company to erect a substation at East Twenty-fourth and Stanton streets.

The company must carry out the following 10 provisions to assure and keep a permit from the council: erect a residence type of substation; keep the building in good condition and plant shrubbery about building; place no signs on the building; add no additional stories to the structure; never operate the building as a pay station; never employ more than 15 operators during the first two years; no more than 10 during following years; drape all windows; keep building in good repair; erect no out buildings and file a bond of \$5,000 with the council showing good faith to abide by provisions of the ordinance granting them a permit.

CITY'S FINANCIAL STRINGENCY RELIEVED; FUND \$75,000 MORE

Relief of the acute financial stringency that has been facing the city for four months was assured Wednesday afternoon when Commissioner Bigelow discovered that \$75,000 had been appropriated by error to the fire department fund during the compilation of the budget last November.

The discovery is important in that but \$7000 at present remains in the general fund to meet all existing contingencies outside of departmental expenditures taken care of by budget appropriations. The \$75,000, which will be transferred to the general fund, will bring the general fund to approximately \$82,000.

Liberty Temple to Go

Assurance that Liberty Temple would be torn down after May 1, as planned some time ago, was given by the city council Wednesday when Commissioner Harbur was authorized to prepare specifications prior to advertising for bids to remove the structure.
