

MAIL TAKEN OFF TRAIN NEAR CORK

Dublin, April 16.—(I. N. S.)—Fifty masked men held up a mail train near Kinsale, 13 miles southwest of Cork, and seized the official mail pouches early today.

The Freeman's Journal announces definitely Lord French has decided to resign as lord lieutenant of Ireland. It is reported he would be succeeded by Lord Powerscourt.

Details of the disorders at Milltown, two miles southeast of Dublin, were received today. One hundred rounds of ammunition were fired during the fighting. Michael O'Brien, a doughboy, who was visiting there on leave of absence, was wounded in the arm.

(Lord Powerscourt, who is spoken of as the next lord lieutenant of Ireland, is a Protestant and a Liberal-Unionist in politics. He owns nearly 39,000 acres in County Wicklow, Ireland.)

Canadian Whiskey Winks At Portland, Then Hurries Along

One hundred cases of the finest grade whiskey produced in Canada stopped just long enough in Portland Thursday evening, while en route from Vancouver, to Mexicana, Mexico, to arouse the interest of revenue agents, who were conducting an investigation this morning.

The whiskey was being delivered from one wet territory to another over the hard sands of the United States and was bonded by the government, but the switchmen's strike delayed the car carrying the shipment so long in the North Bank yard that government agents became apprehensive for its safety and assigned a special guard.

Where the car or the shipment is today no one seems to know, but the government officials are determined to see that it gets to its destination in Mexico, and not some destination in this country.

Newspaper's Guess On Attendance Held All Same Lottery

District Attorney Evans had ruled that it was violating no state law—it was not a lottery—and the guess which should be nearest the real number of people at the opening game of Portland's baseball season would properly and legally be entitled to the proceeds.

But—The postoffice department decided otherwise. It has ruled that the contest such as the Oregonian proposed is in direct violation of section 482 of the United States postal regulations. The ruling was, accordingly, that the mails could not be used in furthering the contest.

New York, April 16.—The interest which the overall craze has aroused among the clothing manufacturers of New York today indicates that it may amount to something after all.

For the clothing trade says overalls can be made so much like regular suits that the difference would be hard to detect.

Thus it figures on getting the overall fadists going, having already got them coming, on the conventional clothing.

OVERALLS AND OVERALLS
What the fadists appear not to have known is that there are styles in overalls as well as in the three-piece suits. If there's anything economical about buying a new pair of overalls to wear for a few days as a "demonstration," it is pretty well covered by a price tag, reading "Blue denim, price \$10."

And \$10 is only half as much as a really fancy pair of overalls made to cost. For when overalls leave off being overalls and start masquerading as "suits" or "costumes" they have to pay a little something for the privilege.

THEY ARE SOME PANTIES
The very latest is a bell bottomed effect, laced about a foot up the outside of each leg, something like the picturesque pants of the "greaser" in border melodramas.

Mrs. F. W. Hoffman of the Bush Terminal sales building knows all about sales—both men's and women's. She said today that manufacturers undoubtedly could and probably would start making suits of denim, not necessarily blue, if the white collar men of the country sincerely desire to robe themselves in this humble but honored fabric, symbolic of toil.

GIVES FETCHING EFFECT
The cloth comes in brown and gray, and "makes up" with a rather fetching effect for summer time. But if the men should strike against overalls, too, she shuddered—and shivered—to visualize some New Yorker, for instance, who looks so sedate in conventional garb, going about their business with the classic Roman toga flapping loose around their underpinning.

Mrs. Hoffman has heard, however, that trade is swinging back all over the country from extravagance to America's normal thrift. What she has heard leads her to believe that the high prices and high wages in some lines will tumble.

LABOR COSTS HIGH
A tailor's bushelman, for instance, now gets from \$125 to \$150 a week, she cited, as showing where most of the high cost of clothing enters into the manufacture.

In the biggest clothing market in New York it was learned that buying has been very light for several months because merchants expect prices to slump sharply. Sales for the whole year are expected to maintain their normal volume, however. The woolen and silk markets both show signs of returning to normal, but the cotton market remains firm at high prices.

Printers of Coast Adopt Scale of \$8

Spokane, Wash., April 16.—An objective scale for commercial work of \$8 a day was adopted by the Pacific Slope Allied Printing Trades conference here. The 44-hour week is to be put into operation after the international regulations take effect in May, 1921. Newspaper scales were left to local autonomy, as they have been in the past.

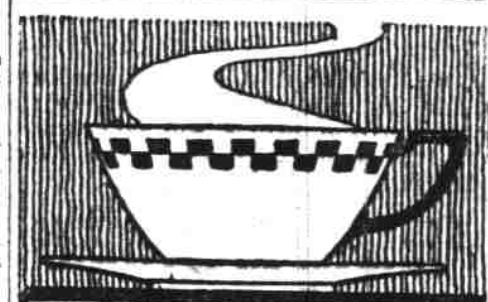

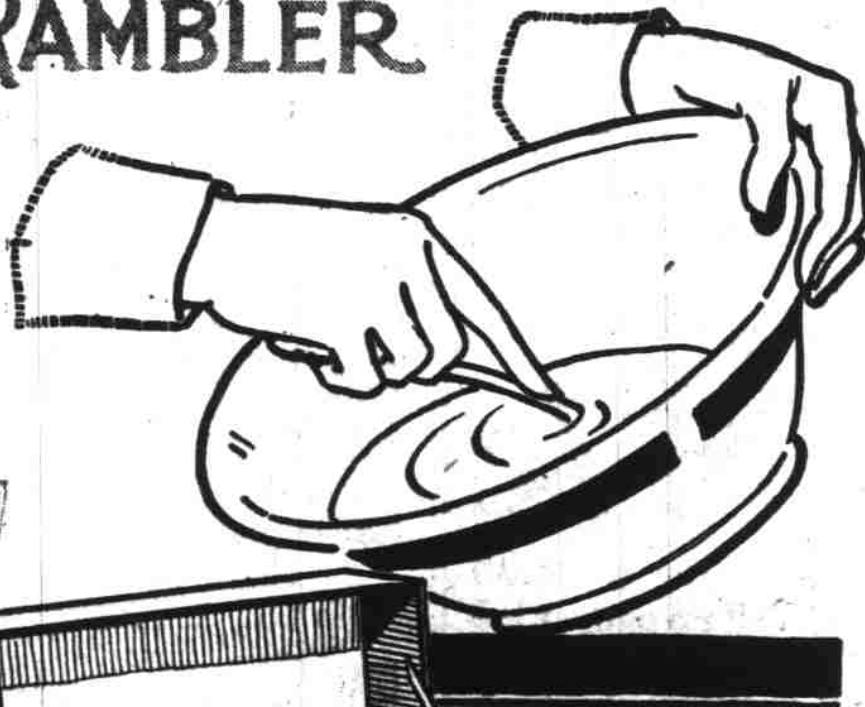
