

SMITH'S DEATH IN AUTO ACCIDENT IS HELD UNAVOIDABLE

The coroner's jury last night found that C. V. Smith met his death in an unavoidable automobile accident at East Sixtieth and Sandy road Tuesday evening, despite testimony of the driver, L. W. Thompson, that an arc light shone near the scene of the killing, that his lights were in good condition, that his windshield was clouded with rain, and that he did not see Smith until his arms flew up above the radiator as the automobile knocked him to the pavement.

VICTIM AWAITED CAR

Witnesses testified that Smith was standing in the proper place waiting for a street car that was immediately behind the automobile. L. Van Bibber, F. L. Stemm, Fred W. Fletcher, A. E. Burghdoff, S. Frazer, and Pritchard Breyer made up the jury.

Mrs. R. H. Tucker told the veniremen that she had started to the corner with a guest to warn her of the unsafe condition of Sandy boulevard because of automobiles, that she saw the automobile coming, and the streetcar, that the

machine was ahead, but that she did not see Smith. She heard the thud and Smith's cane drop to the pavement, her testimony showed. Mrs. Tucker declared the machine was not proceeding rapidly, that there were no skid marks, and that the machine was brought to a quick stop.

"CORNER QUITE DARK"

Mrs. A. L. Foster, who had just passed the corner, saw the victim standing at the proper place waiting for the streetcar that was approaching, although the corner was quite dark she said. She heard the crash and returned to see the victim lying under the automobile. The machine was not traveling rapidly at the time of the accident, according to Mrs. Foster.

Royal Young and Paul Hancke both testified that the corner was dark, and that they first saw the man lying prostrate under the automobile. Hancke asserted the body was dragged approximately six feet.

L. W. Thompson, the driver of the machine, told the jury that it seemed as though the man sprang up in front of the car. He said that his wife was beside him, he was going not more than 10 miles an hour, his lights were burning, there was rain on his windshield, and the first thing he saw "was some arms and things go up in the air."

Liquor Prosecution Loses

Astoria, April 15.—Thomas Word, special agent of the department of justice, seized 50 gallons of grape juice at the Louvre soft drink parlor Wednesday and Thursday the proprietors of the place were arraigned before United States Commissioner Carney. The case was dismissed, the commissioner holding that no evidence was introduced to show what percentage of alcohol the grape juice contained.

ULTIMATUM SERVED ON LOCAL STRIKERS

Final ultimatums were delivered to striking switchmen in the Portland district Thursday afternoon by the O-W-R. & N. and North Pacific Terminal company, giving the men employed by these two companies until 8 o'clock Saturday morning to return to work. Failure to return means "termination of employment and forfeiture of all pension, insurance and seniority rights."

Similar ultimatums have already become effective on the Southern Pacific and S. P. & S. On the S. P., the men had been given until 4 p. m., April 10, to return, while on the S. P. & S., an ultimatum became effective at noon Thursday. Strikers failed to respond to either of the two previous demands to return to work.

An improvement of one engine crew or three switchmen has been noted in the Portland district since Thursday morning. The new crew was added by the Southern Pacific.

A total of 21 crews were working in the four terminal yards in the Portland district this morning. This amount is 22 per cent of normal.

Should the strikers refuse to respond to the ultimatum issued by the O-W-R. & N. and Northern Pacific terminals as they have refused to respond to the call of the S. P. and S. P. & S., railroad managers said this morning that they would start immediately employing new men

and drop the strike question entirely. Six freight trains were moved to local points in Oregon Thursday and the O-W-R. & N. P. & S. were able to show a similar improvement in less than carload commodity movements. Affairs are now adjusted locally so that there is no need for any interior community to suffer, according to statements made by railroad officials.

Fries Held to Grand Jury

W. L. Fries, charged in United States district court with violating the national prohibition statutes, this morning waived hearing before United States Commissioner Drake and was ordered bound over to the federal grand jury. Fries for some time eluded the vigilance

of the police and finally defied the police department when he called Chief Jenkins on the telephone to tell him that the department was not smart enough to get him. The next day his place was raided and his liquid stocks were confiscated.

Whitman Students Don Old Garments

Whitman College, Walla Walla, Wash., April 15.—Freshman and sophomore men of Whitman college appeared Wednesday at classes dressed in old clothes. Stiff collars, silk and white shirts, dress

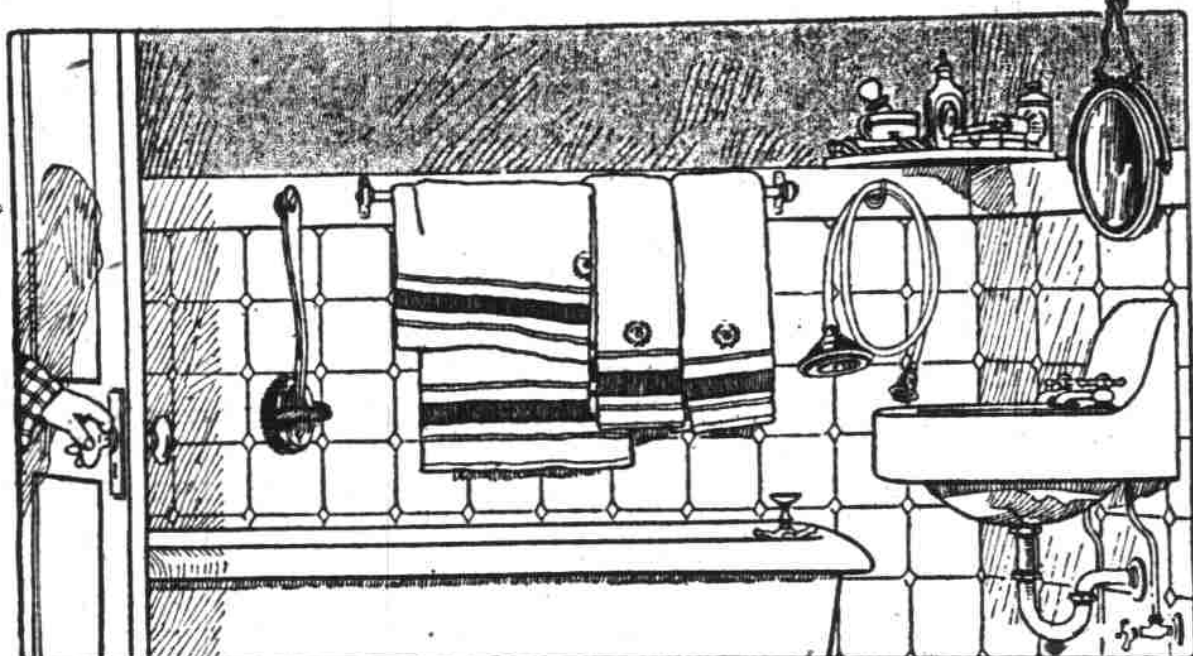
