TEAL DRIVES HOME FACTS IN RATE CASE

Modification of Basin Rates Allowing Portland Preferential Due by Nature, Plea at Opening of Issue in Washington.

Washington, April 17.—(U. S. JOURNAL.)—Final argument of the Columbia basin case, reaching in its broad sweep the entire rate structure of the Pacific Northwest, came on before the interstate commerce commission today. While the Thurston report, which recommended to the commission granting Portland and Vancouver preferential rates from the zone south of Snake river in recognition of natural advantages as compared with Puget Sound and Astoria, is the theoretical basis, the argument of attorneys in the case covers a wide range.

TEAL OPENS ARGUMENT
J. N. Teal, representing Portland complainants, opened the argument and was followed by W. P. La Roche, Portland city attorney, and J. O. Bailey, assistant attorney general of Oregon, representing the public service commission of Oregon. Attorney Campbell, representing Spokane, was also heard at the morning session.

This afternoon Charles A. Hart is scheduled to make the principal argument for the railroad, supplemented by A. C. Spencer for the O-W. R. & N. company, and G. Clyde Fulton, representing Astoria. Teal reserved part of his time for the closing rejoinder.

All members of the committee were present except Attorney Atchison having disqualifed himself because of some early connection with the case.

Occasional questions from commissioners enlivened the proceedings, lead being taken by Commissioner Hall.

PORTLAND'S CAUSE PLEADED
Teal's arguments covered the ground of Portland's contention, that its natural position entitles it to have the artificial rate structure modified to meet existing conditions, so that Portland commercial effort may not be handicapped.

He said Portland "would be regarded as absurd if it came before the commission asking the same rate as the cities with the Sound cities and Astoria on ocean freight, yet others seek to per-

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MRS. SHEPARD OFF Y. W. C. A. BOARD AS PROGRAM PROTEST

Former Helen Gould Resigns Rather Than Countenance Convention's Action.

Cleveland, Ohio, April 17.—(U. P.)—Mrs. Finley Shepard, formerly Miss Helen Gould, today announced her resignation from the national board of the Y. W. C. A. because of the "course of action" Friday of the convention here.

The action included the adoption of the "social ideals" of the churches and the adoption of a measure to have the association actually work for the legislation to make the "ideals a reality."

The "ideals" include:

Abolition of child labor; an eight-hour day for women in industry; a living wage as a minimum in every industry; old age pensions, relief from employment one day in seven and a gradual reduction of hours of labor to the lowest practical point.

The finance commission recommended that \$3,000,000 be raised in 1921 for a current national work, and an effort to increase the present endowment fund of \$1,600,000 to \$10,000,000 by January 1, 1925.

At the last meeting, however, a candidate has come forth to oppose R. N. Stanfield for the Republican nomination for the United States senate. He is Albert Abraham of Roseburg, former state senator from Douglas county. As the official list stands, Stanfield and Abraham will battle for the Republican nomination, while Senator George E. Chamberlain has an opponent H. G. Starkweather, whose official residence is Milwaukee.

In the second congressional district Congressman N. J. Sinnott is opposed by Owen F. Jones of Baker, who also seeks the Republican nomination. James H. Graham, also of Baker, has filed as a candidate for the Democratic nomination.

In the third, Multnomah county, district, Congressman C. N. McArthur has two candidates in his own primary to oppose him, Eugene E. Smith and Thomas A. Sweeney. Esther Lovejoy and Mrs. Alexander Thompson both seek the Democratic nomination.

Seven Republican candidates are seeking the nomination as secretary of state: E. L. Coburn of Grants Pass, Sam A. Koser, present acting secretary of state; B. F. Jones, W. D. Wood, M. Vernon Parsons, Fred Lockley and Henry J. Schuler.

JUDGES HAVE CLEAR FIELD
With four vacancies to fill on the supreme bench there are four candidates only, Justices Harris, McBride, Benson and Bean, whose terms are expiring.

BERLIN IS HOURLY AWAITING REVOLT

Paris, April 17.—(U. N. S.)—Dr. Goepfert, head of the German peace delegation, received a telephone message from Berlin at 11 o'clock this morning that the city is quiet and that there had been no revolutionary disturbances.

It is believed possible, however, that a military coup may be attempted against the Ebert government tonight or tomorrow.

JOB OF PRESIDENCY OF GERMANY GOES BEGGING
Berlin, April 16.—In thoughtful political quarters, yesterday's "press nightmare" and today's discovery of an alleged military-munitions conspiracy are looked upon as election maneuvers. To an American the contrast between a pre-election campaign in his own country, and the present situation is ludicrous. The young German republic is not "playing the game," and has lots to learn from the older sister America.

With the presidential election only eight weeks off, not a single candidate is as yet in sight.

JOB GOES BEGGING
Not one of the seven political parties has been able to find a man in its ranks thus far who wants the job. One leading politician remarked to me:

"It may become necessary to put an advertisement in the newspapers."

The Kapp-Luecke adventure has effectively killed the boom for Hindenburg, who up to that moment had no rival.

The Social Democrats, that is, the government Socialists, have not even seriously discussed whom they want to run for president.

Many Social Democrats feel it may become necessary to ask Friedrich Ebert who, notwithstanding the many things said against him, enjoys a unique position in the minds of the German people, to throw his hat in the ring once more.

Ebert, however, so far has flatly declined. He considers one term quite enough for him. He is not only willing but anxious for some one else to undertake the burden of new republic and Frau Ebert is credited with even greater insistence in not wanting to be the "first lady of the land" for another term.

Ebert, his intimate friends say, considers he has done his duty to his country and that now some one else should take a turn at the wheel of the German republic through the turbulent waters, with many a rock still ahead.

There is some talk of Philipp Scheideemann as a possible candidate of the Social Democrats.

BERNSTORFF IS MENTIONED
Among the Democrats there has been some talk of Count von Bernstorff, the former ambassador to the United States, making a good presidential candidate, but it is extremely doubtful whether he would consent to run.

The Communist party probably will not put up any candidate, and it is uncertain whether the independents will.

The two nationalist parties are wholly at sea on the presidential candidacy and the Catholics or Catholics, are just as much "up in the air" on the question.

ERSTWILE DICTATOR KAPP UNDER ARREST IN SWEDEN
Copenhagen, April 17.—Dr. Wolfgang Kapp has been arrested at Stockholm after a sensational and adventurous escape in disguise. The man who for five days was dictator in Berlin and whose madcap military revolt plunged Germany into civil war, fled from Berlin in an airplane and traveled to Sweden via Denmark. His suspicious appearance led to his arrest in the Swedish capital.

He had assumed the name of "Kantitz," his passport was not valid and bore an indistinct photograph. He had shaved off his moustache and otherwise camouflaged his identity. When taken into custody, however, he admitted he was Kapp.

He is held by the Swedish authorities. Since a warrant for treason is out for him the German government is expected to demand his extradition.

Physician Gets Post
Toledo, Wash., April 17.—Dr. A. D. Schlotthauer of Toledo has been named medical superintendent of the Walla Walla sanitarium. Dr. Leslie Swift will take over his practice here.

ENTRIES CLOSE FOR OREGON'S PRIMARY RACE

Senatorial Contest Is Enlivened by Announcement of Abraham's Candidacy for G. O. P. Nomination Against Stanfield.

Now that the official flag has dropped so far as primary candidates are concerned, it appears that, as usual, there is no dearth of those who have ambition to serve the public in elective office any place down the line, with the exception of the first congressional district where W. C. Hawley has no opposition either in his own party or from the Democratic ranks, and in a few of the minor offices.

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Meat and Potato Hogs Arrested at New York; Huge Profits Alleged

Employees Ask Increase From 62 to 70 Cents an Hour, in Answer to Company's Threat to Reduce Wages; Company Says "No."

New York, April 17.—(U. N. S.)—Federal agents conducted a series of swift raids in New York today and arrested four officers of big food dealing concerns on charges of profiteering in food during the railroad strike. Those arrested were:

Louis Joseph, Brooklyn manager of the packing firm of Wilson & Co. Eugene A. Sullivan, president of the Eugene A. Sullivan company.

William Fleming, vice president of the New York & New Jersey Produce company.

Henry Schulte, manager of the same company.

Employees of the packing firms of Swift & Co. and Armour & Co. were arrested yesterday on similar charges. Joseph was charged with raising the price of meat 3 cents in one day. Sullivan, Fleming and Schulte were all charged with profiteering in potatoes. It is alleged Sullivan, who is known as the "Potato King," bought 45,000 pounds of Maine potatoes and resold them at a profit of 62 per cent. Fleming and Schulte are charged with making a profit of from 50 to 75 per cent on potato deals during the railroad strike.

Employees of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company Friday countered the threat to cut their wages by requesting an increase. They ask an advance from 62 to 70 cents an hour, which would amount to an additional expenditure of \$400,000 a year by the company.

Representatives of 1800 men, including platform employees, shompen, trackmen, station agents and barmen Friday served notice on President Franklin T. Griffith of the company that they would not only refuse to submit to a cut in wages as suggested, but would request an increase for those employees. Their demand follows:

SCHEDULE OF INCREASES
"We find that not only will it be impossible to accept a decrease in wages but on the contrary we are compelled by the steadily increasing cost in living commodities to ask for the following increases for all members embraced in the present working agreement:

Platform Men
First three months, per hour.....62c
Next nine months, per hour.....65c
Thereafter, per hour.....68c
The one-man car operators on lines not otherwise specified, 6 cents an hour.

"Members of this association in all other departments covered by existing agreement to receive increases, using the differentials of the agreement dated October 15, 1917, it being understood that the above basis will not decrease the wages of any member or members."

GRIFITH POINTS TO COST
President Griffith declared the employees are not justified in asking an increase. He says they are paid as well as other employees throughout the country, and points to the corporation's financial condition as a bar to additional wages.

"The company cannot consider any increase in wages," he said. "There have been two large increases awarded our men by arbitration during the last eight months which have greatly increased our deficit, which now amounts to more than \$1,000,000 annually. The current wage scale cannot be maintained under the existing rates of fare."

"All our operating figures before the public service commission and the city council are based upon the present scale of wages, which rank with the highest in the country. We are asking revenue increases to enable us to continue treating our employees fairly and have no desire to impose upon our patrons any additional operating costs."

OPPOSITION IS MET
The demands of the employees will be considered in negotiations between the company and employees, it was announced Friday night, and an agreement is not reached, the demands will be submitted to arbitration.

The employees were granted an increase in wages in August by the war labor board, and in November by an arbitration board. The two added a burden of approximately \$600,000 a year to the operating costs of the company.

Representatives of the employees refused to make any statement relative to the demand last night.

CHRISTIANS MUST GO, SAID PASHA

Constantinople, April 16.—(Delayed.)—(U. N. S.)—Mustapha Kemal Pasha, leader of the Turkish Nationalists in Anatolia, has ordered the deportation of all foreigners and Christians from the new soviet republic of Angora, according to a report reaching the Turkish government today.

Fresh massacres are reported from Armenia.

Peasants in the Karabagh and Zangezur districts on the Turco-Persian frontier have started a revolutionary movement. Forty villages are said to have been occupied.

In retaliation the supporters of the new republican government of Azerbaijan have begun deporting the 25,000 Armenian residents of Baku.

Cavalry Ordered to Ireland
London, April 17.—(U. N. S.)—A brigade of cavalry has been ordered to proceed to Ireland for duty in reinforcing the British troops already there, according to this evening's London papers. The papers stated that the brigade would comprise the Seventeenth Lancers, the Kings' Hussars and the First Royal Dragoons.

French Resigns; Declines Successors
London, April 17.—(U. N. S.)—Viscount French has resigned his post as lord lieutenant of Ireland, it was asserted this afternoon by the Evening Standard. His successor probably will be Lord Decies, who married an American, the former Miss Vivian Gould, according to the Standard.

Cashier Sentenced By Bean to 2 Years
San Francisco, April 17.—(U. P.)—William C. Grant, former assistant cashier of the Santa Rosa National bank, today was found guilty of conspiracy in connection with the wrecking of that institution and was sentenced by Federal Judge Bean to five years' imprisonment. Fernando Samons, once president of the American Products company, was found not guilty of a similar charge.

Reed's Execution Found Groundless
Washington, April 17.—(U. N. S.)—The department of state has made inquiries regarding published reports that John Reed, American writer, was executed in Finland and have found the reports to be without foundation. It was officially announced today.

WILL DALY, TIRED OF RED TAPE, RESIGNS

Because red tape in governmental affairs makes it "impossible to get the results the public expects," Will H. Daly, federal fair price commissioner, Friday evening wired his resignation to Attorney General Mitchell Palmer at Washington, D. C., and is through with the campaign of endeavoring to lower the cost of living.

Daly has had maximum cooperation from the office of United States District Attorney Humphreys, he declares, but from other sources there has been no spirit in the activity he has attempted. "I decline to suffer for the failures of others in this regard," Daly said.

"In view of a recent court decision that the public had no concern in merchandising I feel that it does not behoove a busy man to waste his time on an attempt to express the public concern. My private business is exerting pressure that cannot avoid unless there were in view some result that I might achieve for the public good."

"There has been absolutely no encouragement for my work from higher authorities, with the exception of the local United States district attorney, who has done everything possible to help the work along."

PORTLAND JOINS CASE

Mrs. Nettie Bridges, 79, Vancouver avenue, Portland, said her sister, Mrs. Fanny Crawford, was married in 1914 to a man named Watson—one of Harvey's aliases. Mrs. Bridges' description tallies with that of the man who is now in the county hospital recovering from two attempts at suicide.

At the time of her marriage Mrs. Crawford is said to have had nearly \$2000. The woman, her two children and the money have since disappeared. She, too, is supposed to have been impressed by Harvey's promise to take her to Australia.

IS WOMEN ON LIST

"The murder was organized and carried out by the Royal Irish constabulary, officially directed by the British government, wherefore a verdict of willful murder is returned against Prime Minister Lloyd George, Ian MacPherson and head officials of the constabulary."
