

BRITISH CAVALRY SENT TO DUBLIN, LONDON DECLARES

Newspaper Says First Royal Dragoons Have Orders to Move; George Indicted for Murder.

London, April 17.—(U. P.)—British cavalry has been ordered to Ireland, the Evening Star said tonight. The first Royal Dragoons will leave Hounslow Wednesday for Dublin.

Cork, April 17.—(U. P.)—David Lloyd George, prime minister of England, was charged with "wilful murder" in the verdict of a coroner's jury here today, which completed its investigation into the killing of Thomas Maccurtain, late lord mayor of Cork.

Viscount French, lord lieutenant of Ireland, Ian MacPherson, former chief secretary of Ireland, and officials of the Royal Irish constabulary, were named as equally guilty with their chief.

WILFUL MURDER CHARGED

It then named the British officials as guilty of wilful murder.

The verdict came after weeks of investigation into the murder of the lord mayor, many witnesses being examined.

While the verdict was expected to have little effect other than as an expression of sentiment, it was received with unqualified joy in Sinn Fein circles. The Sinn Fein element—and that includes practically every citizen of Cork—was unanimous in its belief that the lord mayor was "killed by the police."

The agitation against British rule continued throughout south and west Ireland. At Milltown-Malby, where three civilians were killed and nine wounded in a clash with soldiers Wednesday night, more than 3000 persons attended the funerals of the dead Sinn Feiners.

CROSSES MARK SPOT

The population formed a great procession to the cemetery where volunteers fired three volleys directly over the graves. Crosses were erected where each of the dead men fell.

Two murders were reported today.

Thomas Mulholland was shot and killed while walking in Dundalk, near the Ulster border, 45 miles northwest of Dublin. Mulholland was a Sinn Feiner.

His fellows said he was killed in retaliation for attacks on police in the Dundalk district.

Dundalk police say that Mulholland was one of a gang of 20 men who attacked a police patrol. The police fired in self defense, they say, and Mulholland was killed.

The body of Patrick Foley, who joined the constabulary last January, was found in a field near Dundalk. It had 26 bullet wounds. Foley had been blindfolded and his hands tied behind his back. Police believe it was another "execution" by the radical Sinn Fein group.

SWITCHMEN STRIKE TO CAUSE MILLION DOLLAR LOSS, RYAN DECLARES

Two hundred million dollars' loss will be sustained by shippers and dealers in perishable foodstuffs by reason of the strike of rebel railroad switchmen.

Such is the estimate placed by T. F. Ryan, president and general manager of the Ryan Fruit company, most extensive shippers of perishable produce on the Pacific coast. Ryan is a Portland visitor, here to inspect the local branch of the company.

"Produce men, as well as dealers in practically all other lines, are finding it very difficult to keep pace with the rising cost of the war," Ryan said. "We are accused of profiteering, as are other business lines; but the 'profiteering' is all along the lines."

"It is not a case of 'profiteering' at all, because the margin of profit is no greater and production is not nearly aspace with demand."

The acute hotel shortage in London is being overcome by efforts of the Red Triangle hospitality league of the Y. M. C. A., which today issued a nationwide appeal to have private homes opened to Transatlantic guests here at present. There is not enough hotel room for the ordinary European traffic, let alone the influx of American and colonial visitors.

Bureaus will be established in New York and other large American cities.



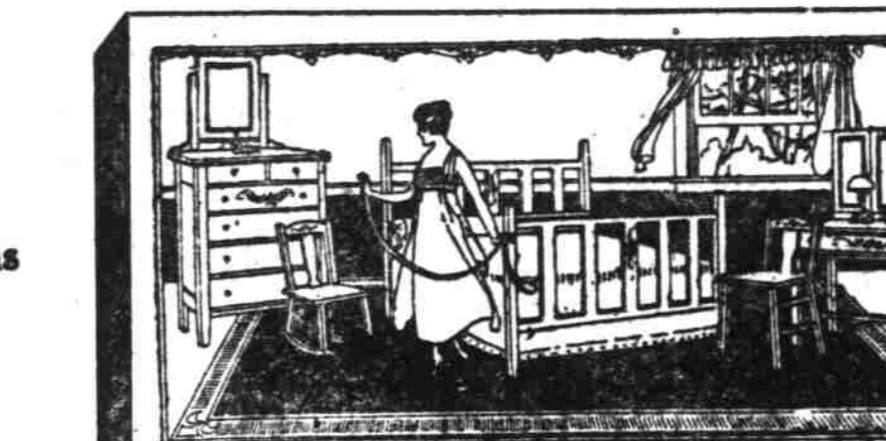
